

CHARITABLE INSTITUTION, LAUNCESTON: REPORT FOR 1892.

Presented to both Houses of Parliament by His Excellency's Command.

Sir

I HAVE the honor to submit my Annual Report for this Establishment for the year 1892.

Admissions and Discharges.

Admissions.—The admissions during the year show an increase of 5 males, but a decrease of 3 females.

The daily average was—males, 176.61, females, 47.85, of whom 220.01 were chargeable to the Colonial Government, and 4.44 to the Imperial Government.

The daily average for 1891 was—males, 168.40, females, 47.

Discharges.—19 were transferred to New Town Charitable Institution, 15 to the Police for breaches of the Regulations, 9 absconded, 25 were discharged by the approval of the Administrator Charitable Grants, 6 were let out on pass, 70 were discharged at their own request, 77 died.

Mortality.—The death-rate was 17.70 per cent., as against 15.62 for 1891. The average age at death was 74.5, the maximum being 99 and the minimum 39.

Ages.—The average ages of inmates was—males, 70, females, 63.

Expenditure.—The gross expenditure for the year was £3387 18s. 4d. The annual cost per head £15 1s. $10\frac{1}{2}d$., and £14 10s. 11d. on gross and net expenditure respectively, as against £14 10s. $4\frac{1}{2}d$. for 1891.

Remarks.—The permanent appointment of Mr. E. Daniels as Overseer and Clerk has given

every satisfaction.

The cost per head was in excess of that of the previous year, but was due to the fact that the additional hospital attendants appointed in the latter part of 1891 were last year made a full charge against the Institution.

The addition to the dietary scale is also responsible for the increased cost. These improvements, however, were greatly needed, and the benefits derived therefrom fully justify the additional expenditure.
