



TO THE HONORABLE THE COLONIAL SECRETARY.

Legislative Council Office, Hobart, August 22, 1881.

SIR,

I have the honor to place in your hands the volume of Statistics of Tasmania for the past year; and to offer thereon such observations as may seem to be needful for the information of persons as well outside as within the Colony who are interested in its condition.

As a good deal of misapprehension exists on the subject, I take this opportunity of stating that, as far as I am aware, the Tasmanian Statistics, as a whole, are published considerably in advance of those of any of the other Australasian Colonies, and that strenuous efforts are always made to get them out as early as possible.

The printing of the present volume has been in some degree retarded by the press of work thrown upon the Government Printing Office by the early meeting of Parliament, and by the unusually heavy demands upon its resources on other accounts; and much inconvenience was experienced in the preparation in consequence of many of the Municipalities and Road Trusts having failed to render their accounts to the Colonial Auditor by the 31st March, as required by the Statistical Returns Act, (41 Vict. No. 15.)

Passing over the "Blue Book," which contains a list of Governors, Ministers, Parliaments, and some other matters highly useful for reference, but not of sufficient general interest to be introduced into a summary like the present, we come to the subject of—

II.—POPULATION.

The number of inhabitants in Tasmania on the 31 December, 1880, as found by adding the net increase by immigration and births to the number at the end of the preceding year, was 114,762, of whom 60,550 were males, and 54,212 females; the mean population, which is that used in most statistical calculations, being 113,615. The excess of births over deaths was 1907—namely, 826 males and 1081 females, and that of immigration over emigration, 227 males and 109 females, or 386 in all.

The estimated differed very slightly from the true population, as ascertained by the Census of 3rd April last—namely 115,705, of which 61,162 were males, and 54,543

The difficulty in ascertaining the true number of persons arriving in and departing Immigration from the Colony, which has so often been experienced in past years, was again felt in and Emigraregard to the year 1880. Taking the emigration to Victoria and New South Wales from the returns of arrivals in those Colonies as furnished by themselves, and the immigration thence into this Colony from the numbers supplied by our own Customs Department, the following was the result:-

I cannot accept the result shown by the first table, as there seems sufficient reason to believe that the balance has been rather on the side of the arrivals than on that of the departures. On the whole, the second table appears to be more in accordance with fact, yet the emigration must, for the reasons assigned in the report for 1878 and other years, have been understated; but so, in all probability, was the immigration. It is much to be desired that some arrangements should be made to obtain more accurate accounts of the number of persons who arrive in the Colony and depart from it, so that the sources of error may be reduced to the least possible. It is of great importance that the annual returns of population should be as near the truth as they can be brought, for many calculations, such as the rate per head of taxation, public debt, the rate of mortality, of births, marriages, and the like, depend upon them; and if the population is wide of the truth, so will be all calculations based upon it. The present being a census year, will be the best possible time for commencing a stricter system of ascertaining the movements of the population by sea. In some of the Colonies a census is taken every five years; and in these any inaccuracy in this respect is of less consequence; but where, as in our Colony, the time between one census and another is ten years, towards the end of that period the errors may become so far intensified as seriously to detract from the value of any calculations made from the population as estimated upon such imperfect data.

III.—TRADE, COMMERCE, AND NAVIGATION.

Imports, pp. 36-54; 62-3.

The value of commodities imported in 1880 is returned as £1,369,223, or £101,748 more than in 1879, when it was £1,267,475; the increase being at the rate of 8.02 per cent.

The rate per head of population was £12 1s. $0\frac{1}{4}d$.

Looking back over the last ten years, we find that the only Countries which show any very noteworthy variations are the first three; and as the great bulk of our trade is with these, I subjoin the figures for each of those years.

The increase on the trade with the United Kingdom as between 1871 and 1880 is only 5.75 per cent., the value in 1880 being less than in any other year except 1871. For the first five years the total value was £1,962,954, for the second, £1,723,189, the decrease being £239,765. It will be observed, also, that the values have been continuously diminishing since 1877.

The imports from Victoria have increased at the rate of 11189 per cent. in the ten years, the total import trade for the first five years being £2,350,004, for the second, £3,636,632; the latter being £1,286,628 in excess of the former. The increase on the imports from Victoria, and the decrease in those from the United Kingdom are presumably connected; the incomparably greater proximity of that Colony, and the fact that supplies may generally be obtained there just as they are wanted, without keeping them in stock, making it to the interest of the smaller trader to deal with Victoria rather than with the Mother Country.

But by far the larger increase is on the trade with New South Wales, the increase between 1871 and 1880 being no less than 252 58 per cent. The aggregate value from 1871 to 1875 was £242,152; from 1876 to 1880, £471,411.

On the 14th January, 1880, a new scale of Customs Duties came into force, and the classification of many of the articles has in consequence been altered. It would be useless therefore to make any detailed comparison of the imports as between the last and any previous year. The following articles, however, may be compared:—

In 1880 there appears a large import of £177,700 worth of Gold Coin from Victoria. There was also an import of Silver Coin to the amount of £8600.

The Exports in 1880 were valued at £1,511,931, or £210,834 more than in 1879.

Petal reaborne Tra E. weter In dealing with the Imports attention was called to the great increase in the trade with New South Wales, as compared with the imports from Victoria. Here we see the same thing, only in a greatly intensified form; for, while the increase as regards New South Wales, was 240 per cent., as regards Victoria it was only 52,—little more than a fifth.

Comparing 1880 with 1879, we observe that there was an increase in the trade with the United Kingdom, Victoria, and New South Wales; while New Zealand, Queensland, and South Australia, showed a decrease.

As regards particular articles, we find an increase in Bran and Pollard, from 60 to 461 tons; in Flour, from half a ton to 100 tons; in Green Fruit, from 142,252 to 155,468 bushels; in Gold, from 38,895 to 50,999 ounces; in Wheat, from 15,090 to 63,928 bushels; in Oats, from 109,086 to 181,619 bushels; in Skins, (rabbit), from 1,022,892 to 1,347,948; in Hops, from 558,622 to 589,722 lbs.; in Oatmeal, from 209 to 313 tons; in Sperm Oil, from 245 to 334 tuns; in Wool, from 7,385,002 to 9,025,228 lbs. The quantity of Wool in 1880 was the largest which has ever been sent from Tasmania in one year. The actual clip of Wool of 1879, the greater part of which was exported between 1 December, 1879, and 30 November, 1880, was 8,052,196 lbs., the clip of the previous year being 8,029,808 lbs. The following articles showed decreases:—Bark, from 5813 to 5131½ tons; Jam, from 3,915,881 to 3,430,912 lbs.; Barley, from 8412 to 3851 bushels; Hides, Skins, and Leather, from 2183 to 1406 packages; Horses, from 137 to 101; Sheep, from 938 to 385; Timber (value), from £59,713 to £51,973; Tin, from 4563 to 3954 tons, (the value however, being £38,533 more in 1880); in Vegetables, from 9475 to 6545 tons.

The value of Gold exported in 1880 was £201,655, and is the greatest that has ever been known in the Colony. In 1871 it was only £14,218, which increased to £26,904 in 1877, to £59,124 in 1878, and then by a sudden jump, to £145,723 in 1879.

That of Tin was returned as 341,736 in 1880, against £303,203 in 1879, and £316,311 in 1878.

Wool, Tin, Gold, and Fruit, (green and preserved) together contributed £1,218,309 to the value of the Exports of 1880.

Stone for building, to the value of £4604 was exported to Victoria and New Zealand; and 100 tons of Road Metal were sent to New South Wales.

The Timber trade at one time (1853-4), was the largest of our industries, but from various causes experienced a rapid decline. In 1871, the value of timber exported was in round numbers £49,000. From that time it increased to £88,000 in 1875; and has since been almost continually diminishing, being £60,000 in 1879, and £52,000 in 1880. Our own timber, valuable as it may be for many purposes where strength and durability are required, is not suitable for all the lighter kinds of work, and there is consequently a considerable quantity of pine and deals imported every year. There is also a very large demand for timber of this description in the other colonies. It is well worth careful consideration whether there may not be a favourable opening in this direction for the establishment of a new industry really suited to the circumstances of this Colony. It is of no use to attempt to force industries in the face of natural disadvantages; the only policy that has ever proved or ever can prove ultimately successful, is to apply capital and labor to those things for the production of which a country is specially adapted.

All trees of the pine tribe flourish in Tasmania, and since their growth is rapid, if once planted, the time would not be very long before they would be old enough to be used for timber. But little labour would be required to be bestowed upon them after the first; and they might be grown on land which could not be used for agricultural purposes, and in damp and cold situations which are ill adapted for grain and other crops.

Total seaborne Trade, p. 62. The total sea-borne trade in 1880, was represented by a sum of £2,881,154. The following figures show its progress in the last ten years:—

As between 1880 and 1879, the increase was £312,582; as between the first and last years of the period, £1,362,429, or 89.71 per cent.

Widely different is this comparison from that between 1861 and 1870—the two extreme years of the previous decennial period. In that case there was a decrease of £417,355, or 22 45 per cent.

On the 1st October last an "International Exhibition" was opened at Melbourne, at Melbourne which all the Australasian Colonies were represented. A considerable number of premiums Exhibition were awarded to Tasmanian exhibits, the following being the most noteworthy:—

Sandstone from the Okehampton quarries took a bronze medal in Order 1. An exhibit of Grindstones was classed in Order 2.

Wattle Bark obtained a bronze medal in Order 1, and another exhibit was placed in Order 3.

Oils—sperm, bird, neatsfoot, seal, obtained bronze medals in Order 1.

A silver medal was given for Casks, which were placed in Order 2; and creditable positions were obtained by other exhibits of Timber, Willows, Brushware, &c.

The stock of goods in bond, as regards the more important articles, on 31 December Goods in in the years 1880 and 1879, was as shown below. Only those articles are specified which Bond, p. 65. present any considerable difference.

Showing an increase in the tonnage of 31,408, or 8.22 per cent., although there was a decrease of 119 in the number.

In 1871 the number of ships which entered and left the ports of the Colony was 1283, and the tonnage 216,160. The increase in 1880 was therefore 26 in the number and 197,143 in the tonnage, being at the rate of 2.03 per cent. on the ships and 91.20 on the tonnage. The difference in the rates of increase on ships and on their aggregate capacity is remarkable, and appears to be accounted for by the fact that vessels of larger size have been coming into use; the average tonnage of each vessel in 1871 being 168, and in 1880, 316.

Stanley is the only sub-port which had an increase. On the other sub-ports, taken collectively, there was a decrease amounting to 40.75 per cent.

Going back to 1871, we observe that while the shipping trade of Hobart and Launceston has somewhat more than doubled, and that of Stanley has increased by about 44 per cent., that of Torquay by about 13, that of Burnie (including Wynyard and the Cam) has decreased from 11,265 tons to 3997, and that of Ulverstone (including Leith and the Penguin) from 14,998 to 5972.

In regard to the nationality of vessels in 1880, taking the ships inwards as the standard of comparison, it appears that the tonnage belonging to the United Kingdom was 26,764; that 176,946 tons belonged to owners in British Colonies; and that 1507 tons were the property of foreigners.

