



SIXTH REPORT

OF THE

SOUTHERN BOARD OF EDUCATION, TASMANIA.

To His Excellency Colonel Thomas Gore Browne, C.B., Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Tasmania and its Dependencies.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY.

1. WE, the Southern Board of Education, beg leave to submit to Your Excellency this our Sixth Report, comprising a statement of our proceedings for the year ending 31st December, 1862.

Number of Schools in operation.

- 2. On the 31st December, 1861, we had 54 Schools in operation, which had on their Rolls during that year 4751 children, with an average daily attendance for the same period of 2154 children, and an average number on the Rolls for the year of 3165 children.
- 3. At the close of the year 1862 the number of Schools in operation was 53; the total number of distinct children at any time on the Rolls for the year was 5100; the average number of children on the Rolls for the year was 3334; and the average daily attendance of children for the same period was 2337.*
- 4. The following Table exhibits the average number of children on the Rolls, and also the average daily attendance, for the last six years; viz.—

Average of Pupils per School.

5. Taking the total number of distinct children appearing at any time on the Rolls for the year 1862 as 5100, we have for the 53 Schools in operation an average for each School of 96; while, if we take the average number only appearing on the Rolls for the same 53 Schools as 3334,

^{*(}I.) By the total number of children on the Rolls during the year is meant the gross aggregate of distinct individual children whose names have appeared on the School Rolls at any time during the entire year.

⁽II.) By the average number of children on the Rolls during the year is meant the mean or average of the several numbers appearing on the Rolls throughout the year, and which, in point of fact, vary from week to week and from month to month.

⁽III.) By the average daily attendance of children during the year is meant the mean or average of the numbers found in actual attendance, not on the Rolls merely, but present in their classes from day to day during the year.

we get an average for each School of 63 children; and taking the total daily average attendance at the 53 Schools as 2337, the average number of children in daily attendance at each School appears to be 44.

- 8. At Trinity Hill and Port Cygnet Schools the average attendance, as compared with the number on the Rolls, was as low as 53 per cent.
- 9. From 49 Schools we have Returns exhibiting the average number of days attended by each child who was present in the course of the year. The School year comprised on the average 230 days; and the average attendance for all the Schools gives 115 days for each child. The following Schools exhibit an average attendance of more than 150 days on the part of each child:—

The inadequacy of the Grant has prevented our entertaining any of these applications, although in every instance a good primâ facie case has been made out for assistance. The following, however, appear to the Board to have especial claims to consideration:-

Mount Seymour, and Ouse River, School-houses erected or in course of erection. Garrett, Southport, promoters prepared to erect School-house with assistance of the Board. Oyster Cove, ditto.

17. No Schools have been struck off the Roll during the past year; but the following have been closed temporarily in consequence of the resignation or removal of the Teachers, and the completion of arrangements for the appointment of their successors:-

> Black Brush School closed from 1 February to 31 May. Bream Creek School closed from 1 October to 31 December. Jericho School closed from 13 January to 31 January. Lisdillon School closed from 13 January to 28 February. South Arm School closed from 1 July to 30 September. Swansea School closed from 1 May to 30 June. Three-hut Point School closed from 1 August to 30 September.

- 19. The result exhibits a decrease of £138 7s. 8d. in the expenditure for 1862 as compared with that of 1861, while, as shown above, there was an increase in the attendance of scholars amounting to 183.
- 20. Our proportion of the Parliamentary Vote of £12,000 for Education was £7636 7s. 3d. Our expenditure is shown to amount to £7473 5s. 8d., being £163 1s. 7d. less than the Vote.

School Fees.

- 21. The School Fees paid in aid of Teachers' salaries amounted to £2177 6s. 7d., being £141 5s. 8d. less than the sum received in the preceding year.
 - 22. We have returns of Fees paid at Schools by 3385 scholars, from which it appears that—

- 23. Under the Board's Regulations, dated 11th December, 1860, Capitation Fees were granted on account of 895 scholars, the parents and friends of whom were certified to us as unable to pay the school fees. The sums thus disbursed amounted to £375 12s. 6d., being at the rate of 8s. $4\frac{1}{4}d$. for each free scholar. The expenditure on this account exceeds that of the previous year by £67 8s. 6d.
- 24. In addition to the 895 scholars for whom Capitation Fees have been paid, 690 scholars are reported to have been taught without any payment being made to the Teachers.
- 25. At the end of the year there were attached to our Schools 38 Male and 47 Female Teachers, classed as follows:-

Cost of Instruction.

29. The cost of instruction for each scholar in daily attendance is stated in the Return [Appendix D.] to amount to £3 6s. 9d., to which must be added the sum of 11s. the cost of administration and inspection, making £3 17s. 9d. as the total amount of Government aid. If, however, computed on the average number of scholars on the rolls, the cost would not be more than £2 10s. $7\frac{1}{2}d$. per head.

