



#### TO THE HONORABLE THE CHIEF SECRETARY.

Legislative Council Office, Hobart, August 25th, 1882.

I have the honor to present you with the Statistics of this Colony for the year 1881, and to offer such observations thereon as may be necessary, with the view of giving a general summary of the results deducible therefrom. I may remark that this volume and report are the sixteenth which it has devolved upon me, in the discharge of my functions as Government Statistician, to furnish.

I shall, as in previous years, pass over the "Blue Book," forming Part I., since the particulars contained in it, while extremely useful for occasional reference, are not of sufficient interest to require any special notice in a report like the present, and come at once to

#### II.—POPULATION.

The Population, as estimated on December 31, 1880, was 114,762—60,550 males, Population, 54,212 females. The Census of April 3, 1881, showed the actual number on pp. 31-33. and 54,212 females. that day to be 115,705—61,162 males, and 54,543 females,—the males forming 52.86, and the females 47.14 per cent. of the total. It was shown in the report on the Census, that the population at the date of the Census, as found by adding the balance of births over deaths to April 3, and of immigration over emigration to March 31, was found to be 115,437. The difference between the actual and estimated population was therefore only 268. This result was as satisfactory as it was unexpected. No one could have anticipated that the two sets of figures would so nearly agree.

The increase in 1881 by excess of births was 2185, and by excess of immigration, 1416; the total addition during the year being 3601 persons. In 1880 the increase by births was only 1907, by immigration only 386, by both only 2293; so that there were added to the population 1308 persons more in 1881 than in 1880-278 more by birth, and 1030 by immigration.

The subjoined table shows the proportion of persons (mixed sexes), males, and females at certain ages to every 100 of the whole population at the same ages, as shown by the last three Censuses:-

It appears therefore that children under 10 decreased as between 1861 and 1881, by 2.71 in the 100, the males by 1.41, and the females by 4.44. Between 10 and 20 there

was an increase in the mixed sexes of 6.08, in the males of 7.15, and in the females of 4.69. At the producing age, when man is at his best, namely, between 20 and 50, there was a decrease in the mixed sexes of 7.03 as between 1861 and 1881, but an increase of 1.36 as between 1870 and 1881. As regards the males at this age, the decrease between 1861 and 1881 was 8.97, while the increase between 1870 and 1881 was 1.49. As regards the females the decrease between the extreme years was 4.78, and the increase between the two last 1.18 in the 100. At 50 and over, when man has passed his prime, and has either ceased to be able to labour for himself and others, or is fast verging towards that condition, there was an increase on the mixed sexes of 3.29 as between 1861 and 1881, on the males of 2.84, and on the females of 4.39.

Thus in the latter period the decrease in the percentage of children under 10 was-more than three times as great in the case of females as in that of males. Between 10 and 20, at which age there was an increase, it was nearly twice as great for the males as for the females. The decrease between 20 and 50 was also nearly twice as great on the part of the males as it was on that of the females. If we make the comparison between 1870 and 1881, there will be a greater increase at this age of males than of females. At 50 and over, taking the extreme years—1861 and 1881—there was a larger increase of females than of males.

While then there was in 1881, if compared with 1861, a deficiency of persons at the age most suitable for industrial pursuits, when 1870 was taken as the starting point, there was on the contrary an appreciable degree of improvement.

The number of habitations on 3rd April, 1881, was 23,529. There were 1533-houses unoccupied, and 138 being built; and there were 878 buildings (excluding school-houses and places of worship) not inhabited, nor designed for habitation, making the total number of buildings of all kinds, with the exceptions stated, 24,407. The average number of persons to each dwelling throughout the Colony, was 5.29.