The return of Shipping on the registers on the 31st December, 1880, shows a decrease of 4 in the number, and of 1079 in the tonnage, as compared with that of 1879. For 1880 the figures were—vessels, 203; tonnage, 17,741; crews 1422. The tonnage has scarcely increased since 1871, though the number has risen from 187 to 203. The greatest increase has been in steamers, of which in 1871 there were 10, of 2442 tons burden, and 735 horse power; in 1880 there were 20, of 4986 tons, and 1469 horse power.

Whale Fisheries, p. 72. The number of vessels employed in the Whale Fisheries has been continuously growing fewer during the past ten years. The following figures will show the state of this industry at the beginning, the middle, and the end of that period:—

The value of the produce, which in 1871 was returned as £46,350, in 1880 was only £12,045.

The number of the principal Trades, Manufactories, and Works in operation in 1880, Trades, &c., as shown in the returns, was 3339, being 80 more than in 1879. The chief increases P. 73. were on Auctioneers, (5), Boot and Shoemakers (26), Builders (5), Butchers, (8), Cabinet-makers and Joiners (28), Market Gardeners (7), General Dealers (8), Painters, Plumbers, and Glaziers (9), Tailors (10), Tanners (6), Tobacconists (5).

The average rates of Wages throughout the Colony for many Trades was higher in Rates of 1880 than in 1879, but on the rates paid to seamen, shepherds, shearers, some classes of Wages, pp. 74-5. domestic servants, and a few others, there was a slight decline.

Judging from the Contract rates, as being the most exact, at Hobart the prices Prices of of bread, flour, butcher's meat, malt liquors, coffee, rum, tobacco, were lower than in 1879, while those of other articles were higher,—that of sugar very considerably so.

Gold mining continued to be successfully prosecuted in 1880. The number of Gold Mining, persons employed in alluvial mining was 794, being 741 less than in 1879, and the gold p. 77. which they obtained was 18,250 ozs., against 37,750 ozs. in 1879; but the value of the plant employed in this description of mining was returned as £10,200 in 1880, as against £5200 in 1879. In regard to quartz mining the comparison between the two years was greatly in favour of 1880, as will be seen by a glance at the following figures:---

The average value of quartz gold per ton was, however, not quite so great, being £3 13s. 10d. in 1880, and £3 15s. 4d. in 1879. Nor was the average yield per ton quite so good,—being 1 oz. 2 dwts. in 1880, or 6 dwts. 7 grs. less than in 1879.

The total quantity of gold produced, so far as could be estimated, was 52,595 ozs. in 1880, and 60,155 in 1879; the value of which was £201,297 and £230,895 respectively.

I find from the newspapers that up to June last the Tasmanian mine at Beaconsfield, which has now a battery of 50 head of stampers, had paid £137,250 in dividends, or £45 15s. per share to its fortunate proprietors,—the total amount divided during the last half year being £30,000; and that the "New Chum Company" at Lefroy had obtained in June from 570 tons of stone over 1313 ozs. of gold, giving an average of 2 ozs. 6 dwts. $2\frac{1}{4}$ grs. per ton, and in July 1302 ozs. 2 dwts. from 420 tons, being an average of 3 ozs. 2 dwts. to the ton,—this Company having paid £44,750 in dividends from its inception up to June.

It has already been stated, when dealing with the exports, that the quantity of gold sent out of the Colony was much larger in 1880 than in the year before.

The quantity of Coal raised in 1880 was 12,219 tons, or 2705 tons above the produce Other Mines, of 1879. Freestone, or stone of similar kind used for building, was raised to the quantity p. 78. of 100,028 cubic feet and 160 tons in 1880, against 123,221 feet and 20 tons in 1879. More Lime was procured in 1880, the quantity being 28,971 bushels, whereas it was only 12,900 in 1879; while, however, only 1050 tons of limestone were returned, against 1824 tons and 7000 cubic feet in 1879. Slates and Iron Ore disappear from the return of 1880. The following was the produce (omitting fractions of a ton) of the tin mines in those two years:-

Resorting again to the newspapers, I find that the Mount Bischoff Tin Mining Company has divided since its commencement up to the present time £17 10s. per share, or a sum of £210,000 in the whole.

Mount Heemskirk contributed 30 tons to the yield of 1880. For a long time the accounts relating to the deposits of tin in this locality were so conflicting that it was not safe to hazard an opinion, but there seems now to be sufficient evidence to justify the belief that valuable stores of that metal, and perhaps of others, do really exist there. The establishment of mining as a profitable industry on the west coast, besides its direct advantages would have a further very important influence on the progress of the Colony, by attracting population to a part of it which has hitherto remained unsettled and almost unknown.

Since the foregoing remarks were written Mr. Thureau's report on the west coast has been published, and for the information of those who may not have seen it, I extract therefrom the following passages relating to the Tin Mines in the neighbourhood of Mount Heemskirk:—"As far as my investigations have extended they are very satisfactory. I cannot express my surprise that these mines should have remained quiescent for so long a period after their discovery. I am likewise surprised at the perfect network of tin-bearing deposits which exists over an extent of ground not comprehensible to those who have not yet seen the locale. Without the slightest doubt, Heemskirk will in the course of time, if the mines are continuously and efficiently worked, become a place of importance to this Colony." On the track from Heemskirk to the Little Henty River he found "a very large out-crop of argillaceous iron ore. The ore is of good quality, and it can be cheaply worked, owing to the natural facilities afforded by its location on an isolated hill, not far from water. But in the absence, as far as I could see, of coal or lime, this ore must for the present, at least, remain in statu quo."

Patents, pp. 79-80.

Eighteen Patents were issued in 1880, being 8 more than in 1879.

Beer brewed, p. 80.

The imposition of a duty on malt liquors brewed in the Colony, which took effect on 1st March, 1880, has enabled me to include in the present volume a return of the quantity of such liquors brewed, and also of the quantity of the home made article on which duty was paid, between that date and the end of the year. The quantity brewed was 903,024 gallons, and that on which duty was paid 867,088 gallons. Taking the quantities for January and February at the same rate as for March, those for the whole twelve months would have been 1,149,408 and 1,144,706 gallons respectively. The quantity brewed would thus have been at the rate of 10·1 gallons per head of the mean population. This is nearly $5\frac{1}{2}$ gallons less than in Victoria in 1879-80.

IV.—FINANCE, &c.

Revenue, pp. 82-87.

The Revenue of Tasmania in 1880 reached the sum of £439,779 11s. 3d., being £64,209 15s. 6d. in excess of that of 1879.

Considerable changes were made in the financial system of this Colony during the past year. The tariff was remodeled, a duty of 3d. in the gallon on beer manufactured in the Colony was imposed, together with a duty on Real and Personal Estate of 9d. in the pound, and certain changes were made in the Stamp Duties with the view of making them more productive, and of preventing postage stamps from being used as formerly for the purposes of the Stamp Act. Accordingly, in the present year, and henceforward, the Treasury accounts will shew exactly how much has been contributed to the revenue by postage and revenue stamps respectively.

On the Customs there was an increase (in even pounds) of £19,460; on Licences other than publicans', of £269; on Stamps, of £5412; on Telegraph receipts, of £957; on Probate Duty, of £809; on Rural Police Rate, of £363; on Fines, Fees, &c., of £292; on Railways, of £1760; on amount accruing from Crown Lands sold, of £2866; and on Rents of Waste and Mineral Land, of £1637. On "Miscellaneous," there was a decrease of £7425 15s. 10d. There were trifling decreases on Publicans' and Dog Licences. The decrease in the Post Office revenue of £2705 was only apparent, being caused by the change in regard to the use of stamps above referred to. Parliament having decided to abolish Tolls, some at the end of the last year, and others at an earlier date, the receipts from this source diminished, and have now altogether ceased. There was a decrease of £2944 in the "Reimbursements in Aid," but as these are fluctuating and uncertain, it is of no significance.

The increase of revenue as between 1880 and 1871 was 47.40 per cent.

Expenditure, pp. 85-6.

The Expenditure from current revenue was £423,744 13s. 8d. in 1880, and £481,215 18s. 6d. in 1879. There was therefore a decrease during the past year of £57,471 4s. 10d. There was a difference of £77,069 under the head of "Railways," a

large sum on account of interest paid to the Main Line Railway Company having been finally brought to account in the year 1879, which did not appear in the following year. Other minor decreases occurred in regard to Ecclesiastical charges, Charitable Institutions, Gaols, Defences, Mines, Municipalities, Road Districts, and Miscellaneous, and some other items of Expenditure. On Customs and Excise the establishment of the Beer and Real and Personal Estates Duties caused an increase of £962; on Public Works there was an increase of £12,623; on Lands and Surveys, of £1135; on Interest, of £4573; and on some others, of trifling amounts.

The money market in 1880 was subject to more than ordinary changes. The Course of Exchange with London continued the same as in the previous year. There was no Exchange, p. 88. change also in the rates as between this and the other Colonies, except that both the p. 88. purchasing and selling price of bills relating to New Zealand was 4 per cent. lower.

The rates of discount for bills continued till 23rd August as they had been in 1879, namely at 8 and 9 per cent.; after that date they were reduced to 7 and 8 per cent., according to currency.

The rates of bank interest which in 1879 had been 4, 5, and 6 per cent., for deposits at 3, 6, and 12 months respectively, continued the same till the 11th February. then fell to 3, 4, and 5 per cent.; and on the 22nd August had a further fall to 2, 3, and 4 per cent.,—the rates which prevailed ten years since. At the time of writing—the middle of 1881—the highest rate of Bank interest on deposits is 3 per cent.

This fall in the rate of interest must have one of two effects—it must either force capitalists to search for new modes of investment within the Colony, and thus open up new fields of profitable industry; or it must drive capital out of the Colony to places where higher rates prevail, or where there are more favourable opportunities of employing capital.

The business of the Banks in 1880 as compared with that of the preceding year, Banks, pp. shows a satisfactory increase. The average assets and liabilities for those years was

The rate of increase per cent. was—on assets, 3.82; on liabilities, 9.01. The increase on the assets and liabilities in the last quarter of 1879, as compared with those of 1878, was 2.68 and 5.66 per cent., respectively. Notwithstanding that the inducements to holders of capital to deposit it in the Banks diminished as the year 1880 wore on, the amount of specie and bullion increased from £345,369 in the first quarter, to £490,769 in the third, standing at £483,435 in the fourth. The value of notes in circulation was £130,542 in the first quarter, £132,981 in the second, £123,084 in the third, and £122,442 in the fourth. The amount of deposits ranged between £2,120,368 in the first, and £2,122,091 in the fourth quarter. Comparing the specie, notes, and deposits in the last quarter of 1880 and 1879, we have the following differences:-

The increase on Gold and Coin was thus about seven times that on the deposits.

The liabilities of the Banks are now about three times as much as they were ten years ago; the assets nearly twice as much. The deposits, which are now over £2,000,000, were then about £650,000; while the stock of metallic money has increased from £173,000 to £483,000 in the same space of time.

The Savings Banks had a moderate increase on their business in the past year. The Savings number of accounts open on 28 February, 1881, was 13,520, being only 392, or 2.98 per cent. more than it was at the same time in 1880.

