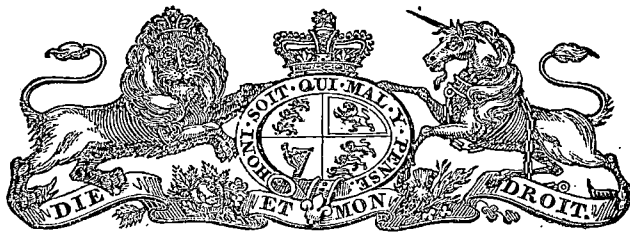

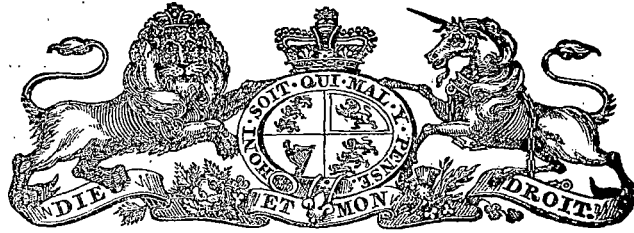

EXHIBITIONS FROM PUBLIC TO SUPERIOR SCHOOLS.

THE Board of Education has directed the publication of the annexed Report of the Examiners appointed to conduct the Examination of Candidates for Exhibitions from Public to Superior Schools.

EXAMINERS' REPORT.

WE have the honor of presenting to the Board of Education a Report of the Nineteenth Annual Examination for Exhibitions.

The Examination occupied the same time as that of last year, and no change has been made in the standards of qualification, nor in the number of marks obtainable in the several subjects. Seventeen boys and four girls, representing thirteen schools, offered themselves as competitors for the Exhibitions to be awarded. Twelve were examined at Hobart Town and nine at Launceston. The same questions were set to all at the same time, and the answers written at Launceston were forwarded to us.

READING. *Rev. Canons Davenport and Bailey, Examiners.*—The reading, as a whole, was satisfactory. Few read badly and some very well.

DICTATION. *Rev. Canon Bailey, Examiner.*—The spelling was very good, but punctuation evidently requires much more attention than it receives at present.

PENMANSHIP. *Rev. Canons Davenport and Bailey, Examiners.*—The writing was generally very creditable, considering the ages of the children, and the answers were written neatly with very few exceptions.

ENGLISH GRAMMAR. *Rev. Canon Bailey, Examiner.*—The answering in this subject was very creditable. Ten of the candidates obtained more than three-fifths of the whole number of marks, and there were only four who did not succeed in gaining half. Crawford, Kelly, Christensen, Annie Littlejohn, and Adams deserve special mention.

GEOGRAPHY. *Rev. Canon Bailey, Examiner.*—I was glad to notice a great improvement in this subject. Half of the candidates gained more than three-fourths of the whole number of marks; and there were only four who failed to gain half. Crawford, Campbell, Annie Littlejohn, Christensen, and Roche answered remarkably well; except that Annie Littlejohn's spelling of the names of places was very incorrect. The geography of Tasmania has been more carefully studied than heretofore.

HISTORY. *Rev. Canon Davenport, Examiner.*—The answers were of fair average merit. Campbell's work is remarkably good, and the answers of Christensen, Annie Littlejohn, Crawford, and Adams are very creditable. Stephens, Roche, Cummings, Mary Mylan, and Tibbs obtained more than half the marks assigned. Some of the rest had taken little pains in studying the books prescribed, and many of their answers to questions on the Sacred History were of no value. It would, in my opinion, be desirable, if possible, to prescribe for use in the Public Schools some book on the Sacred History, the historical books of the Bible being very difficult to children.

ARITHMETIC. *Rev. Canon Davenport, Examiner.*—Crawford, Campbell, and Adams obtained full marks; Christensen, Annie Littlejohn, Kelly, and Roche more than two-thirds; Mary Mylan, Viola Allsopp, Smith, Tibbs, Cripps, Cummins, Stephens, and Toan more than half the maximum of marks. The paper was not an easy one for children under twelve years of age, and the work is, as a whole, very commendable, that of the three first-named deserving high praise.

