ANNUAL REPORT of the NEW TOWN CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS for the Year 1880.

Charitable Institution, New Town, 21st February, 1881.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to present the Annual Report of the New Town Charitable Institutions for the year 1880.

For the year 1879 I submitted separate Reports for each division of the Charitable Institutions under my supervision ; but during the year 1880 the expenditure of the Male and Female Divisions at New Town has been amalgamated, thereby considerably reducing the cost per head.

During the year a very pleasing addition has been made for the comfort of the invalids at New Town,—viz., the establishment of a Library and Reading Room,—which, judging by the regular attendance of inmates, is thoroughly appreciated. I have particularly to thank Mr. S. W. Westbrook, Messrs. Walch & Sons, Mr. T. L. Hood, and many kind friends of the Institution for their liberality in supplying books and papers, and also His Excellency Sir J. H. Lefroy for his donation of dominoes, draughts, and papers.

The water supply of the New Town Institution frequently causes anxiety. During the dry seasons I have been obliged to use the greatest economy, and for days compelled to suspend all bathing, &c., which, with such a large number of inmates, is a very serious consideration.

Twenty men are still stationed at the Cornelian Bay Cemetery to assist in cleaning the grounds. There are also thirteen men at the New Town Farm employed as milkmen, carters, and general farm labourers. The remainder are regularly classified by the Medical Officer, and those who are able to work are employed in accordance with his certificate.

The health of the inmates, considering that the majority are aged, has been better than might be expected. The death rate, as per Returns attached, requires no comment.

The conduct of the inmates (male and female), as a whole, deserves favourable mention. A few exceptions will always arise ; but, generally speaking, the tasks allotted to them are performed cheerfully.

The New Town Male Division, I regret to say, will require a considerable expenditure before it can be placed in that state of repair which should be maintained ; yet, even with the limited funds at my disposal (after defraying the expense attached to repairing the Female Divisions), and with some valuable assistance received from a few inmates, I have materially improved the state of the buildings, and hope, by a judicious expenditure of the amount voted for repairs for the year 1881, to be able to report more favourably in my next. The Female Division has been thoroughly renovated and is now in a satisfactory state of repair. I do not hesitate to report that it will compare favourably with any similar Institution in the Colonies for comfort, cleanliness, and appearance.

The Brickfields branch, considering the age of the buildings, is in as fair state of repair as possible. The new kitchen has been taken into use, and answers its purpose well.

Since the opening of the New Town Charitable Institution the number of inmates at this Depôt has been considerably reduced, and the majority of those located there are either cripples or unable to work ; I have not had, therefore, sufficient labour at my disposal to continue the improvements in Upper Park-street.

The inmates of both sexes have been regularly and punctually visited by the Ministers of their denominations. Ladies and laymen have also been frequent in their attendance.

The Roman Catholic body having erected a church at New Town, the large room formerly occupied by them for religious purposes has now been added to the Hospital accommodation, and one of the wards, formerly used for the sick, has been partitioned off, thus forming a convenient suit of offices for the conduct of business. These alterations are a great improvement, and add very much to the comfort of the inmates and to the management.

In the staff of officers a change has taken place owing to the death of Mr. Head Warder Axtell, and his position has been refilled by the appointment of Mr. Simon Murphy. The officers are deserving of great commendation for their zeal and devotion to their duties.