During the year ended 28 February last, 1110 new accounts were opened, and 812 closed. In the previous year the numbers were nearer together, 946 accounts only having been opened, and 904 closed; so that the difference is in favor of the later period. In 1873 (when the information was first given in the Statistics), the ratio of depositors to population at the beginning of the year was 8.68 per 100; at the beginning of the present year it was 11.78 per 100: that is, while only about 1 in 11 was a depositor in the earlier year now about 1 in every 8 has his account at the Savings Bank. There are other indications also of the growth of more thrifty habits among the people, such as the increase in the members of Friendly Societies, in the business of the Building Societies, and in the establishment in Hobart and other parts of the Colony of Penny Banks. These latter are capable of doing a vast amount of good, if they were worked energetically, and if the poorer classes could be induced to avail themselves of them to the utmost. The total amount to credit of depositors at the latest date was £310,081, which was £11.879, or about 4 per cent., more than in the preceding year.

The total amount deposited in 1880-1 was £191,157, and the amount withdrawn £179,278, giving an addition to the savings of the people of £11,879. In 1879-80 the deposits were £174,925, and the repayments £185,112, the latter being £10,187 in excess, in consequence probably of the higher interest obtainable in the ordinary banks. The average amount standing to the credit of each depositor in 1881 was £22 18s. 8d., being 4s. 4d. more than in 1880.

Thus it appears that the number of accounts has increased more rapidly than the amounts; so that, unless a large number of depositors have multiplied their accounts, (which is hardly possible to that extent), the addition must have consisted of persons of smaller means than formerly, showing that the banks were becoming more appreciated and used by the class for whose benefit they were more particularly designed. This is further shown by the fact that the average amount standing to the credit of each depositor declined from £26 5s. 10d. in the earlier year to £22 18s. 8d. in the later. The accounts were thus more numerous, but the average amount of each was smaller—the total sum collected from the people being, as it were, spread over a larger area.

Post Office Money Orders⁷ pp. 93-4. The Money Order System is another means of indicating the progress of the people. During the year 1880, it was extended to 30 additional places. The number of orders issued and paid from 1877, when a great advance took place, with the increases, is shown below:—

Public Debt, pp. 95-6. The Public Debt of the Colony on the 31st December last stood at £1,943,700, having been increased by £156,900 during the year. Of the former amount, £943,700 was bearing interest at 6 per cent., £300,000 at 4 per cent., and the remainder, £700,000, at 5 per cent. The amount of liability per head of the estimated population on that day was £16 18s. $8\frac{2}{3}d$. The amount of interest paid during the year on the permanent debt was £96,704 5s. 7d., being at the rate of 16s. $10\frac{1}{3}d$. calculated in the same way.

Taxation, p. 97. The amount of taxation on account of the general Government in 1880 was, in even money, £304,546, which was derived from the following sources:—Customs, £219,148; Excise, £10,814; Licences, £14,151; Stamps, £12,211; Probate Duty, £8572; Real and Personal Estates Duty, £31,816; Rural Police Rate, £5140; Tolls (rent of), £760; Scab Act Fund, £1934.

The Customs formed 71.96 per cent. of the total revenue; the Excise, 3.55; Licences, 4.65; Stamps, 4.01; Probate Duty, 2.81; Duty on Real and Personal Estates, 10.45; Rural Police Rate, 1.69; the remaining items contributing only 0.88 per cent. between them.

The local taxation amounted to £75,470, of which £53,156 were received by the Municipalities, £11,612 by the Marine Boards, £10,550 by the Road and Bridge Trusts, and £152 by the Rabbit Trusts.

The rate per head of the mean population was-for the general Government, £2 13s. $7\frac{1}{4}d$.; for local purposes, 13s. $3\frac{1}{4}d$.; for both, £3 6s. $10\frac{1}{2}d$.

V.—ESTABLISHMENTS AND INSTITUTIONS MAINTAINED OR ASSISTED BY GOVERNMENT.

The returns of the Post Office show a large increase in the business of the Depart- Post Office, ment in 1880. The number of Post Offices and Receiving Houses was 201; of persons p. 132. employed, 317; of miles of post roads, 1831; of miles travelled by post conveyance, 678,968; of letters received and despatched, 2,682,329; of packets, 149,967; and of newspapers, 2,195.733. The rates per cent. of increase in 1880, as compared with 1879, were these:—On the number of Post Offices, 1.51; on the persons employed, 2.92; on the miles of road, 6.45; on the mileage travelled, 3.18; on the number of letters, 8.77; on packets, 16.85; and on newspapers, 7.59.

The revenue in 1880 was £19,484; the expenditure, £27,154 1s. 8d.; the increase on revenue being £1,684; on expenditure, £478 15s. 7d. In 1879 the excess of expenditure was estimated to be £8875; in 1880 only £7670. In April, 1880, postage stamps were no longer allowed, as formerly, to be used for the purposes of the Stamp Act; and from that time the revenue from the Post Office has been separated from that which is obtained under the Stamp Act.

The decrease in newspapers concurrently with an increase in letters and packets is remarkable. The Secretary to the Post Office attributes it to the fact that two newspapers, one in Hobart and one in Launceston, ceased to be published in the course of the year.

The same activity which prevailed in the business of the Post Office, was also found Electric in that of the Electric Telegraph. The number of stations increased from 62 to 64; the Telegraph, persons employed from 74 to 76; the number of miles of poles from 731 to 745; and p. 139. the number of miles of wire from 949 to 963.

The paid messages in 1880 were 81,796, or 16,607 more than in 1879; the unpaid 26,934, or 291 more; the total number, paid and unpaid, being 108,730, or 16,898 more. The revenue was £5008 6s. 7d., or £783 4s. 2d. more; the expenditure £6464 19s. 3d., or £316 16s. 8d. more, the increase of revenue, as in the case of the Post Office, being greater than that of the cost.

The expenditure as before stated does not include the subsidy of £4200 paid on account of the submarine cable from Tasmania to Victoria, which is the property of a company.

The rates of increase per cent. were as follows:—on the paid messages, 25.47; on the unpaid, 1.09; on both taken together 18.40; on the revenue 18.53; and on the expenditure, 5.15.

On the paid messages between places within Tasmania the rate of increase in 1880 was 15,758, or 30.80 per cent.; on the messages between Tasmania and other countries, passing over the Government lines, 849, or 6.05 per cent.; on the unpaid messages on public service, 291, or 1.56 per cent.

Launcesion and Western Railway, pp. 134-6.

The Launceston and Western Railway also gave indications of an improved condition of the colony. The total receipts (including £5350 10s. 4d. paid by the Main Line Railway Company for the privilege of running over a part of the line between Launceston and Evandale) were £23,560, against £21,584 in 1879, the increase being at the rate of 9.15 per cent. The gross earnings per mile open were £523 12s. in 1880, and £479 12s. in 1879; and per train mile, 4s. 6d. and 4s. $3\frac{1}{2}d$. respectively.

The working expenses were £17,456 in 1880, and £18,699 in 1879, being at the rate of £334 14s, per mile worked in 1880, and £360 8s, in 1879, and 3s. $8\frac{1}{2}d$. per train mile respectively. The proportion of working expenses to gross earnings was 86.82 per cent. in 1879, and only 74.09 in 1880. While the revenue was larger in 1880 than it had ever been before, the proportion of expenditure to revenue was smaller. The profit on working, which was £6104, was the largest which has yet been made, the next largest having been £4509, in 1878.

The whole of the increase in profit came from the goods traffic, as will be seen by the figures which follow.

The number of passengers who used the railway was 102,918 in 1880, and 103,256 in 1879, giving a decrease in 1880 of 338. The average distance travelled by each was 17.33 miles, against 17.63 in 1879.

The tonnage of goods conveyed was 20,762 in 1880, against 16,363 in 1879; the difference being at the rate of 26.88 per cent. As between 1880 and 1876 the increase was only 132 tons, but the traffic in 1880 was greater than in any previous year since 1875.

The train mileage was 104,473 in 1880, against 100,624 in 1879, and 89,101 in 1876; the increase per cent. as between 1879 and 1880 being 3.82, and as between 1880 and 1876, 17.25 per cent.

Marine

The Marine Board had a Revenue in 1880 (in round numbers) of £12,870, and an Boards, p. 137. Expenditure of £10,607. The receipts were somewhat under those of 1879, and the outlay was also less, while the balance carried on to the following year was greater.

Light-houses, p. 137.

The Light-house fund (under the management of the Hobart Town Marine Board) amounted to £4,547 in 1880, being less by £2081 than in 1879, the decrease being caused by the diminution in the amount received from other Governments in aid of maintaining the lighthouses.

Salmon Breeding Establish-ment, p. 137.

The Salmon Breeding Establishment continued, as in former years, to supply other countries and other parts of Tasmania with ova and fry of the salmonoids. The following Return, furnished by the Secretary to the Salmon Commissioners, shows the numbers distributed in 1880, and the amount received for them, as well as for fishing licences.

On comparing the average number of persons in the establishments mentioned above in 1880 and 1871—ten years previously—we find that the hospital patients have decreased from 216 to 157; but that there has been an increase of lunatics from 213 to 303, and of paupers (not including children formerly in the Queen's Asylum and now boarded-out, the number of whom in 1871 was 354) from 750 to 847.

The Gaols and Penal Establishments contained at the beginning of the year 1880, 338 prisoners; and at the end of the year, 298, or 40 less; the average number maintained during the year being 335, against 350 in 1879 and 641 in 1871. One, if not the sole cause of this diminution of the number of criminals and increase of paupers and insane, is no doubt the gradual passing away of a class which formerly constituted a large proportion of the population; the remains of which have a tendency, with increasing age, to migrate from the gaol into the poor-house or the lunatic asylum.

Of the average number of prisoners in 1880, 142 were employed in hard labor inside the prison, 96 in hard labor outside; 23 in other ways; and 64 were not employed.

The punishments inflicted in that year were—irons, 1; solitary imprisonment, 62; other punishments, 32.

The whole number of offenders dealt with in the Gaols within the year (including those remaining from previous years), was 1987, 1327 being males, and 660 females. It was 1.75 per cent. of the mean population, or 1 in 57.

In the following table the numbers are ranged according to the frequency of conviction, the per centage being in proportion to the whole number:—

Thus it appears that taking both sexes together, about one-half were convicted for the fourth or more times; 14 per cent. were convicted for the third time; 21 per cent. for the second time; and 15 per cent. were offenders for the first time. The first convictions were in the proportion of 17 per cent. nearly for the males, and 12 for the females. The second and third convictions of males were also largely in excess of those of females; while as regards those who were convicted four or more times, the proportion of females was very much greater than that of males.

Of the patients in Hospitals the largest proportion was between 15 and 25 years of age; the next largest between 55 and 65. Those between 45 and 55 followed next in order; then those between 25 and 35.

Of the lunatics, the majority were of 45 years and upwards.

The paupers as might be expected, were chiefly persons of advanced age, about 63 per cent. being of 65 years and upwards, and 24 per cent. between 55 and 65.

In the Gaols the greater proportion were between 45 and 55; the next largest between 15 and 25. Twelve females were under 10; and 30 males and 3 females between 10 and 15. The numbers and per centages at each age were these:—

As regards Education, out of the whole number of paupers (1689) who were received into the Asylums during 1880, or had been admitted previous to the beginning of the year, and were maintained during any part of it, 678 were unable to read; 319 were able to read only; 688 could read and write; and 4 were of superior education.

In the Gaols, of the whole number (1987), the corresponding numbers were 552, 336, 1088, and 11.

As to birth places, the larger proportion of patients in Hospitals were Tasmanians and Australians, the next largest being natives of England and Wales. From the latter countries came also 1076 out of the 1689 paupers; and 667 of the 1987 offenders in the Gaols. Of the latter 617 were natives of Tasmania and Australia; 382 were natives of Ireland; and 277 of Scotland.

