



PETITION FROM THE FORTH.

Presented by Mr. Gibson, and ordered by the House to be printed, 29 August, 1859.



To the Honorable the House of Assembly of Tasmania, in Parliament assembled.

The Petition of the undersigned Inhabitants of the Forth.

RESPECTFULLY SHOWETH:

- 1. That your Petitioners are fully alive to the importance of true Religion, and earnestly desire its extension throughout the community.
- 2. That they believe that this will be best effected by leaving its support and diffusion exclusively to the spontaneous offerings of its professors, those who prize its sacred ordinances, appreciate its privileges, and are sensible of its solemn obligations.
- 3. That they believe the system at present pursued by the State of affording pecuniary aid to various religious bodies is productive of many evils, without a single advantage.
- 4. That the condition of the Public Finances is such that they ought to be at once relieved from a heavy annual charge, which can only be met by increased taxation.

Your Petitioners therefore pray your Honorable House to adopt such means as will relieve the Revenue of the Colony from all charges for Ecclesiastical purposes.
