

PETITION FROM LAUNCESTON IN FAVOUR OF THE SCHEME.

Laid upon the Table of the House of Assembly by Mr. Colonial Treasurer, and ordered to be printed, 20 September, 1864.



To the Honorable the President and the Members of the Legislative Council, in Parliament assembled.

RESPECTFULLY SHOWETH:

THAT your Petitioners regard with great satisfaction the adoption of the Scheme of "Reproductive Works" by the House of Assembly.

That that part of the Scheme referring to the Northern division of the Island,—viz. the formation of Roads to Ringarooma, Scott's Country, Bridport, and the Green's Creek, and Ulverstone Roads,—is of very considerable importance to the Northern Inhabitants; inasmuch as, by the proposed works, extensive tracts of rich agricultural land would be opened up,—to Launceston an outlet would be given to the countries lying to the North Coast,—and a strong inducement would be held out to industrious families to immigrate and secure a permanent home in the Colony.

Your Petitioners therefore humbly beg that your Honorable House would be pleased to give the Scheme of "Reproductive Works" your favourable consideration.
