### Notices of Motion

**36** Ms *Finlay* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges that:—
  - (a) the Tasmanian salmon industry is Tasmania's biggest primary industry and has grown to a processed food value of \$1.154 billion (2019/2020), and further spends around \$500 million per annum on the supply of goods and services from Tasmanian businesses;
  - (b) Tasmanian salmon and trout farming creates 2,292 direct full-time equivalent jobs and more than 10,000 indirect full-time jobs, creating highly skilled, well paid pathways particularly in regional Tasmania; and
  - (c) while supplying just 1.6 per cent of the world salmon supply, the Tasmanian Salmon industry is the largest fishery in Australia by both volume and economic value.
- (2) Notes:—
  - (a) that the 12-month moratorium on no net increase in leased farming areas in Tasmanian waters was promised to be lifted in September 2022;
  - (b) that the 10-year Salmon Plan Discussion Paper Q&A states “in relation to no net increase in total leasable area for finfish farming will still apply... until the new plan is finalised and takes effect”; and
  - (c) there is therefore confusion surrounding the promise to lift the moratorium, with questions being raised by industry, suggesting that it is in fact still in place, just under another name.
- (3) Calls on the Premier, Hon Jeremy Rockliff, MP to:—
  - (a) clearly outline for Tasmanians and those working in the industry whether, as promised, the moratorium has in fact been lifted;
  - (b) outline for Tasmanians and those working in the industry whether the moratorium has in fact been extended until the release of the 10-year salmon plan, and continues to exist under a different name; and
  - (c) confirm that the release of the 10-year salmon plan has now been deferred. (27 September 2022)

**38** Dr *Woodruff* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises Julian Assange is an Australian citizen and a journalist with WikiLeaks who aided in exposing possible war crimes and civilian casualties in the release of documents which included Afghanistan War logs in 2010 and Guantanamo Bay files in 2011, supplied to WikiLeaks by Chelsea Manning, a former U.S. Army intelligence analyst.
- (2) Notes that Mr Assange has been subject to isolation and imprisoned for 10 years.

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- (3) Recognises Mr Assange's impending prosecution by the United States of America constitutes a serious attack on the fundamental democratic freedoms of the press.
- (4) Further notes:—
  - (a) allegations that the CIA illegally spied on US citizens while they visited Assange in the Ecuadorian embassy; and
  - (b) reports former US security officials have alleged that in 2017, following WikiLeaks' publication of details around a series of CIA hacking tools, CIA director Mike Pompeo and top agency leaders developed plans to have Assange murdered.
- (6) Calls on:—
  - (a) the President of the United States, Hon Joe Biden, to intervene in the extradition and prosecution of Mr Assange, and instruct the US Attorney-General and US Department of Justice to withdraw all charges; and
  - (b) the Prime Minister of Australia, the Hon Anthony Albanese, MP and Minister for Foreign Affairs, Hon Senator Penny Wong, to write to the President of the United States, Hon Joe Biden and the US Ambassador to Australia, Ms Caroline Kennedy, to express concern regarding Mr Assange's prosecution. (27 September 2022)

### **39** Ms O'Byrne to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges that Tasmanian school staff have done an extraordinary job throughout the Pandemic to minimise disruptions to learning and to support Tasmanian students.
- (2) Notes:—
  - (a) that Tasmanian teachers are the lowest paid in the country;
  - (b) concern that the Government hasn't addressed workload, staff shortages and competitive pay to retain teachers and keep up with the cost of living in its public sector offer; and
  - (c) that stop work action is a last resort for teachers and support staff, who are trying to improve education outcomes but need the support of Government.
- (3) Acknowledges industrial action by school staff is supported by parent associations and education stakeholders to lift learning outcomes.
- (4) Further notes the Liberal Government is prepared to spend \$375 million on a Hobart AFL stadium when the State's NAPLAN results are the worst they have ever been and too many Tasmanian children are struggling with reading, writing and numeracy.
- (5) Calls on the Liberal Government to support school staff so Tasmanian children can reach the expected standards in literacy and numeracy and engage in their learning. (27 September 2022)

