



ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1893.

In presenting the fifty-third Annual Report to the Members of the Institute, the Board of Managers have to congratulate the members on the continued progress of the Institute.

The general public have largely availed themselves of the advantages afforded by the Public Reading Room. There were 68 new names added to the membership during the year, as against 69 whose membership lapsed; the number of subscribing members at the close of the year standing at 416. The number of life members is now 30.

An arrangement was made with the Association of Trades and Manufactures for the delivery of a course of lectures, the Association defraying the incidental expenses, and the Institute providing a room.

Under this arrangement the following lectures were delivered: by Hon. A. I. Clark, on "Fèderation"; by W. Cairns, on "Combustion"; by A. North, on "Brick Architecture"; by T. S. Cleminshaw; on "Fuel"; by W. C. Bovil, on "The Atmosphere and the Winds"; by W. H. Jolly, on "Harbour Works"; by A. Montgomery, on "Copper."

Your Board regret that the attendance at the above lectures was not such as the importance of the lectures should have commanded. Mr. A Barrett delivered a lecture on "The Land for the People, and the People for the Land." Mr. O. Balfe gave an entertainment entitled "An Hibernian Night's Entertainment," and the Shakesperian Society, under the leadership of Messrs. Barrett and Balfe, gave two evenings with Shakespeare.

A series of extension lectures in connection with the Tasmanian University having been organised, your Board placed the Lecture Room at the disposal of the promoters.

The Launceston Parliamentary Debating Society has successfully carried on its work during the winter months, and is tending to create a greater interest in public affairs among the younger portion of the community.

During the year the Institute has lost by death the services of two of the Vice-Presidents, viz., Messrs. A. W. Birchall and B. P. Farrelly. Both of these gentlemen held the office of President, and rendered zealous service during the many years they have been on the Board of

There have been 530 vols. added to the Library, making a total of 19,100 vols. The circulation among Members has been 24,300 vols. and 7900 periodicals.