Of the cost of the Penal Establishments, £8973 was borne by the Imperial Government in 1871, and the remainder, £16,223, by the Colony. The proportions for the other Establishments for that year are not to be obtained complete from the Statistics. In 1880, the proportion of the cost of all the above Establishments borne by each Government was—Imperial Government, £4530; Tasmanian, £30,229. Part of the decrease in the expense of Gaols at the present time, as compared with 1871, is due to the fact that in the earlier year the Penal Establishment at Port Arthur had not been broken up, and that the expense of maintaining the inmates became considerably reduced when they were transferred to Hobart.

In addition to the cost of the Pauper Asylums there was the expenditure for out-door relief, which in 1880 was £10,162, making the total sum disbursed on account of pauperism, £20,355. In 1871 (ten years previously) the total amount was £13,998.

In the Campbell Town Hospital 43 cases were treated during the year, of which 38 were discharged, 3 died, and 2 were remaining at the end of the year.

The Boys' Home had 31 inmates at the beginning of the year, 7 were admitted. during the year, 8 were discharged, and 30 were left at its close.

The Girls' Industrial Schools at Hobart and Launceston had 52 inmates at the beginning of 1880, admitted 10, discharged 14, and had 48 in their charge at the termination of the year.

In the number of children taught at the Ragged Schools there was a decrease of 36 in 1880 as compared with 1879, the numbers being—1879, 601; 1880, 565. The average daily attendance in 1880 was 393, against 435 in 1879.

The Benevolent Societies afforded relief to 724 persons in 1880, being 18 less than in the preceding year. In Hobart the adult males were 23 less, the adult females 10 more, the children 7 less; in Launceston under the permanent class the adults of both sexes were fewer, the decrease on both being 26; but in the occasional class there was an increase of 13 in the adult males, of 9 in the adult females, and of 11 in the children.

The assisted Institutions consist of three classes—1. Charitable; 2. Educational; and 3. Scientific.

The revenue (not including balance from previous year) of these in 1880 was as follows:—1. Charitable, £4530, of which £1266 was derived from private subscriptions, £2061 from the Government, and £848 from miscellaneous sources; the private subscriptions being to the Government grant as 61:40 to 100, the lowest proportion being 33:23, and the bighest 192:41, or nearly double: 2. Educational, (Ragged Schools), £646, which was made of £133 from private subscriptions, £502 from government, and £10 from other sources, the subscriptions being to the Government grant in the proportion of 26.45 to 100: 3. Scientific (of which the Royal Society of Tasmania was the only representative), £1067, the subscriptions and government aid being respectively £322 and £650, and £95 being derived from other channels, the subscriptions being nearly 50 per cent. of the State Grant.

New Town Farm, p. 148. The New Town Farm during the year 1880 cost the Colony £546 9s. 4d.: £213 19s. 4d. was received in cash from the sale of Stock and produce; and it supplied to other Government Establishments 84,084 pints of Milk and 24,985 lbs. of Vegetables, valued at £748 0s. 5d.; leaving a profit of £415 10s. 5d., which was £78 2s. 1d. in excess of that made in 1879.

Volunteers, p. 149. The Volunteer Force on 31 December, 1880, consisted of 684 officers and men, or 30 fewer than in 1879. The Northern division numbered 246, the Southern 429, exclusive of the Permanent Staff. The force consisted of Cavalry 42; Artillery 267; Rifles 366.

Road Trusts, pp. 150-1. The Road Trusts were 73 in number in 1880, and had 4160 miles of road under their control. They received in rates during the year (omitting fractions) £10,151; from Government £9558; and from other sources £1906; making, with balance from previous year, a total revenue of £31,856. Their expenditure was—on roads £18,981; on salaries and commission £1219; on other matters, chiefly repayment of overdrafts, £5981; the total being £26,181.

The Main Roads Act, 1880, which came into operation on the 1st March, withdrew the control and maintenance of all the roads therein declared to be Main Roads, and of all bridges with two exceptions, from the Road Trusts, and vested them in Boards created by the Act, to be kept in repair out of funds provided by Parliament for the purpose. To ascertain the total cost of the maintenance of the roads during the year, the amount expended by these Boards should be added to the outlay of the Road Trusts; but I have not been able to obtain it.

Municipalities, pp. 152-3.

The revenue of the 21 Municipalities was as follows:—Rates, £45,866; from Government, £6957; licences and dog tax, £3339; fees and other receipts, £38,018; making, with balance brought forward, £96,671. The expenditure was £94,156, of which £23,497 was for police, and £8390 for other salaries.

The revenue increased during the last ten years by 81 per cent,—the number of Municipalities remaining the same,—and the expenditure 56 per cent.

Valuation of Property, p. 154. The annual value of landed property throughout the Colony, as shown by the Valuation Rolls in 1880, amounted to £708,348, which was higher by £25,271 than in 1879. The increase in the course of the last ten years has been about 13½ per cent. In the two principal Towns—Hobart and Launceston—the increase was 24 per cent; in the Rural Municipalities only about 3 per cent.; and in the Police Districts (in which the principal gold and tin mines are situated) 33 per cent.

Police.

The Returns of the Police Establishments have not been received.

VI.—Crown Lands, Agriculture, &c.

Crown Lands leased, p. 156.

The area of land (not including mineral land) rented from the Crown has not been so large as it was in 1880 since 1862. It was then 1,814,291 acres; in 1880 it was 2,554,918 acres, or 740,627 acres more. It has been increasing year by year from 1874, when it was only 545,848 acres.

The quantity of land rented from the Government in the course of the year 1880 was 635,751 acres, the rental of which was £1532. It was nearly seven times the quantity rented in 1879.

Crown Lands sold, pp. 156-7.

The return of land sold shows an increase in the town allotments, but a decrease in the country lots. The number of lots of town lands was 254, the area 837 acres, and the purchase money £5042. In 1879 the number was 209, the area 724 acres, and the amount of purchase money £7294. The average price per acre for towns lands in 1880 was £6 0s. 6d.

The breadth of land alienated up to the end of 1880 was 4,232,870 acres, leaving 12,545,130 acres still remaining as the property of the State.

There were granted in that year under immigration certificates 675 acres, the area Land granted, being less by 222 acres than in 1879.

The past year was one of great activity in mining speculation; and the result was Auriferous a large increase in applications for land of an auriferous character, as will be seen land, p. 169. from the figures which follow:-

The number of such leases executed in 1879 (30) was extremely small as compared with the number applied for. In 1879 42 were applied for, and 44 executed; the inference being that there was more ground taken up for mere speculative purposes in the later than in the earlier year.

Only 49 Business Licences were issued in 1880, against 72 in the year before; and only 2123 Miners' Rights, against 2690 in the latter year.

The amount of fees received under the Gold Fields Regulations in 1880 was £4355, or £2285 more than in 1879.

The demand for mineral lands (principally for tin mining) was brisk in 1880. The Mineral lands, numbers of leases granted in that and the preceding year are compared below.

Last year the Agricultural and Live Stock Returns were published on 1st June. In Agriculture, the present year they could not be got out before the 5th July, and even then the pp. 162-9. required information had not been supplied by one producer in the district of Westbury. I was not aware until the last, of the true cause of the delay in this and one or two other districts, or I should have endeavoured to apply a remedy. Next year I purpose, with the approval of the Government, to give special instructions to the Collectors to report any case of refusal or neglect to furnish information, in order that proceedings may be taken against the offender under "The Statistical Returns Act" for his default. If one or two examples of this kind were made it would doubtless have a very salutary effect, and very greatly accelerate the sending in of the schedules.

The quantity of land under Wheat in the season of 1880-1 was returned as 50,022 acres, being 4831 acres more than in the preceding season. In 1879-80 only 14,180 acres were reaped by machine; in the following season 24,566 acres were thus reaped, the increase being about 73 per cent. The perfecting of a machine capable of binding as well as reaping cannot fail to have a very important influence upon agriculture. The increase in the use of mechanical means of harvesting the crops has, even in past years, been remarkable; and with the present improved appliances it will certainly be, if possible, still greater. In 1871-2, the proportion of Wheat reaped by machine was not quite 6 per cent. of the whole crop, while slightly more than 94 per cent. was reaped by hand. Last season 49 per cent., or nearly half, was reaped by machine.

In the last season 8297 acres were in Barley, being 1726 more than in 1879–80. The land in Oats was less, being 19,853 acres, against 37,250. As regards Pease, Beans, and Tares, there was but little alteration. Potatoes covered an increased space, the acreage in 1880-1 being 10,421 acres, as against 9762 in 1879-80. Root crops (Turnips, Carrots, Mangel Wurzel, and Onions) occupied 3370 acres in the earlier, and only 2298 acres in the later year. Artificial Grasses for seed also declined in favor, the acreage being 3553 and 2639 in the corresponding years. Hay showed a decrease from 35,638 to 31,615 acres; "other crops" from 375 to 280 acres. Hops had an increase from 548 to 568 acres; Flax also an increase from 8 to 29 acres.

The land appropriated to Gardens and Orchards decreased from 6559 to 6459 acres; while that under Green Forage increased from 1193 to 1687 acres.

On the total breadth of land in crop there was a decrease of 15,771 acres, the figures being 156,559 and 140,788 respectively. The growth of Grasses for pasture continued to increase, the acreage in 1879–80, being 117,666, and in 1880–1, 132,969. In fallow land there was a very slight increase in the past season. Of "all other cultivated land" there were 66,399 acres in 1879–80, and 73,100 in 1880-1. The total land under cultivation of every kind in 1880–1 was 373,299 acres, being 6388 acres more than in the preceding year. The quantity of new land broken up in 1880–1 was 1952 acres, or about 44 per cent. more.

The crop of cereals, roots, as also of Pease, Beans, Grass Seed, Hay, and Hops, last season fell far short of that of 1879-80. The yield of Wheat fell from 1,042,999 to 750,040 bushels,—a reduction of 28 per cent.; that of Oats from 1,065,847 to 439,446 bushels, the difference being nearly 59 per cent.; that of Hops from 738,616 to 644,273 lbs., the decrease being 12.77 per cent. The Potato crop was slightly better. Linseed increased from 3896 to 14,662 lbs., Apples from 140,277 to 155,237, and Pears from 19,340 to 22,086 bushels.

The wheat crop of 1880-1 will give about 6.60 bushels per head of the mean population, or allowing for seed, say 5.70 bushels. The average yield of cereals in 1880-1 was as follows:—

The average for wheat was lower only four times in the last twenty-four years, namely, in 1864, 1867, 1868, and 1871; that of Barley and Oats was considerably below the ordinary standard, but not so much so as that of Wheat. The produce per acre of nearly all other crops was also below the average.

Taking into account the short yield of last season, the extraordinarily low return in South Australia, the scanty supply of breadstuffs in Victoria* and elsewhere, there ought to be a considerable extension of agricultural operations and an improvement in the condition of the farmers in the coming season.

Prices, pp. 165-8.