In regard to birth-places, the people were thus grouped in the returns of the last Census:—Tasmania, 79,991; Victoria, 2584; other Australasian Colonies, 1403; England and Wales, 17,307; Scotland, 3744; Ireland, 7192; other British possessions and at sea, 872; foreign countries, 2225; and 389 whose place of nativity was not specified. The proportion per cent. of each class to the aggregate population was as follows:—Tasmania, 69·13; other Australasian Colonies, 3·44; England and Wales, 14·96; Scotland, 3·24; Ireland, 6·21; foreign countries, 1·93; while those born in other British possessions and at sea formed ·76, and the "unspecified," ·33 per cent. of the whole.

Immigration and Emigration, p. 34. During the last year 12,579 persons arrived in the Colony from other countries. Of these \* 8676 were males, and 3903 females—the two sexes being in the proportion of 69 and 31, or nearly as 2 to 1 respectively. The vast majority—11,490—of the immigrants came from Victoria, 615 from New South Wales, 9 from South Australia, 454 from New Zealand, and 11 from the United Kingdom.

The returns show that 11,163 persons migrated from Tasmania to other countries in 1881—7333 being males and 3830 females; the proportions per cent. being 66 and 34 respectively. The immigrants were in excess of the emigrants by 1416—1343 males, and 73 females.

There was a greater deficiency of women, as compared with men, on the part of the inward than on that of the outward passengers. This was naturally to be expected, many of the immigrants being miners, who would leave their families behind them until

they should decide whether there were sufficient inducement for them to remain in the Colony, and make it their permanent abode. The greater part of the emigrants were bound for Victoria; 965 for New South Wales; 5 for South Australia; 326 for New Zealand; and 3 for the United Kingdom.

Looking at the drift of population in connection with individual countries—the most important, at least—we find that while 11,490 persons came hither from Victoria, only 9864 migrated thither from Tasmania, leaving a balance of 1626 in our favor; that while 615 came from New South Wales, 965 departed for that colony, leaving an excess of 350 of the latter; and that as regards New Zealand, the immigrants and emigrants were 454 and 326 respectively, the former being 128 more than the latter. Thus while Victoria and New Zealand supplied us with a part of their population, New South Wales, on the contrary, drew away a part of ours.

The assisted immigrants introduced during the year numbered 59-26 males, and 33 females—being 7 more than in 1880. Of these, England and Ireland each furnished 19, Scotland 16, and other countries 5.

Only 3 persons were naturalised in 1881—one being a Dane, and two Germans. There have not been so few since 1875, when the numbers were first recorded in the Fifty-two persons in all have been naturalised in the last seven years, by far the greatest part of them being Germans.

#### III .- TRADE, COMMERCE, AND NAVIGATION.

The Commerce of Tasmania continued to increase in 1881, as it has done since 1870. The value of the Imports and Exports, taken together, was £2,986,720, and has not been so large since 1855. The discovery of gold in Australia caused a sudden inflation of our sea-borne trade, which rose to £2,370,371 in 1852, and to £4,029,713 and £4,037,701 in 1853 and 1854 respectively; falling in 1855 to £2,988,426, whence it continued to diminish until 1870, when it was only £1,441,625—but a little more than the value of the imports alone in 1881.

The rate per head of the total Commerce in that year was £25 9s. 2d. In 1870 it was only £14 8s.  $1\frac{3}{4}d$ .

The Imports in 1881 were £1,431,144, being at the rate of £12 3s.  $11\frac{3}{4}d$ . per head. Imports, pp. increase on 1880 amounted to £61,921, or 4.52 per cent. The increase on 1880 amounted to £61,921, or 4.52 per cent.

These figures show the following increases as compared with those for 1880:-United Kingdom, £51,667; Queensland, £1620; Mauritius, £25.211; Foreign countries (United States), £7693. On all the other countries there were decreases:— Victoria, £3686; New South Wales, £14,186; New Zealand, £915; South Australia,

As regards the trade with the United Kingdom and Victoria, it is impossible with the means at our command to ascertain how it really stands, seeing that a large, if not the larger portion of the goods brought from the United Kingdom and other distant countries are introduced by way of Victoria; so that that colony is credited with so much more of imports or exports than really belong to it. In all comparisons as to the trade between Tasmania and these countries, this fact should therefore be kept in mind.

