

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT FOR THE YEAR 1897.

SIR,

In accordance with the Rules of the Hobart General Hospital, we have the honour to lay before you the following Report, containing such tabulated and other information as will, we trust, fully exhibit the working of the Institution during 1897.

Sixteen Board and ninety-seven Committee meetings were held during the year, at all of which the attendance of members was, without exception, good.

The Hospital is indebted to many citizens for acts of kindness towards the patients and staff by the frequent donations of fruit, flowers, books, periodicals, and the daily papers.

As will be seen by the detailed list, a large number of surgical operations have been most successfully performed during the year, and the Board of Management has much pleasure in recording its high appreciation of the manner in which the Honorary Medical Officers have discharged their onerous duties.

Early in the year a Bacteriological Laboratory was established in connection with the Hospital, and, in the capable hands of the Honorary Pathologist and Bacteriologist, Dr. Sprott, is proving a most valuable acquisition to the Institution.

The Hospital Grounds have been further improved by the formation of a tennis court for the use of the nurses and resident staff, the funds necessary for carrying out the work being raised by an entertainment generously given by friends.

The balcony and fire escape, main building, is now in course of erection, and will, when completed, not only satisfy a long felt want, but also enhance the appearance of the building.

The vestment of the sole control and management of the Institution in the Board for a fixed amount still continues a matter of congratulation for all concerned, for, although during the year there was a very considerable increase in the number of patients treated in the Hospital—the second highest number recorded for 17 years,—the gross cost is £663 below the average expenditure for that time.

This year the Board of Management is not in a position to return any portion of the grant in aid, as it has been only through the most careful supervision and the exercise of the greatest economy that both ends were made to meet.

During 1896 1293 In-door patients were treated; this year 1384, of which number 119 proved fatal, 30 deaths occurring within 72 hours after admission. The average stay of patients in the Hospital was 24 days, as against 22 in the preceding year. Of the 1384 cases treated in the Hospital, 626 came from the country districts.

In 1896 the net average cost per patient was £3 18s. 9½d.; this year £3 13s. 6½d. The actual cash collection during 1896 amounted to £611 16s. 7d.; this year to £754 9s. 5d. The net expenditure for 1897, as compared with that of 1896, shows the slight increase of £4 10s. 6d., although 51 more cases were treated, and the average stay in Hospital two days longer this year. The fees remaining on the book for collection at 31st December amounted to £61 3s.