The prices of agricultural products last year were on the whole somewhat above those of 1879-80. Wheat was $\frac{3}{4}d$., Oats $\frac{1}{2}d$., Rye $8\frac{3}{4}d$., Beans $1\frac{1}{2}d$., Tares $\frac{3}{4}d$. per bushel higher; Hay was higher to the extent of 8s. $11\frac{1}{4}d$. per ton, and Apples and Pears were also slightly in advance; Barley was 1s. $2\frac{1}{4}d$., and Pease 2d. per bushel lower. Roots were all lower, Potatoes by 4s. $0\frac{1}{2}d$., Turnips 1s. 2d., Carrots 5s. $2\frac{1}{4}d$., Mangel Wurzel 1s. $3\frac{1}{3}d$., Onions 14s. $5\frac{3}{4}d$. per ton.

Comparing the prices in 1880-1 with those of 1874-5, a year of abundant crops, we find a serious decline in most articles, except fruits—particularly in Barley, Oats, Onions, Hay, and Hops,—all with one exception important productions.

Agricultural Machinery, pp. 166, 169. As regards the use of machinery for agricultural operations, the movement is decidedly onward. Although the tendency is not in favour of tillage, what work of that kind is done is performed with better appliances than formerly. Thus for breaking up the soil there was an increase last year as compared with 1879-80 of 35 horse hoes, grubbers, and scarifiers, of 53 subsoil ploughs, of 57 double furrow ploughs; for harvesting the crops, an increase of 33 reapers and binders, of 70 reapers and mowers,—which are in process of superseding the less convenient reaping and mowing machines of the older type, in which there was a decrease of 22,—and of 10 hay rakes (horse). In regard to some machines there was a decrease, but this was probably in consequence of the area under crop being more contracted, and the produce being deficient. With an improvement in these respects, the implements which retired out of sight last year, as not being required to be brought into use, would again appear in full activity, and would take the place in the returns from which they have temporarily withdrawn.

As an instance of a progressive tendency, it may be mentioned, that in 1872 there was not a single double furrow plough returned. At the present time there are 333, beside 12 treble furrow.

^{*} Since this was written the returns for Victoria have come to hand, showing an average for that Colony for the year ended 31 March last, per acre, of Wheat, 9.95; Oats, 17.61 bushels; Potatoes, 2.79; Hay, 1.20 tons.

Comparing the number of Live Stock returned for the last two years, we find an Live Stock, increase only in Horses, Mules, and Pigs. In other animals the number had diminished. pp. 170-1.

Of horses there were 24,593 in March, 1880, and 25,267, or 674 more, in 1881; of horned cattle 129,317 in 1880, and 127,187 in 1881,—the decrease being 2130; of sheep 1,835,970 in 1880, and 1,783,611 in the present year,—the decrease being 52,359. Goats numbered 2278 in 1880, and 1748, or 530 less, in 1881; mules 6, or 2 more, in the latter year; asses 5, or 6 less; and pigs 48,029, or 9419 more.

During the year 1880 the imports of Live Stock were—cattle, 1708 head; sheep, 11,193; pigs, 700; and horses, 29. The exports were—horses, 101; sheep (for breeding purposes), 385; goats, 52; and pigs, 83. On the cattle imported there was an increase, as regards the previous year, of 232; and on the sheep a decrease of 1939.

There were slaughtered at the public slaughter-houses at Hobart and Launceston (no means exist of ascertaining the number in the country districts) in 1880, sheep and lambs, 89,203; horned cattle, 8319; pigs, 4740. The sheep were 4968 less than in 1879, the cattle 235 more, and the pigs 228 less.

Tasmanian-bred sheep continue to be held in much repute in the Australian Colonies for stud purposes. It is stated that at a sale lately held at Sydney one ram, seven years old, which in 1874 brought 680 guineas, again changed hands for 604 guineas. One lot of 21 rams ranged from 123 to 201 guineas, the average being 107½ guineas; another of 20 averaged 66½ guineas; and a third of 21 ranged from 26 to 166 guineas, and averaged 65 guineas per head.

The Collectors' reports as to matters agricultural and pastoral in their several districts Collectors' speak of the injury to crops in various parts by drought, rust, and grub. The ravages of the last were so serious in the Selby District, that some persons are stated to have allowed their gardens to relapse into a state of nature. While some parts of the Colony were suffering from drought, in Glamorgan there was a superfluity of moisture, so that the crops could not be put in. In the Hamilton District the hops were attacked by the red spider, and some growers had their plants dug up in cousequence.

The Collectors at Bothwell and Green Ponds speak of the rabbits as very troublesome in spite of the efforts made to keep them down. At the former locality they are said to be increasing very fast.

The general tone of these reports is encouraging. We read in them of improvements in the breeding of stock, of the increasing use of manure—especially bone-dust, which is growing into favor in preference to guano—and machinery; and of the employment of underground drainage in two districts with the best results. The culture of flax was introduced at Campbell Town and Deloraine; and that of tobacco (presumably for human use) by Chinese at Invermay. Some interesting facts are given as to the beneficial effects of the employment of machinery. Thus the Collector for Clarence says:—"Double-furrow ploughs are extensively used by the farmers—an implement unheard of ten years ago in this district; likewise the reaper and binder. Only for these labor-saving implements and machines, a great deal of land would have to be laid down to grass." A curious consequences of the latter working the latter was the same than the same and the s quence of the use of the latter machine at Longford was, that the supply of labor for harvesting purposes last season was more than equal to the demand. All the Collectors who mention the reapers and binders speak of them in terms of unqualified commendation. With the double and treble furrow ploughs to turn up his land more expeditiously, and the means of reaping and binding his crops by machinery, and so diminishing the cost of production, the farmer is placed in a better position to meet the decline in prices which has taken place, and may in some cases be able to make as much profit as he did under a less economical mode of production when prices ruled higher.

Grazing is reported to be increasing in Selby, Emu Bay, Russell, and Portland. At the last named locality the proximity of the tin mines creates a good market for fat stock; and a considerable quantity of new land has in consequence been broken up during the past year, a large portion of which has been laid down in English grasses. There is said to have been a brisk demand for crown land in the vicinity of the Duck River and Montagu.

Fruit-growing in the Huon district is reported to be superseding the cultivation of cereals, the moist climate being better adapted for the former. The remarks as to the apple crop of last season are worth extracting. They are these:—"The apple crop is this season a grand success, the returns this year being estimated at 47,698 bushels, against 34,800 for last year, showing an increase of over 13,000 bushels. This, I firmly

believe, is very much under the actual produce, as there are yet thousands of bushels unpicked; and from my own personal inspection of several orchards, I feel confident there will at least be five or six thousand bushels more than stated, the orchards, especially in the bottom land, being literally packed, similar to a "string of onions."

VII.—LAW, CRIME, &c.

Commitments, p. 174.

The number of persons committed for trial in 1880 was 129, being 15 more than in 1879. The males were 108, the females 21. The offences against the person were 5 fewer than they were in 1879, but in those against property there was an increase of 20.

Indictments, &c., Superior Courts, ib.

In the Superior Courts, 107 persons were dealt with, or 2 more than in 1879; and 98 tried, of whom 73 were convicted, and 25 acquitted. Of these only 1 was indicted for murder; 6 were charged with indecent assaults on females; 1 with an unnatural crime; 16 with other, unspecified, offences against the person; 54 with offences against property; and 29 with miscellaneous offences. In 1879 the offences were these—murder and attempts, 6; concealment of birth, 2; rape, &c., 10; indecent assaults on females, 1; unnatural crimes, 3; all other offences against the person, 19; offences against property, 37; and miscellaneous, 27. The calendar of 1880 thus contrasts very favorably with that of the preceding year, there being a decrease of 5 on the murder cases; and 2 on the unnatural crimes and rape cases; concealment of birth, none; miscellaneous offences, 2 less. There was, however, an increase of 5 on the indecent assaults on females, and 17 on offences against property. Thus, while crime of the graver kinds was much less common in 1880 there was an increase in offences of a minor description. The increase on the whole number was at the rate of 1.9 per cent. only—less than the increase of the population.

Of the 98 cases tried in the superior Courts, 81 were felonies and 17 misdemeanors; the felonies being 6 more, and the misdemeanors 4 less than in 1879.

Executions, ib.

There were no executions in 1880. Only 3 persons have suffered the extreme penalty of the law in the last ten years.

Magisterial Cases, pp. 175-7. The cases brought before the inferior Courts in 1880 were 8336; 6598 being males, and 1738 being females. These were thus disposed of: convicted, including lunatics, 6685 (1377 resulting in orders for payment of money; the great majority being cases of non-payment of rates to the general government or local bodies); committed for trial, 117; discharged, 817; withdrawn, 717.

The 8336 cases were classified thus: offences against the person, 667; against property, 863; other offences, 6806.

The whole number of offences reported to the police was 8861, of which 525, from want of evidence or other causes, were not prosecuted.

Punishments were inflicted in 6406 cases, 258 offenders were convicted but not punished, and 21 persons were found to be insane.

On comparing the number of persons dealt with by the Magistrates, and also the number summarily convicted by them in the last five years, we find a decrease, notwithstanding the increase of population. On the whole number of persons reported to the police, the decrease was nearly 9 per cent.

Litigation, pp. 180-1.

The amount of Litigation in 1880 was somewhat in excess of that in the previous year. In the Supreme Court in its ordinary jurisdiction, 403 summonses were issued, against 461 in 1879; and 11 causes were tried, being three more than in the latter year Ten years previously 361 summonses were issued, and 17 causes were tried. In its "Small Debts" jurisdiction the Court had less business in 1880 than in 1879 or 1878. In 1880 the figures were—summonses issued, 92; causes tried, 62; amount claimed (in even pounds), £2009; amount recovered, £862. As compared with 1871, the increases were small, being—on summonses issued, 14; on causes tried, 10; on amount of claims, £966; on amount recovered, £54.

The Courts of Requests in 1880 issued 3967 summonses, tried 2652 cases, and awarded £14,227 out of £23,722 claimed. The increases, comparing the returns with those of 1879 were,—on Summonses, 541; on cases tried, 610; on amount claimed, £1987; on amount awarded, £2368. The increases on 1871—ten years since—were not very much greater. They were—on summonses, 548; on cases tried, 775; on amount

claimed, £6598; and on amount of verdicts, £5937. It will be observed, however, that there is a wide difference between the increases on numbers and amounts: for while the summonses were only 16 per cent. more, the amount of claims was greater by 38.53 per cent; but while in 1871 each case tried represented an average sum of about £9 2s. 5d. claimed and £4 8s. 3d. awarded, in 1880 these sums were £8 18s. 10d. and £5 7s. 3d. respectively. The proportion of awards to claims in 1880 was above the average: it is generally a little more than half; and this rule prevails with a regularity which is rather curious.

The serenity of the Supreme Court of Tasmania is not often disturbed by application Divorce, p. from the victims of unhappy matrimonial arrangements to be relieved of their burdens. 181. Whether it be that the course of true love runs smoothly here, or that the disappointed ones are more disposed to take the advice of a well-known moralist, and make the best of a bad bargain, or that they lack energy to make the attempt to free themselves from the galling yoke; -- whatever be the cause, there are few communities, probably, which trouble the law courts so little with their conjugal distresses as the people of this Three petitions (all for dissolution of marriage) were presented in 1879, and only one in 1880. Four decrees for dissolution of marriage, and one for alimony, were granted in 1880 (none in 1879): also protection orders two, against three in 1879.

The Probates and Letters of Administration issued in 1880 did not reach the number Probates, &c., or amount of those in the year before. In 1880 the number of Probates was 103, the ib. value of property £236,598; in 1879, number 108, value of property £254,162. Letters of Administration were—in 1880, 30, value of property £23,456; in 1879, 40, value of property £58,795.

