

ANNUAL REPORT for 1881.

Sir

In accordance with the Rules of the Hobart General Hospital, I have the honor to lay before you the following Annual Report, containing such tabulated and other information as will, I trust, fully exhibit the working of that Institution during the past year.

- 2. During the year the Board received the resignation of Major-General Irvine, and appointed W. H. Graham, Esq., to fill the vacancy.
- 3. Fifteen Board and sixty-five Committee meetings were held during the year, at all of which the attendance of Members was, without exception, good; while during the same period the Honorary Medical Staff made one thousand and four professional visits to the wards of the Hospital.
- 4. In the Annual Report for 1880 special reference was made to the very unsatisfactory condition of the old buildings connected with the Hospital, and the wretched accommodation these buildings afforded for the treatment of the sick, &c.
- I am glad now to be able to report that the grant voted by Parliament in 1880, for the extension and improvement of the Hospital will remedy the defects complained of; and the new Hospital now in course of erection for the treatment of infectious and other diseases will, when completed, place this Institution, as a General Hospital, in a far higher state of efficiency than heretofore, and consequently more in accordance with the sanitary requirements of the age.

The Quarters for the accommodation of the Officers of the Hospital, now in course of erection, will in a great measure remedy another defect long felt and often complained of, notwithstanding that the plan proposed to the Government is not being carried out in its entirety. An additional building as a residence for the Secretary was wanted, and will still have to be supplied, to complete the plan and meet the wants of the Hospital.

- 5. The annual cost of each occupied bed in 1878 was £82 14s. 5d.; in 1879, £72 13s. $6\frac{1}{4}d$.; in 1880, £64 6s. $0\frac{1}{4}d$.; and during the past year it has been £68 11s. 1d.
- 6. The number of Patients treated during 1881, and the diseases from which they suffered, have been tabulated, and will be found in Appendix A.