On comparing the different items which go to make up the total value of the imports, we find the increase as between the last two years distributed over nearly all the articles. The principal increases were these:—

Other minor increases were—Canvas, £966; Glass, £989; Hops, £565; Railway Material, £1626; Wines, £587.

The decreases (leaving out a few of the very smallest) were these:—Blankets and Rugs, £1186; Boots and Shoes, £3059; Chicory, £28; Cocoa, £924; Coffee, £2533; Coin, Gold, £91,795, Silver, £8300; Copper and Lead, £910; Malt Liquors, £350; Medicines and Drugs, £2099; Paints, 366; Seeds and Plants, 157; Tallow, 961; Woolpacks, £2063.

The increases are chiefly on haberdashery, hardware and ironmongery, machinery, manure, tea, sugar, and tobacco. On mult liquors, as will be seen, there was a slight decrease; on wine a small increase; but on spirits and cordials there was a very considerable increase.

Gold Coin was imported to the value of £85,905 in 1881, against £177,700 in 1880; Silver to the value of £300, against £8600; and Copper to the value of £10.

Exports, pp. 52-9; 60-2-3.

The Exports in 1881 were valued at £1,555,576, the rate per head being £13 5s.  $2\frac{1}{4}d$ . The increase, as compared with the previous year, was £43,645, or 2.89 per cent.

Rather more than two-thirds of the total value of the Exports was contributed by three articles,—gold, tin, and wool. The following were the values of those articles exported in the last two years:—

There was thus an increase in the value of Metals in 1881 of £43,637, or 8.03 per cent.

In Wool there appears to have been a decrease of £43,844 on the value, and of 755,504 lbs. on the quantity; but this does not by any means signify that the quantity of wool produced in 1881 was less than that produced in 1880, the export of 1880 having been larger than usual. The average annual weight of wool exported in the five years 1872-6 was 5,668,129 lbs., and in the succeeding period 1877-81, 8,041,802 lbs., the increase being 2,373,673 lbs., or nearly 42 per cent.

The exports of other articles than gold, tin, and wool were generally greater in 1881 than in 1880. Thus the quantity of Green Fruit despatched in the former year was 173,739 bushels, against 155,468; of Jam, 4,195,317 lbs., against 3,430,912; of Bark, 8838 tons, against 5131; of Butter and Cheese, 600 cwts., against 127½ in 1879 (there being none in 1880); of Oats, 184,032 bushels, against 181,619; of Horses, 161, against 101; of sheep, 1306, against 385; of Vegetables, 12,992 tons, against 185,545. 6545. On timber there was also an increase, the values being £56,605 and £51,973 respectively. The value of Hides, Skins, and Leather was £33,068, against £25,289.

The value of Tin exported has already been stated; the quantity was 4120 tons in 1881, against 3951 tons in 1880.

On Flour, Wheat, Barley, and Oatmeal there was a decrease. On hops the decrease was serious, from 589,722 to 436,180 lbs. The Hop crop reached its maximum in 1876, when the export was 848,405 lbs. From that year it has declined. It revived slightly in 1880, but in 1881 fell below that of any other year of the decennium.

The export of Whale Oil in 1881 was larger than it has been since 1877, although the value is set below that of 1880.

The stock of goods in Bond on 31 December, 1881, was generally below that of the Goods in preceding year. This was especially the case as regards ad valorem goods, beef and pork, Bond, p. 64. malt liquors, spirits, rice, starch, and tobacco. On coffee, dried fruits, oil, and varnish there was an increase.

The tonnage of shipping inwards and outwards was less in 1881 than in 1880; the Shipping, pp. outward tonnage being less also than in 1879. It was, however, larger than in any other 65-70. year of the decennium. The following were the figures for the last two years:

Thus, with an increase of 74 on the number, there was yet a decrease on the carrying capacity of 29,541 tons.

