TASMANIA.

PETITION AGAINST ADDITIONAL TAXATION

FROM THE DISTRICTS OF FRANKLIN AND KINGBOROUGH.

Presented by Dr. Crooke, and ordered by the House to be printed, 11 February, 1857.



To the Honourable the Members of the House of Assembly, in Parliament assembled.

The Petition of the undersigned Residents of the Districts of Franklin and Kingborough.

RESPECTFULLY SHOWETH:

THAT, in proportion to the population and their available resources, no people within the realms of the British Empire are so heavily taxed for the purposes of Government as those of Tasmania.

That the ordinary Annual Expenditure of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, including twenty-eight millions (£28,000,000) sterling of interest upon the National Debt, and the entire amount for all general and local assessments, appears from the most authentic sources to be sixty-nine millions (£69,000,000) sterling; which, raised among a people numbering twenty-eight millions (28,000,000), possessed of unrivalled agricultural, commercial, manufacturing, and mining resources, does not amount to two pounds ten shillings (£2 10s.) per head, whereas the seventy thousand (70,0(0) Inhabitants of this Colony, with scarcely any other resources but such as are supplied by a very limited portion of the soil, are rated, for the purposes of Government, at five pounds (£5) per head.

That, considering the extent to which the vast agricultural resources of the neighbouring Colonies have been recently developed,—the influence that development, rapidly increasing as it is, is certain to exercise upon the agricultural interests of Tasmania,—your Petitioners cannot view without alarm the attempt to increase, by taxing the necessaries of life, the expenses of cultivating a soil like theirs, which Nature has beset with many obstacles from which the rich arable prairies of Adelaide and Victoria are free.

That the proposed scheme of Taxation, if adopted, would increase the universally prevailing disposition of the industrious Labourers and Settlers to emigrate to the adjoining Colonies, where a much smaller proportion of their earnings would be exacted for the support of the State,—where the rewards of industry would be more certain, and where a far less expenditure of time, labour, and capital are required for the cultivation of the soil.

That to a retrenchment of the extravagant expenditure of the Government your Petitioners look for relief from the oppressive burthen of Taxation, against which the energies and industry of the Colonists are unable to contend; and, while fully alive to the necessity of upholding the credit of the Country, they believe that, considering the present depressed condition of every leading interest, the rapidly increasing distress of the Agricultural and other Settlers, as well as the growing anxiety of the industrious classes to emigrate, that the only means of upholding public credit is to reduce the Expenditure within the Revenue, and to avoid imposing new Taxes to meet the demands of an expenditure entirely disproportioned to the number and resources of the people.

That a Tax upon the importation of Cattle and Sheep is peculiarly objectionable to your Petitioners, a great portion of whom are dependent on the neighbouring Colonies for a market for their timber; for they cannot avoid foreseeing that retaliatory measures, affecting the staple export of the District, will be taken by the Parliaments and Governments of those Colonies interested in the export of Cattle and Sheep to Tasmania.

That, impressed with a belief that the system of Taxation as proposed by the Ministry is not only opposed to all the recognized principles of taxation, but calculated to aggravate the public distress, and finally to destroy public Credit, your Petitioners therefore pray your Honourable House to withhold its sanction from any scheme proposed with a view of increasing the existing Taxes, until it is first ascertained whether or not it is possible, without detriment to the "Public Service," to reduce the expenditure within the revenue.

And your Petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray, &c.
