

## CRIMINAL STATISTICS.

Laid upon the Table by Mr. Attorney-General, and ordered by the House to be printed, 21 August, 1860.



Office of Inspector of Police, 7th August, 1860.

SIR.

IT being perhaps desirable that the Government should, during the present Session of Parliament, be in possession of some Criminal Statistics of the Colony, I have prepared for your information comparative Returns of Crime reported to have been committed in the Rural Districts, and in the Municipalities of Hobart Town and Launceston, with the corresponding results, during the years 1858-9, which I have now the honor to enclose.

I should have wished these Returns to have embraced a period prior to my assuming my present office, but unfortunately I have not been able to procure reliable data from which to compile them.

It appears that in the year 1858 there were in the Rural Districts 595 indictable offences reported to the Police, for which 388 persons were apprehended, of whom 271 were committed; and in 1859 the number of such offences reported was 572, for which 382 persons were apprehended, of whom 289 were committed.

In the Municipality of Hobart Town in the year 1858, there were 211 indictable offences reported, for which 147 persons were apprehended, of whom 132 were committed; and in 1859 the number was 196, for which 143 persons were apprehended, of whom 132 were committed.

In the Municipality of Launceston the number of such offences reported in 1858 was 107, of which 96 persons were apprehended, of whom 72 were committed; and in the year 1859 there were 129 reported, for which 99 apprehensions were effected, and 53 persons com-

I regret I cannot report any material diminution of crime generally throughout the Territory. While on the one hand there has been a slight decrease in robberies, cattle-stealing, and burglary; rape, arson, and perjury have increased.

This may be fairly ascribed to the number of "habitual criminals" released from the Penal Settlement of Port Arthur, who form by far the majority of our crime committing population, and to the facilities the Colony affords to the perpetration of these offences.

I would observe that in the Colony the detection of crime bears a satisfactory comparison with that in many of the Counties in England in which the Police Force is of a very efficient character, and where the means of detecting by railway and telegraphic communication are so much more certain and effective; and when we look to the numerical strength of the Police force in the Rural Districts, the extent of country it is distributed over, and which it is called upon to protect, the facilities afforded by the geographical features of the Colony for the harboring and escape of Criminals, the easy means of disposal of stolen property, and the class of people amongst whom evidence is sought for, as well as the impossibility at times of even procuring a prosecitor, it is a matter for congratulation that detection follows commission of crime so often as it does.

I would also beg to enclose, for your information, a Return of the authorised strength of the Police Force in the Rural Districts for the years 1858-9; a Return of the amount of penalties paid to that Force during a similar period; one of property stolen and restored by the Police, together with a Return of indictable offences reported in several of the Counties in England, with the results, for the purpose of comparison.