The cases which came before the Bankruptcy Courts were not so numerous in 1880 Bankruptcies, as they were in 1879, though more so than in any other of the last ten years. The number p. 182. of petitions from creditors was 13 in 1880, against 14 in 1879; and the number of persons who voluntarily sought relief under the Bankruptcy Act, 49, against 52 in 1879.

The number of Mortgages under both systems registered in 1880 was 734; the Mortgages, amount, £373,562. As compared with the year immediately preceding there was an p. 182-3. increase of 13 in the number, but a decrease of £845 in the amount. The whole number of mortgages has increased in the last ten years from 393 to 734; the amount from £170,823 to £373,562. As regards the popularity of the two systems I find that while the value of mortgages under the old system has increased from £129,000 (omitting odd figures) to £246,000, that of mortgages under the new system has advanced from £41,000 to £127,000; the increase being in the former case 90.70 per cent., in the latter 209 75.

The business of the Lands' Titles Office in 1880 did not reach that of some former Lands' Titles Office, p. 1893. years. The number of transactions was 1220, naving been exceeded in the The value of land dealt with last year was £372,845, which was also less than in those than in the second The number of transactions was 1225, having been exceeded in 1879 and 1878. two years. The area of town and suburban land was 1339 acres, and was less than in any year since 1872; that of country land 118,729 acres, which was exceeded in five out of the last ten years. The applications for certificates of title received in 1880 were 117, being one more than in the preceding year; the grants registered 209, against 315; the transfers 329, against 385; and the certificates of title issued 498, against 515.

The Bills of Sale (including renewals) were also fewer than in 1879, though more Bills of Sale, erous than in any other year since they were recorded in the Statistics. The number P. 184. numerous than in any other year since they were recorded in the Statistics. The number in 1880 was 273, in 1879, 297, in 1878, 244; the amount in 1880, £86,865, in 1879, £97,141 in 1878, £74,774.

There was a very considerable decrease in the number of Grant Deeds enrolled in Grant Deeds, the past year. It stood at the same point in 1871, when it was 260; it increased by ib. rapid strides to the maximum, 650, in 1874, whence it has successively receded to where it was ten years since. The cause may probably be found in the tendency of agricultural pursuits to retrograde, and of mining to take their place.

The Inquests held in 1880 were 115, in 1879, 118. In 1871 they were 162. They Inquests, pp. have not been so few for many years, if ever. The verdicts returned were,—murder, 185-6. manslaughter, &c. 1; suicide, 6; accident, 58; want, cold, exposure, &c. 1; causes unspecified, 49. The habit, so common among juries, of returning vague and general verdicts, such as "natural causes," "the visitation of God," &c. should be discounted to the state of the state o tenanced whenever the true cause can be ascertained, as it generally can be from the testimony of the medical witnesses; and the press would be doing good service if it would pointedly direct the attention of juries and coroners to the subject. The verdict should state the specific cause, as stated by the medical man who makes the post mortem exami-

nation, such as "pneumonia," "bronchitis": if the heart be the part affected, "aneurism of the aorta," "pericarditis," "fatty degeneration," &c., and not merely "heart disease": if the brain, "hydrocephalus," "softening of the brain," &c., and not merely "brain disease"; and so for other organs. The present mode of returning verdicts in inquests on deaths is a relic of the dark ages, when vital science was utterly unknown, and ought at once to be abandoned in favour of one more in accordance with the present state of knowledge.

VIII.—Education, &c.

Public Schools, pp. 188-9.

The Schools under the Board of Education were the same in number (171) in both 1879 and 1880. In the latter year there were 12,286 distinct scholars on the rolls, the average number in attendance at school throughout the year being 8352, and the average daily attendance 6002. As compared with 1879, there were decreases on the corresponding numbers of 366, 168, and 201 respectively. The number of teachers and assistant teachers in 1880 was 120 male and 144 female, beside whom there were 23 male and 36 female monitors. There was, therefore, 1 male teacher or monitor to every 24 boys, and 1 female teacher or monitor to every 15 girls in average daily attendance.

The average daily number of children in attendance has increased by 815 in the last ten years, the increase being at the rate of 15.71 per cent., while the increase of population was at the rate of 12.18 per cent., so that the school attendance has more than overtaken the growth of the general population. But it was lower in 1880 than in 1879, and even in 1878; so also was the number of "distinct scholars on the rolls during the year"; while the "average number of scholars on the rolls during the year" was below that of 1879, but in excess of that of 1878.

The cost of these schools (including that of administration, £1983 10s. 3d) was £18,011, or £123 more than in 1879; school fees contributed in 1880 towards the cost of education £6254, or £106 more than in 1879. The whole amount provided for education of children in the primary schools by both the State and the parents was £24,265, the amount for each child, calculated on the average daily attendance, being £3 0s. $0\frac{1}{4}d$. from the public funds, and £1 0s. 10d. contributed by the parents, the total being £4 0s. $10\frac{1}{4}d$., against £3 17s. $5\frac{3}{4}d$ in 1879.

Council of Education, p. 190. The Tasmanian Council of Education expended £1856 16s. during the past year. Of this sum £62 12s. 3d. was required for cost of administration, £240 17s. 1d. for expenses connected with the Degree of Associate of Arts, £120 for minor scholarships, and £1433 6s. 8d. for the Tasmanian Scholarships.

Exhibitions, ib.

During the year 12 school exhibitions tenable at the superior schools were awarded, 2 to boys by the Council of Education, and 6 to boys and 4 to girls by the Board of Education. The payments to exhibitioners amounted to £702 19s. 3d., boarding allowance to country exhibitioners £400, and examiners fees £37 10s.; making a total of £1140 9s 3d. appropriated in the year for the purpose of maintaining the exhibitions awarded in 1880 and previous years.

The total number of Exhibitions established is 45.

Public Library, p. 191. The Public Library, Hobart had a revenue of £534 8s. 8d., and expended £532 18s. 1d. It had at the end of the year 8390 volumes of books, not including magazines bound, having added 182 works during the year. The number of visitors is stated to have been 25,721, against 29,537 in 1879. The mode of ascertaining the number of visits to this and similar institutions in this City is, however, very imperfect, as many persons pass in and out without leaving any record. If a record be kept at all, it should be done by a self-registering turnstile, such as is used for the purpose in other countries.

Friendly Societies, pp. 192-3. Forty-seven Friendly Societies filed returns in 1880, or three more than in 1879. These 47 Societies had 3937 members, or 170 less than in that year; their aggregate receipts were £13,282, or £1370 more; their expenditure was £10,416, or £419 more. Their capital, however, was £822 less, being £30,849 in 1879, and only £30,027 in 1880.

The proportion of receipts and capital, taking even pounds, to each lodge or district, and each member, in 1880 and ten years previously, is shown by the figures which follow.

While the receipts have increased in relation to both lodges and, in a small degree, to members, the capital, that is, the reserved funds, has diminished from £731 8s. $4\frac{3}{4}d$. to £638 17s. $2\frac{1}{4}d$. per lodge, and from £8 3s. $9\frac{1}{2}d$. to £7 12s. $1\frac{1}{2}d$.

Some of the societies still fail to file returns; and although the Statistical Returns Act requires them to do so under a penalty, there is no machinery in existence to take effectual measures to compel them to comply with the law.

To this failure to render their accounts is due this apparent decrease in the number of members in 1880. The following Lodges filed returns in 1879, but not in 1880:-

On the other hand three lodges, with 215 members, appear in the return in 1880, but not in 1879.

Taking these circumstances into account, the difference between the number of members of the lodges which filed accounts in both years was 314 in favour of 1880.

IX.—VITAL STATISTICS.

The births registered in 1880 were 3739, the largest number recorded in any year Births, pp. 446 Colony was founded. As between 1880 and 1879 the increase was 175. 193, 206. since the Colony was founded. As between 1880 and 1879 the increase was 175.

The rate per 1000 of living mean population was 32.90, and has not been exceeded since 1862.

Of the children whose births were registered, 1884 were males and 1855 females, the males being to the females in the proportion of 101 to 100. It is very seldom that the numbers of the sexes are so equal; there is generally an excess of boys to the extent of from 4 to 5 in 100.

The deaths of children under one year of age were to the births within the year in the proportion of 11.23 per cent. This is above the rates for 1879 and 1878, which were 10.77 and 10.71 respectively, but below those of 1875-7, which were 13.11, 16.53, and 11.37 per cent. respectively. The average rate for the five years 1869-73 was 9.45 per cent.

The number of deaths at all ages registered in the year 1880 was 1832, 1058 being Deaths, pp. males and 774 females, or 144 more than in the previous year. The rate of mortality 197-204, 206. was 16 17 per 1000 of mean population—higher than it was in 1878 and 1879. declined from 20 01 in 1875, which was the acme of an extraordinarily unhealthy period, to 15.18 in 1879, and seems to be rising again.

The proportion of deaths at each age to the whole number of deaths (1828) at known ages was,-

Comparing these numbers with those for 1879, it appears that in 1880 there was an increased relative mortality in all the periods except those relating to old people, beginning at 50, in which the rate was lower.

The percentage of the different classes of diseases to the whole number of specified diseases assigned as the cause of death in the last two years was as follows:-

There was thus an increase of 2.11 per cent. in the zymotic, and of 50, or one-half per cent., in the constitutional diseases. In the other three classes the percentage of mortality was lower in 1880.

In the deaths registered under the first or zymotic class, the increase was numerically 70, or 26 per cent. Diphtheria continued to spread, the victims being 90, or 29.47 per cent. more than in the year before. The following figures show the history of this fearful disease as far as I am able to trace it:—

Unless some extraordinary atmospheric agency be at work, there can be no doubt that if proper sanitary measures were taken—that is, if all the refuse, filth, slops, and soapy water were put upon the cultivated ground, instead of being allowed to run in the streets, or collect to fester and poison the air—this and all other filth-caused diseases might be stamped out; but as long as the present system of local management is allowed to continue, so long will these diseases continue to increase and multiply. Whooping-cough was also more fatal in 1880—the deaths being 33 more than in 1879. The deaths from dysentery and diarrhea together were 106, against 78 in 1879.

The second or Constitutional Class of diseases had an excess of 27 in 1880. Dropsy caused 11 more deaths; phthisis 16 more. Phthisis has not increased relatively to the population in the last ten years, although the number of deaths last year was greater by 36 than in the year before.

Diseases of the Local Class were 54 in excess. The nervous affections were 38 more, the increase being in epilepsy, convulsions, and other cognate maladies. The cases of epilepsy were unusually numerous, being 13, the highest number for at least thirteen years back. This disease showed a marked and continuous decline till 1879, when there was only one death caused by it. The sudden rise to 13 is therefore remarkable. Heart affections were less fatal in 1880 than in 1879; those of the respiratory system more so—the deaths being 44 in excess. The increases were—bronchitis, 32; pleurisy, 4; pneumonia, 6; asthma, 6; and unspecified lung diseases, 2. Diseases of the digestive organs were 10 in excess; while those of the urinary organs were 17 fewer.

Developmental diseases were 3 less; those of children being fewer by 19; those of old people by 1. Deaths from child-birth were, however, 7 more; and from atrophy and debility 10 more.

Under the "Violent" Class, deaths from accidental causes were 4 more; those from suicide (8), were 3 more; while there was only 1 case of murder or manslaughter, being 1 less.

