129 Ms *Butler* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes:—
 - (a) concerns raised by a constituent in Lyons about the operation of Tasmania's Partition Act 1869 (the Act);
 - (b) that the Act is more than 150 years old and may not properly reflect modern farming, land ownership, agricultural production or regional communities;
 - (c) that concerns have been raised that the Act may allow a minority co-owner of land to seek the forced sale of an entire property, including productive family farms; and
 - (d) the case of Arundel Farm in the Derwent Valley, and the broader concern that productive Tasmanian farmland should not be placed at risk by outdated legal settings.
- (2) Acknowledges:—
 - (a) the importance of family farms to Tasmania's regional economy, food production, local jobs and community identity;
 - (b) the generations of Tasmanian farming families who have built, maintained and invested in productive agricultural land;
 - (c) that there must be a fair legal mechanism to resolve genuine disputes between co-owners of land; and
 - (d) that this mechanism should not enable unfair outcomes that place productive farms and regional communities at risk.
- (3) Calls on the Tasmanian Government to:—
 - (a) review and contemporise the Act; and
 - (b) consider reforms that would give courts greater discretion to prevent misuse of the Act, particularly where productive agricultural land is involved.
- (4) Recognises that Tasmania's laws should protect fairness between landowners while also safeguarding productive farmland, family farming businesses and regional communities. (18 August 2026)

131 Dr *Woodruff* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes:—
 - (a) the Australian Medical Association (AMA) Tasmania Briefing Paper, 'Antibiotic use in Tasmania Salmon Farming, Antimicrobial Resistance and Human Health';
 - (b) the Briefing Paper background statement that, "Antibiotic use in open marine aquaculture is well documented to carry risks of environmental persistence, development of resistant bacteria, and eventual spread of resistance genes into human, animal, and environmental microbiomes."; and
 - (c) its call for the precautionary principle to guide antibiotic use in aquaculture, noting that, "Deploying florfenicol in Tasmanian waters under emergency powers,

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without comprehensive assessment or monitoring, carries demonstrable public health and environmental risks”.

- (2) Recognises the AMA Tasmania has recommended:—
 - (a) the cessation of emergency antibiotic approvals pending full APVMA registration, including complete environmental risk assessment and public consultation;
 - (b) comprehensive baseline and ongoing monitoring of antibiotic residues, resistant bacteria, and resistance genes in water, sediments, and wild fish;
 - (c) mandatory and timely transparency on all antibiotic use in aquaculture, including in hatcheries;
 - (d) adoption of a “One Health” framework to ensure aquaculture decisions consider public health impacts and antibiotic microbial resistance risks;
 - (e) investment in alternative control measures, including vaccines, improved husbandry, and reduced stocking densities, to reduce dependence on antibiotics; and
 - (f) independent scientific oversight of any antibiotic use proposals, including peer review by environmental microbiologists and infectious disease specialists.
- (3) Calls on the Government to apply the precautionary principle to the use of florfenicol in Tasmanian waters, and to prioritise public and environmental health in line with the AMA Tasmania recommendations. (18 August 2026)

133 Ms Rosol to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes:—
 - (a) the National Disability Insurance Scheme Amendment (Securing the NDIS for Future Generations) Bill 2026 being debated in the Senate of the Parliament of Australia this week will result in more than 300,000 people being removed from or refused access to the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS); and
 - (b) that many Tasmanians will be among those removed from or refused access to the NDIS.
- (2) Recognises with alarm that the Federal Government’s NDIS cuts will have a devastating impact on Tasmanians living with disability and their families, including:—
 - (a) increased isolation and less ability to work or study due to cuts to Capacity Building and Social and Community Participation budgets;
 - (b) learning and development delays caused by reduced access to therapy; and
 - (c) an increasing burden of care falling to family members.
- (3) Considers that Foundational Support and Thriving Kids are insufficient to fully meet the needs of many people with disability, especially since neither have been developed prior to NDIS cuts.
- (4) Agrees that NDIS cuts will have a significant flow-on effect to Tasmanian services, placing increased pressure on health, education, child safety and justice services.
- (5) Condemns the planned NDIS cuts and calls on:—
 - (a) the Federal Government to reverse them and use alternative strategies to achieve NDIS savings rather than penalising people living with disability; and
 - (b) the State Government to table any modelling undertaken on the impact of NDIS cuts on state services in the House by 10 September 2026. (18 August 2026)

136 Ms Howlett to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that on any given day, there is an average of 100 people utilising a Tasmanian hospital bed who, through no fault of their own, are medically ready to be discharged but who remain stranded in hospital due to a lack of available aged care places or National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) supports.
- (2) Recognises that being stranded in hospital is having a significant impact on the health and wellbeing of these Tasmanians, while placing additional pressure on hospital beds, emergency departments and elective surgery waiting lists across Tasmania.
- (3) Acknowledges that aged care and NDIS are areas of Commonwealth responsibility, who have continually refused to offer any solutions or funding to fix these long-standing issues.
- (4) Further notes that Federal Government changes affecting the affordability of private health insurance will result in more older Tasmanians relying on the public health

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system, exacerbating this issue even further and adding more further pressure to our hospitals.

- (5) Further recognises the Tasmanian Government continues to work on interim solutions for these patients, despite them being areas of Commonwealth responsibility.
- (6) Calls on the Australian Government to fund these interim solutions and fix these long-standing issues. (18 August 2026)

137 Ms Dow to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes:—
 - (a) significant housing pressures and a shortage of affordable rental accommodation across north west Tasmania;
 - (b) 5,655 Tasmanians are on the social housing waiting list;
 - (c) Burnie’s private rental vacancy rate is just 0.7 per cent; and
 - (d) Stage 1 of Marinus Link and the North West Transmission Developments are anticipated to bring up to 1,900 workers into the Cradle Coast region.
- (2) Acknowledges concerns raised by residents, community organisations, tourism operators and local government about the impact major construction workforces could have on an already constrained housing market.
- (3) Recognises:—
 - (a) the opportunity to develop dedicated modular or rapid-build worker accommodation that can transition into permanent social, affordable or key-worker housing following the construction period; and
 - (b) the important role of the Cradle Coast Authority in coordinating a regional response between councils, communities, project proponents and housing providers.
- (4) Calls on the Tasmanian Government to:—
 - (a) immediately work with Marinus Link, TasNetworks, contractors and councils to establish dedicated worker accommodation that protects existing rental markets;
 - (b) examine opportunities to ensure project accommodation contributes to long-term regional housing stock;
 - (c) provide appropriate support to the Cradle Coast Authority to coordinate the regional response;
 - (d) ensure Building Tasmania prioritises additional social and affordable housing in north west Tasmania; and
 - (e) update the House during the September 2026 sitting period on actions being taken. (19 August 2026)

138 The Minister for Environment and Climate Change to move—That the House approves a draft proclamation under section 18(2) of the Nature Conservation Act 2002 laid on the table of the House on 19 August 2026 for the alteration of reserve class over a $\pm$ 8.295 hectare parcel within the $\pm$ 67.3 hectare Calverts Hill Nature Reserve from Nature Reserve to Nature Recreation Area.
