



IMMIGRATION AGENT'S REPORT

FOR THE HALF YEAR ENDING 31 DECEMBER, 1859.

Presented by Mr. Colonial Treasurer, and ordered by the House to be printed, 2 August, 1860.

Sir,

I have the honor to submit the following Report on Immigration for the Half-year ended 31st December, 1859, with Tabular Returns appended, showing the number of Emigrants introduced at the public expense, the cost of their passages, their native countries and religions, occupations or callings, and also the condition of the several systems of Immigration under which they were introduced.

2. 711 Emigrants arrived during the Half-year; of which number 396 were landed at Hobart Town, and 315 at Launceston. The following are the ships by which they were introduced:—

To Hobart Town direct—Primula, Isles of the South, Percy, and Hooghly.

To Launceston direct—Suffolk, Heather Bell, Antipodes, and Broomielaw.

To Melbourne—(thence forwarded to Tasmania per steamers) Sir Wm. Ayre, Morning Light, Vater Smydt, Saldanha, Ida, Argonaut, Zambesia, Harmonides, David G. Fleming, Champion of the Seas, Greyhound, Ocean Chief, and Sussex.

The casualties during the passage were 6 births and 6 deaths.

- 3. The system of introducing Emigrants viâ Melbourne has been found to work advantageously to the holders of Bounty Tickets, who might otherwise experience delay in obtaining passages in ships coming direct to Tasmania; and, although unable to make a personal inspection as to the accommodation provided for the Emigrants by these vessels, I am satisfied, from their own statements on arrival, that their comforts had been well attended to during the voyage.
- 4. The Emigrants per Oriental and Hooghly were selected for general engagement in Tasmania by the Tasmanian Emigration Agency, London; and the single women, of whom there were 213, appear to be adapted to the requirements of the Colony, although in several cases an indisposition to settle down steadily to service evinced itself on first arrival. Of the above number 78 were forwarded to Launceston for engagement on the Northern side, nearly all of whom obtained service within a few days of arrival, and at wages in no way inferior to those obtained in 1858 and the first half of 1859. The demand on the Southern side was equally brisk.

A few married tradesmen, with their families, also arrived by these vessels.

Some difficulty was experienced in providing these people with suitable employment, on account of the want of demand for mechanical labour, which of course resulted in additional expense to the public. I would beg, therefore, to suggest that this class of Emigrants be omitted by the Tasmanian Agency, when making future selections for the Colony; the Bounty System, at present in force, being found to meet fully the demand for families and single men.

5. The Emigrants per "Broomielaw," introduced by the St. Andrew's Immigration Society, Launceston, are described by the Honorary Secretary, Mr. Corbett, as being "a most suitable class for the Colony, and, with a few exceptions, as having 'given satisfaction to their employers;' the mechanics, blacksmiths, and carpenters have gone out on weekly wages of from £2 10s. to £3 10s.;" and the following are the rates of wages per annum obtained by the agricultural labourers, &c. and domestic servants:—