The number and tonnage of sailing and steam vessels inwards and outwards in 1881 are here shown :-

Taking the whole traffic inwards and outwards together, the sailing vessels were 809, with a tonnage of 117,929, and the steamers 574, with a tonnage of 265,833; the carrying capacity of the two classes being in the proportion of 30.73 and 69.27 respectively.

Vessels of 160,241 tonnage entered with cargoes, and of 31,783 in ballast. Four of these latter, of tonnage 1388, were foreign.

The figures given below for vessels both ways in 1881 and 1880, will be interesting, as showing the direction which trade is taking.

Thus there were increases only at the Sub-ports of Burnie and Torquay. At Hobart the decrease was 30,205 tons, at Launceston 5047, at Stanley 2007, and at Ulverstone 459. On the Sub-ports as a whole, there was an increase of 5711 tons.

In regard to the nationality of vessels, it has already been stated that four of those which entered during the year were foreign. One of these belonged to the United States, one was Danish, one German, and one Swedish. Of the total tonnage inward, 10,401 belonged to British owners, and 180,235 to Colonial.

State of Shipping, 31 Dec., p. 69.

The returns relating to the shipping trade require a more careful study than most of the other returns included in the annual statistics of the Colony, inasmuch as they exhibit some results which appear to be inconsistent with the general progress of the community.

The following table, (which is carried back to 1866;) brings together synoptically all the available facts relating to the subject.

Here we have the anomaly that, while the tonnage of shipping entering and leaving the ports of Tasmania increased during the period from 213,968 to 383,762, or more than 79 per cent., and the value of the goods carried from £1,716,713 to £2,986,720, or  $73\frac{1}{2}$  per cent., the tonnage of ships on the register diminished from 19,769 to 17,123. The explanation apparently is to be found in the increased use of steam in the carrying trade: thus, while the tonnage of vessels generally decreased, that of steamers increased from 2944 to 4681, or 59 per cent. This may be more plainly shown thus:—

The business of whaling has lost ground greatly as compared with its magnitude in Whaling, the earlier days of the Colony, and there has been a gradual declension in it even from P. 70. 1872: but the amount of shipping engaged in it was still somewhat greater in 1881 than it was in 1866; since in the latter year it employed 9 ships of 2257 tons, and in 1881, 10 ships of 2780 tons.

The quantity of Oil brought into port was, however, somewhat greater in 1881 and in several other years of the decennium, being 316 tons, against 219 in 1880, 269 in 1879, 282 in 1878. In 1875 it was only 139 tuns, although the number of vessels employed was three more than in 1881.

The ship building trade has greatly declined. The first year for which we have any Ships built particulars is 1874, when the number of vessels built and sold out of the Colony was and sold, p.70. returned as 9, and the tonnage 449; while in 1881 the number had declined to 1, and the tonnage to 46. The explanation before offered will apply to this case also. The employment of steamers and iron vessels generally has a tendency to supersede sailing and wooden craft, and as there are no means of constructing iron ships here, the building trade is confined to small river craft, or coasters.

The return of Trades and Manufactories shows the most important of these in Trades, &c., operation on the 31st December in each year. The total number in 1881 was 3437, which had increased by 98 since 1880. The chief increases occurred in agricultural implement makers, bakers, blacksmiths, bricklayers, butchers, carpenters, coopers, engineers, fellmongers, gardeners (market), general dealers, grocers, hawkers, pastrycooks and confectioners and large part agreement and confectioners and large part agreement agreement and confectioners. and confectioners, saddle and harness makers, saw-mills, tanners, wool staplers and sorters. On some industries there were decreases; such were boot and shoemakers, breweries (1), on some industries there were decreases; such were boot and shoemakers, brewelles (1), brick makers, cabinet makers and joiners (26), cheese makers (3), clothing factories (3), maltsters (1), flour mills (2), painters, plumbers and glaziers, publicans (3), shipwrights and boatbuilders, tailors, wine merchant (1). The increases occurred in the districts of Bothwell, Campbell Town, Deloraine, Evandale, Glamorgan, Hamilton, Hobart, Kingborough, Ross, Westbury, and especially at Emu Bay (65), Selby (26), and Portland (32); the decreases, at Brighton (11), Clarence, Fingal, George Town, Glanouby Green Ponds Longford New Norfolk, Oatlands, Port Sorell, Richmond Glenorchy, Green Ponds, Longford, New Norfolk, Oatlands, Port Sorell, Richmond, Sorell,\* and Spring Bay.