Of single diseases, old age was as usual the first—longo intervallo; phthisis second; heart disease third; convulsions fourth; diphtheria fifth; diarrhea sixth; bronchitis seventh; and pneumonia eighth. In 1879 diphtheria was eighth in order, with cancer. It will be observed that this insidious foe has made a bold and distinct advance during the year. He has never come among the eight most fatal diseases before.

In the General Hospitals were treated during the year 1630 cases of in-patients, the deaths being 163, or exactly 10 per cent. of the cases. The cases were 8 fewer than in 1879, but the deaths 7 more, and the mortality therefore greater. The rate was

The mortality at the Hospital, Hobart, thus appears to have been greater in 1880, while at the Launceston Hospital the case was reversed.

The difference in the mortality at the two places is very serious, being over 22 per cent. in 1880, and 77 per cent. in 1879.

The cases of typhoid and other fevers of low type increased from 24 in 1879 to 57 in 1880, and the deaths from 4 to 9. Cancer cases increased from 38 to 41; diseases of the respiratory system from 132 to 158, the deaths, however, being 2 less; those of the digestive organs from 90 to 99, and the deaths from 10 to 15.

The Secretary to the General Hospital, Hobart, has kindly furnished me with a nosological return of cases of out-patients treated at that Institution during the past year. I was unable to obtain a similar return from the Hospital at Launceston. As to this return of out-patients at Hobart, I will make only one remark, in connection with what has been said before, as to the increase of diphtheria. Among the out-door patients at Hobart there were 33 cases of this fearful disease, and 39 cases (9 more than 1879) were treated in-doors; so that we have a record of 72 cases altogether dealt with, exclusive of out-door patients at Launceston, and (if any) at Campbell Town.

The rates of sickness and mortality in 1880 at the pauper establishments, in proportion to each 100 inmates maintained throughout the year, are shown below.

Why is there so great an excess on the deaths of male lunatics at New Norfolk, and in those of female prisoners in the Gaol at Launceston? The reason is not obvious, but it was not any accidental peculiarity of the year 1880, the rates of mortality in 1879 bearing pretty nearly the same relative proportions.

Marriages, pp. 204-5. The number of marriages registered in 1880 was 840, being 36 more than in 1879: in 1878 it was 866: but with that exception, it has not been so high in any other year of the decennium. In 1871 it was only 598, so that it has increased since that time by 40 per cent. the rate per 1000 of population having increased from 5.90 to 7.39.

Vaccination, p. 206.

Only 412 persons were vaccinated during the year 1880; 406 of the operations being successful. In view of the appearance of small-pox at Sydney, and the possibility of its introduction thence into this colony, the subject of vaccination becomes of more than ordinary importance.

X.-MISCELLANEOUS.

Political Franchise, p. 212. The returns relating to the Political Franchise show that the number of electors for the Legislative Council on the rolls before the last revision in the early part of the present year was 3128, and that in the process of revision 231 names were struck off, and 366 added, leaving 3263 on the rolls after revision, the gain by excess of names added over those struck off, being 135. The percentage of votes recorded at last contested elections for Members of the Council ranged from 50 to 78 22, the mean for all the districts for which returns have been obtained being 1341 votes polled out of 1937 on the rolls, which is equal to 69 23 per cent.

For the House of Assembly the number of electors before revision was 15,648: 2536 names were struck off, and 2433 added, leaving 15,545 on the revised rolls. There was thus a reduction of 103 in the number of electors. The deficiency is probably to be accounted for by the migration of men to the mining districts, and consequent disqualification through change of residence, and ceasing to occupy dwellings of the prescribed annual value.

Main Line Railway, p. 214. The return of the working of the Main Line Railway shows the receipts from all sources from the first complete year, and the increases on each year, to have been as follows:—

The loss on working, which in 1877 was £11,687, in 1880 was reduced to £851. If the same progress continues, the balance in the present year would be on the side of receipts.

The number of passengers carried increased continuously from 69,621 in 1877 to 163,454 in 1880; the tonnage of goods from 15,154 to 25,353. The conveyance of live stock has not increased in the same proportion, the number of trucks forwarded being—in 1877, 1027; in 1878, 1416; in 1879, 1402; and in 1880, 1215. The number of train miles run increased from 240,183 in 1877 to 296,472 in 1880, and the average mileage per mile open from 1806 to 2229.

The facts contained in this volume, which have been briefly summarised in the preceding pages, give evidence that the improvement in the material condition of the Colony which began some years ago, continued to operate in 1880; and the latest accounts of the capabilities for mining purposes of the country in the vicinity of Mount Heemskirk, justify the expectation that a considerable population will soon be established on the Western Coast, and that new sources of wealth, and a new market for produce, will thus be opened.

The revival of trade in other countries must also conduce to the prosperity of Tasmania, by increasing the demand for wool and tin and such other productions as this Colony has to offer in exchange for their commodities. Of this revival, Mr. R. Giffen, of the Statistical Department of the Board of Trade, in reviewing the "Financial and Commercial History of 1880," thus speaks:—

"There has been much activity in business and in the money market, as well as on the Stock Exchange, but it has been for the most part of a quiet and steady kind, and there has been little to attract outside attention. The annals are consequently dull, but the year is the most satisfactory that has been known in trade since 1872.

"All the facts and deductions point to a continuance of the improvement which has begun. The facts—that so many trades are better, that a stimulus is given to production in all directions, that the harvest failure is really not of a kind to affect prejudicially the general movement, as it has not, in fact, prevented a start upwards, and that specially the improvement in India and America continues to affect us most favourably—all point to the one conclusion that the revival of trade is strong and genuine, and must be upheld by the causes which have set it in motion; for how long a period it is impossible to say beforehand, but probably for no inccnsiderable time. The orders booked in almost every trade, it is believed, will carry us a great way through the present year. We may also believe, according to past experience, that such a movement once started will go on augmenting, will extend from one trade to another, and will be strengthened by incessant action and reaction. No one in such a matter should be over confident, knowing what a part is played by the unforseen in human affairs; but the present is a time for hope, and a cheerful feeling is no unimportant factor in producing the good trade that is hoped for. The revival has given confidence, and enriched the leading capitalists and speculators—the people who direct production. Such a stimulus once given will last a long time.

"Looking forward to the course of business in the year now current [1881], we may also repeat

"Looking forward to the course of business in the year now current [1881], we may also repeat once more the language we used a year ago in anticipation of 1880. Just because business has improved and has gone on augmenting all through the year, we may expect the augmentation, barring accidents, to continue and increase. The stone once set in motion keeps rolling, gathering new force until some accident happens, such as is sure, sooner or later, to happen when inflation sets in. We should now anticipate, moreover, that the momentum will be greater than it was a year ago. The profits of trade have been greater than they were at the end of 1879; the tone of business circulars, especially in the iron trades, is stronger and more cheerful; business has advanced so much that already there are many signs of a rise in wages and prices, of which condition one or two strikes are symptoms, and not more than symptoms. The one doubtful point, especially in the iron trade, has lately been whether production was not getting to be considerably in excess of consumption; but the better opinion, it will be seen from the trade circulars, is decidedly to the effect that, large as the production now is, consumption is fast overtaking it. With good credit and an increasing disposition to invest in fixed works the demand for iron and other instrumental articles appears, in fact, likely to increase almost indefinitely. All this means a great increase in general purchasing power throughout the world, by which almost every trade will benefit.

"We may sum up very briefly the conclusions of this long review. The year 1880 has been very

"We may sum up very briefly the conclusions of this long review. The year 1880 has been very prosperous as the first after a long period of depression, during which the employment of the industrial machine has increased without a sensible alteration of the condition of cheapness so essential to the profit of the capitalist. To all appearance the conditions of prosperous trade remain, and the year 1881, according to former experience, should be even more prosperous than its predecessor."*

In calculating the above averages, fractional parts of the acreage and produce have been taken into account. The general average has been found by dividing the total yield by the total acreage, and not by taking the sum and mean of the averages.

BOTHWELL.

I HAVE the honor to enclose Stock and Crop Returns, which have been prepared with care, and will, I trust, be found correct.

There are no improvements in the mode of cultivation; in fact, the District being chiefly pastoral, little or no interest is taken in any other pursuit.

Rabbits are getting very numerous; and although the sheep-owners and others are trying all they can to keep them down, still they are increasing very fast.

CAMPBELL TOWN.

I have the honor to transmit herewith, in connection with the Agricultural and Live Stock Returns for the year ending 31st March, 1881, 1. Form A. 2. Form B. 3. Machinery; and to report thereon as follows:—

- 1. New Productions.—There is nothing to note under this, except a small quantity of flax seed grown, I believe, for the first time in this Municipality.
- 2. Improvements in Mode of Cultivation, Rotation of Crops, Fallowing, Use of Manures.—Nothing whatever to note under this head.
 - 3. Drainage, &c.—The same remark applies to this.
- 4. Machinery and Farm Implements.—One Reaper and Binder has been brought into use, greatly to the satisfaction of the owner.
- 5. Improvements in Breed of Live Stock, Getting up Wool, &c.—Improvements in breeding are still carried on most profitably by a few sheep-owners.

The large stock-holders are mostly shearing in the grease. Washing in warm water seems to have been entirely abandoned.

CARNARVON.

I HAVE the honor to inform you that as this is the first year that Stock and Crop Returns have been prepared HAVE the honor to inform you that as this is the first year that Stock and Crop Returns have been prepared since it was formed into a free settlement, there is, as yet, but little agricultural improvement in this District. There are 30 persons preparing about 250 acres of land for crops for the ensuing year. There is a complete absence of all agricultural machinery, with the exception of a one-horse power threshing-machine; but, no doubt, as the population keeps increasing the improvements will also increase. There is very little manure used yet, except on some old land at Saltwater River. The improvements in the breed of stock are not, as yet, of a high standing, and no care is taken in getting up wool. There is a quantity of timber being cut for sale and removed to Hobart.

CLARENCE.

THERE are no new productions this year. The improvements in the mode of cultivation are not great. In the rotation of crops little or nothing is done; but fallowing and the use of the best manures available are readily

There is no ground under-drained in the District, as far as I can learn.

Double-furrow ploughs are extensively used by the farmers, an implement unheard of ten years ago in this crict; likewise the reaper and binder. Only for these labour-saving implements and machines, a great deal of District; likewise the reaper and binder. land would have to be laid down to grass.

DELORAINE.

WITH the exception of flax, there have been no new productions.

In the grain crops I have to report a decrease in wheat, barley, oats, and pease. The decrease in the yield of grain was owing to the dryness of the season, and rust, which did great damage to the wheat crop. Potatoes also suffered from the dry season.

There is an increase in sheep, horses, and pigs, and a decrease in cattle, owing to the increase of sheep, and no improvement in the breed since last year.

There is an increase in apples and pears; but the grub is very destructive.

In machinery several reaper and binder machines have been purchased, and have done their work well, and saved a great deal of labour.

In forwarding Agricultural and Live Stock Returns for this District for the year 1881, I beg leave to remark that farmers have turned their attention more to grazing than agriculture, therefore the number of cattle and sheep have increased. The acreage of permanent artificial grass land has also greatly increased from that of last year. A larger acreage of wheat crops was sown, but the yield has been very poor owing to rust, and many farmers have not taken the trouble to reap the crops. A large quantity of grass seed was also destroyed by the caterpillar.

GEORGE TOWN.

