

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REMARKS.

^{1.} Mr. Strutt was appointed Foreman in 1863, on the then Overseer (having a salary of £400 a year, the result of classification) being reduced on pension. Since that date the salary of Overseer has disappeared from the Estimates, and the Foreman has been borne on the Wages Abstract.

^{2.} There are no emoluments whatever beyond the fixed wages: but wages are paid for all gazetted holidays when the Offices are closed by His Excellency's command.

- 3. The excess upon the year in each case represents the overtime paid for night-work at the respective rates per hour, over and above the ordinary day's work of nine hours. Out of Session the working hours are, generally, reduced to eight instead of nine, without alteration of pay; but at any moment of pressure of work the longer hours are again resorted to, as a matter of course, to meet the exigency.
- 4. As a rule of the Office, only the actual time employed is paid for, deductions for absence from work being made in all but one or two recognized instances,—viz., marriages, and funerals of relatives.
- 5. The Office is closed earlier on Saturday afternoons; and for this privilege no overtime is allowed for the later hours which almost invariably occur on Monday nights in the publication of the Gazette.
- 6. During the recess, Mr. Chick, the Messenger to the House of Assembly, a Bookbinder, is employed at the Parliamentary Buildings in binding books, periodicals, and newspapers for the Library of Parliament, as well as the records for the Colonial Secretary's Office; and his pay is borne upon the Wages Abstract of the Government Printing Office.
- 7. The Compositors receiving the higher rates of pay have been from 10 to 20 years in the Office; but the tendency during the last 6 or 8 years has been to a decline in wages, in consonance with the ordinary economic law of demand and supply. About £2 2s. may be taken as the present ruling standard for Compositors in making fresh engagements. Hence I may explain my principle of action, which is, not to disturb existing agreements, but to supply vacancies as they occur at the current reduced rates. The printing at the Government Printing Office is, for the most part, table-matter and other high-class work, demanding both intelligence and skill in its proper execution; and its Compositors have been gradually trained to efficiency by their lengthened experience.
