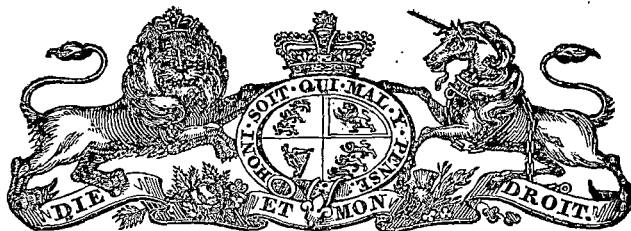

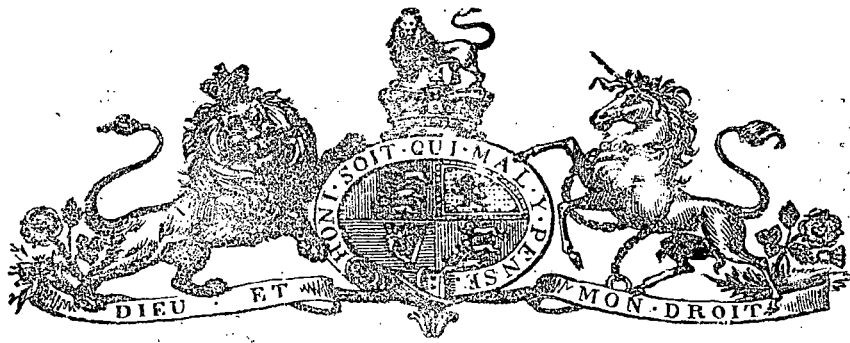

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY.

THE number of Patients in the Hospital at the close of 1875 again shows a slight decrease below that of the previous year.

The general health of the inmates, and the result of their treatment, have not been less satisfactory than in former years; while the order and quiet, by which the Institution has long been distinguished, with an almost entire absence of personal restraint, have been maintained unimpaired.

The cost of maintaining the Establishment has been slightly increased in consequence of some rise in the price of provisions, and has amounted to £7394, being at the rate of 1s. 6d. per diem for each Patient.

Of this amount the sum of £1326 8s. 0d. has been refunded by self-supporting Patients, to which a small sum from other sources, as shown in the Return, has been added.

The labour of the Patients on the farm and in the garden has, as usual, greatly contributed to reduce the cost of their maintenance,—the value of the milk produced during the year alone having exceeded £300.

A further very considerable saving of expenditure has been effected by the Patients and attendants in executing numerous important repairs on the premises.

The Buildings are generally in a satisfactory condition; but some repairs, which cannot be undertaken by the inmates, will shortly require the attention of the Department of Public Works.

For some years past a growing difficulty has been experienced in obtaining persons of suitable character and qualifications as attendants, both male and female, on whom so much of the efficiency of the Establishment and the comfort of the Patients depend, and in retaining in the service of the Institution those who have performed for various periods the duties of their office in a satisfactory manner and proved themselves deserving of confidence.

This difficulty the Commissioners believe can only be overcome by granting a reasonable increase of remuneration to the servants of the Hospital, such as has already been strongly pressed on the attention of the Government but has not yet been assented to.

The Commissioners desire again to place on record their warm approval of the manner in which the Superintendent and Medical Officer of the Institution has continued to perform the important duties of the office which he has now filled for a period of 20 years to their entire satisfaction.

With the general conduct of the officers and servants of the Hospital under his control during the past year the Superintendent speaks in approving terms.

## No. 5.

*RETURN of Work performed by Patients in co-operation with the Carpenter and Painter in the Hospital for Insane, New Norfolk, during the Year 1875.*

*New Work, Carpenter.*—Steps to barn verandah ; 2 cart wheels ; tank to workroom ; pigstye enlarged ; 6 covers to night-tubs ; frame for quilting rugs ; 2 12-ft. forms ; 2 covers to man-holes ; 2 step-ladders ; frames and dumb windows to lavatory and bath-room ; 2 seats to latrines ; 1 folding clothes-horse ; 1 shute for mill-race ; door frame and fixing, 6 and 7 ward ; 1 table, 10 feet, No. 6 ; frame for map ; 3 cells floored ; 3 wheels for barrows ; large wood squares for back windows and fixing ; bagatelle table covered ; new floor to private latrine ; sundry wood mauls, and handles for axes, mauls, rakes, mops, hay forks, &c. ; 17 coffins made.

*Bricklayer.*—Setting coppers, wash-house ; building fire-place for still ; building in fountain ; boys' chimney heightened ; drains throughout cleaned and repaired ; fire-places throughout.

*Repairs.*—Shingles sundry roofs ; sundry wheel-barrows, chairs, forms, tables, ladders, close stools, &c. ; frame to kitchen door ; steps to back verandah ; cart wheels, &c. ; wringing machine ; gates to new building and cells ; gates to ladies' cottage, and saddle-boards, flooring, new building ; window sashes ; gate, wash-house yard ; latrines, Male and Female Divisions ; horse stable ; drying frames, sundry ; wood boxes ; garden, farm, and home fences ; fences, Dr. Huston's quarters ; drains and covers throughout ; general repairs throughout the whole establishment.

*Plummer, Painter, and Glazier.*—Water pipes and taps throughout; No. 6 and 7 ward and front verandah; corridor, 15 rooms; 3 wards and passages in back Division; needle-room; 6 bed-rooms and passages; verandah and windows; 2 sub-matrons' quarters painted throughout; skylights and 101 windows repaired.

*Whitewashing and Colouring.*—14 rooms; 10 wards in back Division; cow-man's hut; 2 rooms, new building; large mess-room, females; roof of front verandah; needle-room and 6 bed-rooms; outside walls, back Division, pointed and coloured; all places throughout establishment where required.

*Distillation.*—3 gallons blue gum oil.
