



SIR.

I have the honor to submit herewith, for the information of the Board of Immigration, my Departmental Report for the Half-year ended 31st December, 1860, with a series of Tubular Returns in connection the required by the respective of the respect

It will be seen that 151 persons were introduced under the Bounty System during the above period, at a cost of £9 11s. $5\frac{1}{2}d$. per Statute Adult; 60 of whom were landed at Hobart Town, and 91 at Launceston. The entire of this number (except 6 per Percy, direct to Hobart Town) arrived $vi\hat{a}$ Melbourne, having been forwarded thence per Steamers, by the Agents of the "Black Ball" and "White Star" Lines.

Of the above, the proportion of English, Scotch, and Irish, is as follows :-

The sexes are thus divided, Males 62, Females, 89, including 15 Male, and 19 Female children under 12 years of age.

With but few exceptions, these Immigrants are well adapted for the requirements of the Colony, and the majority have received a tolerable amount of education. They are chiefly the relations or friends of persons in Tasmania, who have purchased Bounty Tickets for their introduction, and who receive them on arrival, and find them employment. Those not under this head have been sent for by landowners and other employers of labour, and have been selected by their private agents in the United Kingdom as agricultural labourers or domestic servants, under engagement to the holders of the Tickets, many of whom have expressed themselves as well satisfied with the new arrivals. The proportion of male to female Emigrants thus introduced is large, when the cost to the holders of Male Tickets (£10 each) is taken into consideration, and may be adduced as a proof that the demand for farm labourers has continued steady.

Two ships despatched by the Tasmanian Emigration Agency, London, arrived in the Colony during the Half-year viz.—Isles of the South at Hobart Town, and Antipodes at Launceston; the former with 106, and the latter with 166 single females for general engagement. A special Report on each of these Vessels has been already furnished to the Board.

From the fact that many of the single women remained unemployed for a considerable time after arrival, the Board considered it expedient to modify the terms of engagement so as to relieve employers from

the liability of payment of the Promissory Notes in advance, merely requiring them to deduct one-half of the servant's wages while in their service as they became due, until the sum so reserved equalled the amount of the Promissory Note.

This arrangement has been successful so far, as enabling the Immigration Agent at each Port to dispose of the Immigrants speedily, thereby saving the Government from the heavy expense attendant on their support. It however remains to be seen whether the system adopted will answer permanently, which will of course depend mainly upon the continuance in their places of the servants thus engaged, and the consequent payment of moieties by employers. The result will be notified in my next general Report.
