Notices of Motion

- 67 Ms *O'Byrne* to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Notes:—
 - (a) increasing community concern as a result of incidences in crime in the Launceston area;
 - (b) that according to the Tasmania Police Corporate performance reports since 2012 - 2013 the Northern district and in particular the Launceston District (compared to the other 12 police geographic divisions) has the highest victimization rates and also the numerically highest incidence of crime across many crime categories and associated decrease in clearance rates;
 - (c) with concern that the Government is using the reduction in incidences during COVID to suggest that the issue is being resolved despite the incidences in Launceston still being consistently higher in almost all categories.
 - (2) Commends the hard-working police officers and staff in the North who are continually under pressure and doing as much as possible to respond with clearly insufficient resources.
 - (3) Calls upon the Minister for Police, Fire and Emergency Management, Hon. Jacquie Petrusma MP to allocate additional resourcing urgently to the North and to commission work across Government to identify and address the underlying causal factors leading to the unacceptably high rates of victimisation and incidence of crime in Tasmania.  - (b) the Ride consisted of the Swarm riding 1,500 km around Tasmania stopping at regional communities and hosting fundraising events with Hobart band The Croon and sought to raise \$85,000 to purchase a modified van and wheelchair hoist to allow Eddie to be transported; and
 - (c) the target has been achieved and the additional funds will go to providing the additional supports that Eddie requires.
 - (2) Congratulates the Ride For Eddie Swarm; Andrew Colrain, Heidi Robnik, John Xintavelonis, John Davidson, Robert Bertoz and Colin Dean for their commitment and thanks all who have supported them and contributed to the fundraiser.
