 - (1) Notes:—
 - (a) Master Builders of Tasmania held the 2022 Tasmanian Awards for Excellence on Saturday 15 October 2022, with 118 entries in 40 categories from projects across Tasmania; and
 - (b) these entries showcased Tasmania's outstanding efforts and high quality of the building and construction industry.

- (4) Congratulates all entrants for their important contribution to the building and construction industry in Tasmania. (25 October 2022)
- The Minister for State Development, Construction and Housing to move—That the House:
 - (1) Recognises:—
 - (a) that the first Longford Show was held on 4 November 1857 behind the Blenheim Inn, moving to an autumn show in 1858; and
 - (b) the Longford Show Committee, volunteers, sponsors, donors, and patrons who support this event and contribute to its ongoing success.
 - (2) Acknowledges the importance of the Longford Show as a traditional, grassroots agricultural show in the Lyons electorate that showcases some of the best agriculture in Tasmania.
 - (3) Notes that 2022's well-attended event showcased and promoted the local agricultural industries, featuring sheep judging, sheaf tossing, wood chopping, as well as fine local produce and entertainment.
 - (4) Congratulates the Longford Show Committee on putting together another fantastic showcase. (25 October 2022)

Ms *Dow* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that:—
 - (a) the first five years of a child's life are the most important in a child's development and the Child Health and Parenting Service (CHAPS) is a critical service families in Braddon rely on;
 - (b) important childhood developmental checks are being missed with the Liberal Government failing to fill a number of CHAPS vacancies in the North West;
 - (c) it is estimated there are currently 10 CHAPS vacancies on the North-West Coast with the service reported to be operating in escalation mode for the past five year;
 - (d) instead, parents are being offered telehealth appointments with only those at risk given priority for face to face assessments; and
 - (e) this means children under five are not receiving timely and important physical assessments for their developmental checks and parents may be at risk of postnatal depression if they are unable to access support services.
- (2) Calls on the Premier and Minister for Health, Hon. Jeremy Rockliff, MP, to outline his plan to fill these vacancies, as well as ensure the service's existing, dedicated staff are provided with the support and resources they need to do their important work. (25 October 2022)

Ms *Dow* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges that:—
 - (a) the closure of one lane on the Cam River Bridge due to flood damage has caused significant disruption to the NW community and economy;
 - (b) 18 thousand workers, students and commuters use the Cam River Bridge each day;
 - (c) small businesses and their workers on the Bass Highway have been severely impacted by the traffic queues and decrease in business caused by the lane closure;
 - (d) the Cam River Bridge is critical infrastructure, a major freight route and link to essential services that connects our community and economy;
 - (e) contractors on site are working around the clock to ensure both lanes on the bridge can open by the weekend and this House thanks them for their work; and
 - (f) traffic management continues to be an issue on the Bass Highway.
- (2) Notes that:-
 - (a) the Minister for Infrastructure and Transport, Hon. Michael Ferguson, MP and the Government have known of the issues with the Cam River Bridge for years but the Liberal Government has failed to come up with a contingency plan.;

- (b) in 2021, Labor announced it would build an additional bridge to ensure fourlane access across the Cam River; and
- (c) the Liberal Government has committed to building one new bridge with two lanes.
- (3) Calls on the Premier to commit to funding and building a second crossing across the Cam River. (25 October 2022)

Ms *Haddad* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes:—
 - (a) that Tasmania has the weakest electoral donation laws in the country;
 - (b) that without significant reform, a lack of transparency and accountability will continue to prevail in Tasmanian politics;
 - (c) that following the 2018 election, the Government committed to introducing electoral donation law reform but has not yet delivered on that promise;
 - (d) that draft legislation to modernise Tasmania's electoral laws was released for public comment on 24 August 2021, with a consultation period open until 28 September 2021;
 - (e) that two Bills were finally introduced in May 2022;
 - (f) that in August 2022 the Premier, Hon. Jeremy Rockliff, MP, failed to commit to debating the legislation, stating simply that "the Bill has been tabled"; and
 - (g) that in August 2022, the Attorney-General, Hon. Elise Archer, MP, stated in Parliament that "it is our expectation that we will be debating that this year".
- (2) Calls on the Government to bring on its legislation for debate in 2022 so Tasmania no longer has the weakest electoral laws in the country. (25 October 2022)

The Minister for Parks to move—That the House:—

- (1) Approves pursuant to section 18 of the *Nature Conservation Act 2002* (the Act) the draft proclamation tabled on 26 October 2022, made pursuant to section 11(2) of the Act, to reserve Future Potential Production Forest (FPPF) land in the Tasmanian Wilderness World Heritage Area (TWWHA), that is Crown land.
- (2) Recognises that these proclamations:—
 - (a) are being undertaken as a result of a process that began in 2011, where areas of Crown land adjacent to and outside of the then TWWHA boundary were identified for reservation and subsequently, as a result of a determination by the Australian Government in 2013, that the TWWHA boundary should be expanded to include these parcels of land;
 - (b) demonstrates through the reservation of these FPPF land parcels a delivery towards key recommendation 11, as outlined in the 2015 'International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN)/International Council on Monuments and Sites (ICOMOS) Reactive Monitoring Mission Report';
 - (c) delivers on a commitment made by the State Party (being the Australian Government) to the World Heritage Committee (WHC) that this land will be reserved and importantly, once approved by both Houses, is reported to the WHC as complete; and
 - (d) ensures that the FPPF land once reserved under 'The Nature Conservation Act 2002' (NCA), will result in the NCA, NPRMA and TWWHA Management Plan 2016 having statutory effect over the land. (26 October 2022)