### **41** Ms White to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that:—
  - (a) public sector workers deliver critical services relied on by Tasmanians every day; and
  - (b) inflation in Tasmania is increasing at 6.5%.
- (2) Agrees that:—
  - (a) a wage increase that does not increase at the same rate as inflation is a wage cut in real terms;
  - (b) public sector workers deserve a wage increase that keeps up with the increase in cost of living;
  - (c) recruitment and retention of public sector workers is critical in being able to deliver public services needed by Tasmanians; and
  - (d) paying a comparably lower wage to other states and territories impacts negatively on recruitment and retention of public sector workers, and in turn, delivery of services in Tasmania.
- (3) Calls on the Premier, Hon Jeremy Rockliff, MP to recognise the real value of public sector workers to Tasmania, and to treat them with the respect they deserve in wage negotiations. (27 September 2022)

### **42** Ms Dow to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that:—

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- (a) Tasmania is in the grip of a health crisis;
  - (b) Tasmanian health care workers are at breaking point;
  - (c) Tasmania effectively has a part time Health Minister;
  - (d) the Launceston General Hospital (LGH) has the worst bed block in the country; and
  - (e) the Tasmanian Government has its priorities all wrong.
- (2) Further notes that:—
  - (a) over 9,000 Tasmanians are waiting for necessary elective surgery;
  - (b) over 55,000 Tasmanians are on the “hidden waiting list” to see a specialist;
  - (c) ambulance response times in Tasmania have increased to an all-time high of 15 minutes;
  - (d) Tasmanians are not being seen in clinically recommended time frames at our emergency departments; and
  - (e) the Government has not funded the \$580m upgrade of the LGH promised at the last election.
- (3) Calls on the Premier, Hon Jeremy Rockliff to get his priorities right, fund the LGH upgrade and invest in fixing the health crisis instead of funding a \$750m stadium in Hobart. (27 September 2022)

### 43 The Minister for Energy and Renewables to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises that Girls in Power is a unique event offering young Tasmanian women in Years 9 and 10 an insight into the exciting opportunities a career in clean energy can provide.
- (2) Notes that the program helps young women better understand STEM by seeing real life examples of how science, technology, engineering and maths are used to enhance renewable industries around Tasmania, and to meet the women already achieving great success in the sector.
- (3) Further notes that the event held in Southern Tasmania on 20 and 21 September 2022 was a huge success, with highlights including:—
  - (a) 29 students participated with four teachers from a variety of schools including public, independent and Catholic;
  - (b) students had an opportunity to engage with graduates from both TasNetworks and Hydro Tasmania;
  - (c) visits to Cattle Hill Wind Farm and Hydro Tasmania power stations; and
  - (d) very positive feedback from the teachers and schools involved.
- (4) Further notes that learnings from the Southern event will now be incorporated into a Girls in Power event planned for Northern Tasmania in 2023.
- (5) Recognises that Girls in Power is supported by the Tasmanian Government, Hydro Tasmania, Entura, TasNetworks, Goldwind and ACEN Australia. (28 September 2022)

### 44 The Minister of Energy and Renewables to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes:—
  - (a) Deloraine’s new Pump Track, featuring 140 metres of track for bikes, scooters and skaters in the Meander Valley region, is officially open; and
  - (b) the Tasmanian Government supported construction of the Pump Track through a commitment in 2021.
- (2) Recognises and commends the Meander Valley Youth Committee and the Deloraine Lions Club who collaborated on this project together with the Meander Valley Council, for their dedication and commitment to the Meander Valley;
- (3) Acknowledges that community infrastructure such as the Pump Track provide communities with much needed facilities to gather together and share their passions as well as supporting healthy, active lifestyles. (28 September 2022)

### 45 The Minister of Energy and Renewables to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes:—
  - (a) the Tasmanian Government was proud to support our international education community at the 2022 Study Tasmania International Education Awards, held on Monday, 26 September 2022 in Hobart;

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- (b) the Study Tasmania International Education Awards is an annual event to acknowledge and celebrate the achievements of international students and staff who work in the international education sector in Tasmania; and
  - (c) the Tasmanian Liberal Government is proud of our international education community, with almost 9,000 international students from a wide range of countries currently studying with international education providers in Tasmania.
- (2) Acknowledges how tough these two and a half years have been for the international education sector and students and their significant efforts and perseverance during this very difficult period.
- (3) Congratulates all nominees across the eight award categories, our Student ambassadors and the Study Tasmania team within Department of State Growth for organising the event.
- (4) Congratulates all of the 2022 winners, noted below:—
  - (a) International Student of the Year (University) – Aloka Senadeera;
