

PENAL ESTABLISHMENT, LAUNCESTON.

Penal Establishment, Launceston, 22nd March, 1880.

Sir,

I HAVE the honor to submit herewith the Annual Report and Returns for this Establishment for the year 1879.

Officers.—The Officers have performed their duties in an efficient manner. Two Constables and one Female Warder resigned during the year.

Prisoners.—On the 1st January there were 90 in the Establishment: 815 were received during the year,—making a total of 905, as against 810 for the year 1878. The daily number of 1nmates was 109·167 as against 118·24 for previous year. The number tried at Superior Courts during the year (See Return No. 12) was 40. 31 were convicted, and 2 were found to be insane. One under committal for manslaughter was transferred to Hobart Town for trial.

The number arraigned during 1878 was 26: convicted, 19.

Escapes.—Two. One from the Invalid Depôt; the other from the Corporation Quarry. The former was arrested by the Officers of this Establishment, and the other by the Westbury Police.

Prisoners transferred.—Eighteen of those convicted at Superior Courts were transferred to Hobart Town, and the two found "insane" to the Hospital for Insane, New Norfolk.

Prisoners' Conduct.—Their conduct has been satisfactory. Two cases were tried for escaping, and 29 for breaches of discipline during the year.

Health of Prisoners.—The health of the Inmates has been good. 195 cases were treated by the Medical Officer. 7 deaths occurred; viz, 1 Male Prisoner, aged 78 years; 1 Female Prisoner, aged 56 years; 3 Female Invalids, average age of 71; and 2 Infant Children, aged respectively 26 days and 3 days.

The sanitary condition of the whole of the Establishment is good.

I beg to call your attention to the necessity of appointing another Constable for the Establishment, as the duties to be discharged by the present Staff are too severe. Several of the Officers have to perform thirteen hours' duty daily, and one Officer fourteen hours.
