



## PETITION No. 72.

Presented by Mr. Dobson, and ordered by the House to be printed, 23 September, 1862.



To the Honorable the House of Assembly of the Parliament of Tasmania, in Parliament assembled.

The humble Petition of the undersigned Bruce Robert Harvey, of Launceston, Tasmania.

## MOST RESPECTFULLY SHOWETH:

That, whereas a Bill is now before your Honorable House, intituled "A Bill to vest a Portion of Mulgrave-street, Launceston, in Her Majesty," your Petitioner respectfully objects to the said Bill, for the following reasons:—

First.—That your Petitioner's property has a frontage of five hundred and fifty links upon east side of Mulgrave-street, from Frankland-street to French-street, and that at the time he purchased he had to pay an increased price for said property on account of having such frontage.

Second.—That your Petitioner's property also has a frontage of two hundred and twelve links upon French-street; that French-street is a new street opening upon Mulgrave-street; and that, should Mulgrave-street be closed, said frontage would be of no value.

Third.—That, by closing said street, your Petitioner's property would be much depreciated in value, by being deprived of a frontage of seven hundred and twelve links, available for building purposes, and the loss of a back entrance to his premises. Also, that your Petitioner would be liable to injury from the nature of the Hospital works, where there are very deep cuttings in connexion with said works, being brought close up to his side line.

Your Petitioner therefore humbly prays that the said Bill may not pass into law, unless absolutely required for the public good; and that, in case it is so required, provision may be made in said Bill fairly to compensate your Petitioner for the loss he will sustain, by being deprived of his right of frontage on Mulgrave-street, and the advantage of his frontage on French-street.

And your Petitioner will ever pray.
