Adelaide, 9th June, 1884.

GOVERNOR.

TELEGRAM from Secretary of State announces International Conference at Washington, 1st October, to consider establishment Universal Prime Meridian, and directs me to consult other Australian Colonies whether they consider it desirable to appoint common representatives to discuss question, but not to vote.

MEMO. FOR HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR.

WITH reference to the telegram from the Secretary of State for the Colonies as to the International Conference to be held at Washington in October next to consider the question of the establishment of a Universal Prime Meridian, Mr. Giblin has the honor to inform His Excellency that as it is not the intention of the Australian Colonies to join in appointing a common representative to such Conference, who would have power to discuss the question, but not to vote thereon, Mr. Giblin advises His Excellency that the interests of Tasmania in this matter may safely be left in the hands of the English representatives, and that the Secretary of State should be so informed.