In forwarding the Stock and Crop Returns for the year ending 31st March, 1881, and in comparing the same with the returns of last year, I find a considerable decrease in stock, except horses and pigs; also a decrease in crops, except the acreage under green forage. The whole of the district being a goldfield the inhabitants have mainly turned their attention to that pursuit.

GLAMORGAN.

I HAVE the honor to report that no new productions have been grown during the past year, neither is there any difference in the mode of cultivating the land.

The new farm implements of any consequence consist of a steam-thresher, two strippers, and a three-furrow plough, all of which have given satisfaction.

Attention is paid to the class of merino sheep kept. The draught horse stock, 1881, are reported as the best lot of foals bred in Glamorgan for a number of years.

A great decrease will be noticed in the general produce of cereals, root, and fruit crops between 1880 and 1881, due to the exceeding wetness of last winter, which prevented crops being sown at the proper time, neither could the land be properly prepared to receive the seed.

GREEN PONDS.

THERE is not so much land in cultivation this year as there was last year by 567 acres. In consequence of the dry season crops are very poor, and the rabbits are as numerous as ever, and extend all over the District. There is nothing new to bring under your notice, with the exception of Messrs. Jas. Hadden and D. Reynolds bringing to the District two new reapers and binders.

HAMILTON.

I TRANSMIT to you the Stock and Crop Returns, which have been prepared with great care, and which, I trust, you will find correct.

This being a large pastoral district, not much interest is taken in agricultural pursuits.

The acreage and yield of all grain crops this year is far below that of last year.

There is also a decrease in the return of hops, owing, I may say, to two causes, viz.—the long drought experienced this season, and the visitation of the red spider to the hop-grounds last year, damaging and causing the sample of hops to be inferior to what it would otherwise have been, thus disheartening the growers, some of whom have had their hops dug up.

The improvement in the breed of live stock and getting up wool stands the same.

Gold having been recently discovered in the New Country, locality of Lake St. Clair, hopes are entertained that the District is likely to become a mineral one; and prospectors are now in the locality testing the richness

I have nothing further to report, there being no improvements in the District since last returns.

HUON.

In cereals the acreage shows a decided decrease. This is, I believe, accounted for by the fact that settlers in the District have for some years past turned their attention to fruit-growing, the climate of the Huon being, to some extent, unsuitable for the growth of wheat, &c.

The apple crop is this season a grand success, the returns this year being estimated at 47,698 bushels, against 34,800 for last year, showing an increase of over 13,000 bushels. This, I firmly believe, is very much under the actual produce, as there are yet thousands of bushels unpicked; and, from my own personal inspection of several orchards, I feel confident there will at least be five or six thousand bushels more than stated, the orchards, especially in the bottom land, being literally "packed" similar to a "string of onions."

KINGBOROUGH.

In reporting upon the agricultural, pastoral, and live stock aspects of the District, I respectfully beg to state as follows:—

1st. That there have been no new productions.

2nd. That there have been no improvements in the mode of cultivation. Rotation cropping is not practised.

3rd. That underground drainage is not practised, and fallowing is very little better. The principal manures used are farm-yard collected about the homesteads, and bone-dust, the latter by only a few. A few last year experimented on fish (shark) manure, which is spoken very highly of by those who used it.

4th. That there have been no improved kinds of machinery or farming implements that I am aware of, nor any increase in the employment of labour.

5th. That there have been no improvements in the breed of stock, nor in the mode of getting up wool.

6th. That, on comparing the statistical information collected this year with that of last, I find that there is a decrease in both the acreage and produce, more particularly so in the latter, except apples, pears, and currants, which may be attributed to the long drought. Dairy farming and soft fruit growing seem to receive more attention in this District than anything else. There is also a decrease in stock, excepting sheep and pigs.

The returns herewith have received as much attention from the Collectors as it was possible to bestow upon them.

LAUNCESTON (SELBY.)

I HAVE the honor to forward herewith Agricultural and Live Stock Returns for Selby and Launceston for the year ending 31st March, 1881.

The only new industry introduced during the year has been tobacco; this has been grown at Invermay, in the vicinity of Launceston, by Chinese.

The area under crop this year is less than that of last (except potatoes), and the average return per acre much less; this latter is accounted for by the dry season, and rust.

In apples and pears the return is very small, owing to the ravages of the grub. The area is also less than last year in gardens, several persons having allowed their gardens to relapse into a state of nature through the grub.

There is a large increase in English grass; this accounts for the decrease in the number of acres under crop, several settlers, in view of the price of grain, &c., preferring pastoral to agricultural pursuits; this is also shown by the increase in cattle, sheep, and pigs. There is a small decrease in horses.

No new improvement in machinery has been introduced during the year. Guano and bone-dust are used in many instances on the old lands in the District, but stable manure is at all times used when procurable, particularly in the vicinity of Launceston.

LONGFORD.

No change in the mode of cultivation has come under my observation since forwarding last year's returns. The same may be said with respect to any new productions.

Breeding of stock, getting up of wool, &c., same as hitherto.

The supply of labour this season was plentiful, more than required, owing to the increasing rise of the reaper and string binder, which is in great favour with the farmers of this district. I may add, that the long and continued drought has materially affected the yield of the various crops throughout the district, as you will observe, compared with last year's returns.

NEW NORFOLK.

I HAVE the honor to forward Agricultural and Live Stock Returns for the Municipality of New Norfolk for the year ended 31st March, 1881. They have been carefully collected and compiled, and will, I trust, be found correct.

There are no new productions, and very little improvement visible in the mode of cultivation. Systematic rotation of crops is the exception. Fallowing is general on a few farms.

Manures are extensively used by the hop growers and some of the more advanced farmers.

Drainage has been done in a few cases with very satisfactory results, and is likely to become more general.

One three-furrow plough has been introduced, and an increase in the number of double-furrow ones.

I have nothing to record on the breeding of live stock and getting up of wool.

The season has been unfavourable for root crops, in some instances being almost a total failure, the result of continued dry weather.

The sample of hops is very good, but the produce per acre is much below the average of former years. Taken as a whole the season has been one of light crops.

PORTLAND.

NOTHING new has been introduced in the mode of cultivation during the year.

There has been a slight increase in grain and potatoes, and a falling off in hay.

The fattening of stock, for which a ready sale is found at the tin mines, and dairy farming, appears to prove more remunerative to the farmers than grain growing.

There have been no new productions during the year.

A considerable quantity of new land has been broken up since my last return, and a large portion laid down in English grasses.

PORT SORELL.

In forwarding you the Agricultural and Live Stock Returns for the District of Port Sorell for the year ended 31st March, 1881, which, I trust, you will find correct, I would beg to call your attention to the great decrease in the yield of produce (10,031 bushels), and to the increase in the acreage (3736) in cultivation, as compared with last year's statistics. The decrease in produce I attribute to the long drought we have had, which extended over a period of four months, and also to the rust in wheat.

You will also perceive that there is an increase in live stock, as follows:—Horned cattle, 636*; pigs, 582; and goats, 22: a decrease in horses of 45, and sheep, 116. RICHARD DRISCOLL, Collector.

ROSS.

THIS District is almost exclusively pastoral. The grain crops show a decrease as compared with those of last year, the season in this locality not being a favourable one.

The Stock Returns show an increase in horses and cattle on last year. In sheep there is very little difference.

Many of the large flock-holders in this District now shear in the grease.

No new productions or improved kinds of machinery brought into use.

RUSSELL.

- 1. New productions, none.
- 2. Little change is apparent in mode of cultivation; and only in one instance is there any attempt at systematic rotation of cropping. Bone-dust is the manure most in favour, and is superseding guano in the estimation of farmers, who consider the former most lasting in its effects.
- 3. Drainage is not much understood, and but little attention is paid to what would materially improve the heavy soils. The little done in underground draining has been productive of such marked results that many will, doubtless, follow the course which has proved so beneficial to their neighbours.
 - 4. Nothing in raising stock or preparation of wool calls for special notice.

The area of land in cultivation and laid down in permanent artificial grasses shows a slight increase. The drought in the earlier part of the season affected the crops on the Peninsula, both grain and potatoes being exceedingly poor. On forest farms, where crops are later the potatoes are of good quality and fair yield.

The few engaged in pastoral pursuits seem to do best; and the unremunerative prices offering for all kinds of produce will cause many to try sheep-farming on a small scale. On the old farms such a change should benefit lands impoverished by long-continued cropping.

. Despite prospects so discouraging to agriculturists, a considerable quantity of Crown land has been applied for in the vicinity of Duck River and Montagu.

SORELL.

In the District of Sorell I have frequently had to beg a dozen times, for weeks and occasionally for months, for information which, with a little trouble, could be supplied in a quarter of an hour; and it was not until a week back that I was enabled to procure the returns of the largest wheat grower in the District. Nor was this a solitary case. And to this cause, rather than to the laziness or incompetency of Collectors, may be fairly attributed the delay in the completion and publication of the agricultural statistics of Tasmania.

The Sorell agricultural returns for 1881 are very discouraging. The wheat crop is but very little over a third of that of the preceding year, when 68,316 bushels were raised, as against 24,630 for 1881. Barley, peas, beans, and hay have not reached more than the half of the 1880 yield, whilst potatoes and oats have not turned out a quarter so large. The land under cultivation was less by 3940 acres than in 1880.

This falling off has arisen from a twofold cause. In the first place, the enormous yield of 1880 so glutted the market that prices were reduced below the cost of production, and farmers, in many cases, preferred letting their land rest to growing and selling at a loss. In the next place, the drought and long-continued winds so affected the crops that many of them were not worth cutting. To these two causes may be fairly attributed the striking difference between the Sorell crops of 1880 and 1881.

The orchards of Sorell were, in years gone by, a credit to the District, and a source of profit to their owners; but, when the acreage is reduced to 64 acres, and the yield is limited to 247 bushels of apples and 153 bushels of pears, it too sadly indicates that the prolific orchards of Sorell have ceased to flourish. The cause is easily found—neglect, and blight.

SPRING BAY.

I have the honor to submit to you the following report on the state and prospects of Agricultural and Pastoral pursuits in the Municipality of Spring Bay.

- 1st. New productions.--None in the district.
- 2nd. Improvements in cultivation, &c.—The manures generally used by farmers are bone-dust and sea-weed. There is an increase in the return of fallow land.
 - 3rd. No underground drainage done.
- 4th. There are two reapers and binders now in the district, and the owners of them speak in high terms of the excellent manner in which the machines perform the work.
 - 5th. There is a steady improvement in the breed of sheep and cattle.

WESTBURY.

- 1. There are no new productions.
- 2. There is no change in the mode of cultivation.
- 3. There is very little drainage, with exception of open drains.
- 4. The reaper and binder is in general use in this district, thereby dispensing with a great deal of manual labour.
- 5. There is no particular improvement to notice in the breed of stock, &c.

There is a decrease of 31,717 bushels of wheat, compared with last year's yield; in oats there is a decrease of 87,271 bushels. To account for this decrease, grain growing has not been paying the farmer: still there is an increase in the land under crop.

Sheep, cattle, and horses are about the same as last year. Pigs are more numerous; there is an increase of 1352 in that class.

There appears to be a slight decrease of about 2000 sheep, which may be accounted for by two large sales of sheep taking place in the district, and the purchase of sheep for the adjoining districts. Farming in this and adjoining districts is very unremunerative at present. For years grain growing has not paid. The agricultural interests require fostering and helping in every possible way.