The local contributions amounted to 18s. $7\frac{1}{2}d$. for each child in daily attendance.

Exhibitions to Superior Schools.

30. In the month of June we caused an examination to be held of Candidates for Exhibitions from Public to Superior Schools; and, on the recommendation of the Examiners, we awarded four Exhibitions, of the value of £12 10s. each, to the under-mentioned Scholars:—

Eugene Wickins, aged 13 years, Goulbourn-street Public School. Edwin Hughes, aged 12 years, New Town Public School. William Burt, aged 12 years, Trinity Hill Public School. Thomas Bahewell, aged 11 years, Trinity Hill Public School.

- 31. We have the satisfaction to report that John W. Canaway, to whom we awarded one of these Exhibitions in 1860, has gained one of the higher Exhibitions in the disposal of the Council of Education. We learn too that Seymour J. Bennett, Edwin Hughes, John Snowden, and Eugene Wickens, four other Exhibitioners, have distinguished themselves at the Schools at which they have been placed.
- 32. At a Meeting of the Board held 24th December, 1862, the following communication was read:—

"GENTLEMEN,

Colonial Secretary's Office, 22nd December, 1862.

- "The Government is desirous of submitting to the Board of Education the desirability of returning to the arrangement formerly in operation, of confiding the Public Schools of the Colony entirely to the management of one Board, and Inspector responsible immediately to it. Should this proposition meet with acceptance, it is further proposed that Mr. Stephens, if acceptable to the Board of Education, should be named by His Excellency as Inspector of Schools for the Island, and Mr. Burgess as Deputy Inspector.
- "It will be observed that both of these Officers are already attached to the Department of Education in the Colony, and that they have the advantage of greater length of service than Mr. Stutzer (who would be superseded by these arrangements) in recommending them to continued employment.
- "Should the proposals of the Government be found acceptable to the Board of Education, as the body immediately charged with the management of the Public Schools, it is intended that they should take effect from the 1st January next, or as soon after as the Board may advise.

Whereupon it was resolved:—

"That the Board acquiesces in the arrangements proposed by the Government, for confiding the management of the Schools to one Board, with Mr. Stephens as Inspector of Schools for the Island, and Mr. Burgess as Deputy-Inspector.

^{*} The average income of Certificated Teachers in England is stated, in the Report of the Committee of the Privy Council for 1859, not to exceed £91 16s. 7d., including receipts from all professional sources whatever.

- "In learning that this arrangement will necessitate the retirement of Mr. Stutzer, the Board are desirous of placing on record their sense of the services rendered by him to the cause of Education in this Colony."
- 33. In closing this Report, the last which it is our duty to present to Your Excellency in connection with the Southern Board of Education, we may be permitted to refer briefly to the results of our six years' labours.
- 34. First. As to School Buildings.—In 1857, the date of our First Report, there were 46 Schools in operation in separate buildings; 12 of these were the property of the Government, 17 were rented, and 17 were held on sufferance, free from the payment of any rent. These buildings afforded, collectively, room for 3563 scholars; but only 18 out of the whole number were at all fitted for the purpose of instruction. On the 31st December, 1862, we had occupation of 53 School-houses, affording accommodation for 4000 scholars. Twenty-three of these buildings were vested to be Board, 20 were rented, and 13 were held free from rent. Forty of them are reported to be in excellent, good, or fair condition; 6 others as in moderate condition, requiring trifling repairs; while only 7 are noted as bad or defective.
- 35. Second. School Furniture and Apparatus.—In our Report for the year 1857, 18 Schools only were stated to be properly fitted up. At the end of 1862 there were 45 Schools adequately furnished as regards desks, apparatus, and school appliances.
- 36. Third. Attendance.—The average number on the Rolls in 1857 amounted to 2471 scholars. In 1862 it had increased to 3334 Scholars, or 74 per cent. Again, the average daily attendance, which in 1857 amounted to 1791 Scholars, had in 1862 risen to 2337 Scholars, or 76 per cent. increase.
- 37. Fourth. Management.—In 1857 the discipline of 27 Schools was reported to be excellent, good, or fair; that of 16 as moderate; that of 3, bad. In 1862 we have to report that 42 Schools, or 80 per cent. of the whole number, have been well and satisfactorily conducted.
- 38. Fifth. Visitation.—As exhibiting the increased local interest taken in the Schools, we may mention that, while in 1857 not more than 1477 visits were recorded, the number of visits reported for 1862 was 2260, being an increase of 65 per cent. over the results of the first-named year.
- 39. Sixth. Cost of Instruction.—The average amount paid by the Board per annum for each Scholar in daily attendance during the four years ended 31st December, 1860, amounted to £4 13s. 9d. The cost for 1862 did not exceed £3 17s. 9d. per head, and will probably fall below this amount in future years as the numbers in attendance increase.