The annexed Table of Marks shows the results in detail. Not one of the Candidates failed to obtain 400 marks, the standard of qualification for a place in the Table. Fifteen boys and three girls obtained more than 600 marks, the standard for an Exhibition.

We have pleasure in recommending for Exhibitions Annie Littlejohn, Mary Maria Mylan, and Viola Angelina Carlton Allsopp, the three foremost of the girls; and Robert Henry Crawford, John Henry Campbell, Charles Corydon Adams, Laurence James Christensen, Arthur Augustus Stephens, and Patrick Daniel Kelly, the six foremost of the boys.

We are of opinion that the results of the Examination are very satisfactory, and compare favourably with those of past years. The attainments of many who have failed to win an Exhibition, because they have been outstripped in the race, deserve great praise; while those of their more successful competitors reflect still higher honor on their ability and industry, and not a little credit on the schoolmasters by whom they have been taught.

4. Name the most southerly Cape of Africa, the most northerly Cape of Asia, the most westerly Cape of Europe, and the most easterly Cape of South America.

REGULATIONS FOR EXHIBITIONS FROM PUBLIC TO SUPERIOR SCHOOLS, 1878.

It is hereby notified that Six Exhibitions of the annual value of £16 13s. 4d. each, tenable for four years from the 1st July, 1878, will be open for competition, during the month of June next, to Male pupils between the ages of 10 and 12 years who have attended one or other of the Public Schools in Tasmania for the twelve months immediately preceding the 1st June, 1878.

II. It is also notified that Six Exhibitions of the value of £16 13s. 4d., tenable for one year from 1st July, 1878, will be open for competition during the month of June next to Female pupils between the ages of 10 and 12 years who have attended one or other of the Public Schools in Tasmania for the twelve months immediately preceding the 1st June, 1878.*

III. The Examination will comprise the following subjects:—

1. Reading aloud passages in prose or verse from some English Author.
2. Writing from Dictation.
3. Penmanship.
4. English Grammar and Language.
5. Geography.
6. History.
 - A. English History.—A.D. 1066 to A.D. 1307.
 - B. Sacred History.—From the death of Ahab to the rebuilding of the Temple.
7. Arithmetic.

IV. The following values have been affixed to the several subjects of Examination:—

It shall be essential to success that a Candidate gain 50 per cent. of the total number of marks; that is to say, 600 marks.

V. The Exhibitions obtained by Male Candidates will be tenable at one or other of the following Superior Schools as shall be named by the Parent or Guardian, and be approved by the Board; viz.—The High School, Hobart Town; the Hutchins School, Hobart Town; the Church Grammar School, Launceston; and the Horton College, Ross; and Exhibitions obtained by Female Candidates will be tenable at such Schools as may be selected by the Parent or Guardian, and approved by the Board.

VI. A Boarding Allowance of Twenty Pounds per annum, in addition to the amount of the Exhibition, will be granted to Exhibitioners whose residence is more than five miles from a Superior School.

VII. The Exhibition will be payable by quarterly instalments to each Exhibitioner upon production of a certificate of industry and good conduct from the authorities of the school to which the Exhibitioner may belong.

VIII. In the event of the non-production of such certificate for any one quarter, the Exhibition shall be declared vacant: provided always that this rule shall not apply to Exhibitioners who may have been incapacitated from attending school by illness or other cause deemed sufficient by the Board.

IX. Arrangements will be made, where practicable, for the local examination of Candidates who may reside at a distance from Hobart Town.

X. Applications† from Candidates desirous of offering themselves for Examination should be transmitted to the Chairman on or before the 1st May, 1878, supported by certificates as under:—

1. Certificate of good conduct for the twelve months immediately preceding the date of application from the Conductor of the School attended by the Candidate.
2. Certified extract from Register of Births, or such other Certificate as shall be deemed sufficient by the Board, showing that the Candidate will not have reached the age of 12 years on the 1st June, 1878.