To the Members of the Southern Board of Education.

GENTLEMEN.

I have the honour to lay before you my Report for the year 1862. It is considerably shorter than the preceding ones, because, for obvious reasons, I have, in all but one instance, abstained from offering suggestions as to the existing educational arrangements, and in the general status of the Schools there has been very little change.

In the course of the year I have made 143 visits to Government Schools. In the country districts, as in previous years, I have almost always examined the Schools myself. The additional examinations conducted in town have been (1) candidates for employment as Masters, 5; (2) for Exhibitions to Superior Schools, 1; (3) for Pupil Teachers, 1 in Hobart Town, and 2 in country districts; viz. Hamilton and

The previous year, 1861, was distinguished by the greatest increase in the number of pupils which has taken place during the last 12 years. It is impossible to say, with perfect accuracy, what the collective numbers for the year 1862 may have been, as the returns up to the present date have not all been received; but it is clear, upon the face of those for the previous quarters, that the advance has been not only maintained but considerably increased. In the 7 Town Schools during the month of December, 1862, the number of pupils on the Rolls amounted to 1329 against 1144 in December, 1861. For the whole of the Schools during the same month the number on the Rolls amounted to 3504, being an increase of about 350 over the average of the year 1861, and an increase of above 1000, or more than 30 per cent., on the year 1859.

The above advance in the number of pupils has taken place only in the subsisting Schools,—no new ones having been added, owing to the limited finances of the Board.

The changes among the Teachers have been very few. At New Town, Mr. Pears resigned, and has been succeeded by Mr. Hughes. Mr. Hughes has been succeeded at O'Brien's Bridge by Mr. Henry. Mr. Henry at Hamilton by Mr. Swift. Mr. Swift at Jericho by Mr. Lonsdale.

Only three new Masters have been added to the Staff. Mr. Barlow in the place of Mr. Maynard, resigned, at Swansea. Mr. Betts in the place of Miss Richardson at Broad Marsh; and Mr. Carew in the place of Mr. Reynolds at South Arm. The first and last of these are trained and experienced Teachers. Four female Teachers, in addition, have been appointed as Assistants and Teachers of needlework at South Arm, Broad Marsh, Jericho, and Swansea. Mrs. Allen has been appointed to succeed Mrs. Townley as Mistress at Lisdillon.

It will thus be seen that very little change has taken place among the Teachers, and equaly little, except through the increase of pupils, in the Schools. There are, however, some particulars which I take this opportunity of noticing.

The Schools in the small country towns generally retain the high position which they have latterly reached, and which I consider, upon the whole, the highest of those under the Board. The chief reason of this superiority is the greater regularity of attendance.

The School at Oatlands has improved, but is still inadequate to the requirements of the neighbourhood. The Master is a gentlemanly and competent Teacher, but his School should contain at least 80 children in daily attendance.

The School at Brighton ought to contain double the number of children. The Mistress works hard, but the Master is incapacitated by ill health.

The School at Bridgewater should be done away with. The Master is, probably from the state of his health, of little present or future use to the Board.

The Schools at Broad Marsh and Black Brush have for the last two years been a source of trouble and anxiety. I can congratulate the Board in their being, at last, efficiently conducted to the full satisfaction of the neighbourhood.

The number of Pupil Teachers has, at last, reached that point at which it will be unadvisable to admit of any addition. During the last three years they have been of great present and prospective use, as a means for providing, at a cheap rate, a certain proportion of trained instructors. This the principal object of their institution, may be considered as being temporarily satisfied, and for the next two years I would suggest that no new candidates be admitted.

The only suggestion which I take the present opportunity to make to the Board is with respect to the Schools in Hobart Town itself. In the capital, in addition to two Schools under Female Teachers, there are six conducted by Masters of the First Class. If all the children in these six schools who are sufficiently advanced in age and acquirements to require the personal instruction of a First Class Master were added together, they would be considerably less than two hundred. I consider Female Teachers, up to a certain point, quite as good, if not better, than Male; and I submit that, in the event of any future reduction, the Town Schools are capable of effectual consolidation.

I have only to add, in conclusion, that, before writing this brief Report, I have re-read my former and more elaborate ones, and that the experience of nearly four years has led me not to modify, but to re-affirm the two points chiefly asserted in the same; viz. first, the absolute necessity of some central body to maintain a sufficiently high educational standard; and second, the expediency of local taxation, as a means not only of increasing School funds but also School attendance.