The rates of wages differed in many instances from those of 1881. Taking the Wages, p. 72. average for the whole colony as the basis of comparison, we find that in some trades, such as blacksmiths, bootmakers, butchers, engineers, joiners, masons (builders), millers, plasterers, quarrymen, wages were lower; while those of bricklayers, carpenters, masons (cutters), painters, plumbers, saddlers, and wheelwrights were higher. Seamen's wages were also slightly higher.

Under the agricultural and pastoral class, the wages of ploughmen were lower. Reapers and mowers (notwithstanding the increase in mechanical appliances for harvesting) received higher remuneration, as also shepherds and shearers.

As regards servants, gardeners obtained higher wages, while those of coachmen and grooms were lower. Female domestics generally received more, the only exception being housemaids, the rate for whom appears to have been slightly lower.

The chief differences in the market prices of commodities at Hobart as between 1881 Market prices, and 1880, seems to have been in firewood and butcher's meat, the former being cheaper, P. 74. and the latter dearer in 1881.

The average Contract prices of articles supplied to the Government in 1881 were Contract generally lower than in 1880. This was especially the case with liquors (except rum), bread, butcher's meat, and tea. A few articles, such as coffee, currants, black oil, sugar (brown), and tobacco were slightly dearer.

The next return relates to Gold Mining. Towards the end of last year the Colony Gold-mining, was divided into six mining districts, each under a Commissioner; and while this p. 75. arrangement will be more convenient for persons in the more remote parts having business with the mining department, it has increased the difficulty of obtaining the required information for statistical purposes.

From this it will be seen that while as regards alluvial mining, there was a decrease in 1881 of 463 in the number of persons employed, of £100 in the estimated value of plant, of 7333 in the number of ounces obtained, and of £28,730 in the value of the gold; as regards quartz mining, there was an increase of 96 in the persons employed, of £17,500 in the value of plant, of 9563 in the number of tons of quartz operated upon, of 11,431 in the number of ounces obtained, and of £44,334 in the value of the gold.

Taking both together, there was an increase in the metal of 4098 ozs., and in the value, of £15,604.

The average yield per ton at Beaconsfield in 1881 was 1 oz. 4 dwts. 2½ grs., and at Lefroy and Back Creek, 1 oz. 4 dwts. 5 grs., which is below that of the previous year. The Florence Nightingale Company at Beaconsfield had an average yield of 2 ozs. 7 dwts. 6 grs., and the New Chum Company at Lefroy, 2 ozs. 7 dwts. 11½ grs. per ton. The Tasmania Company at Beaconsfield appears from the report for the half-year to 30th June last, to have crushed in that time 10,755 tons of stone, which produced 12,737 ozs. 16 dwts. of gold, or 1 184 ozs. per ton. This mine is stated to have paid in dividends from the commencement, £197,750.

Other mines, p. 76.

The production of minerals other than gold was generally less active in 1881 than in 1880. The quantity of Tin Ore raised was 5224 tons, against 5844 in 1880, or 620 fewer; and that of smelted tin produced was 4012 tons, against 4154 tons in 1880. There is no reason to fear however, that the output of tin will suffer more than a temporary decline for a long time to come. Both on the north-east and on the western sea-board there appear to be rich deposits which need only capital, skill, and time to utilise them, and to draw from them a far greater amount of wealth than they have yet furnished.

The now well-known Mount Bischoff Tin Mining Company is stated to have paid in dividends from the commencement to the end of June last, the sum of £306,000.

Calculating from the amount of duty paid into the Treasury under "The Real and Personal Estates Duties Act" between 1st January and 31st December, I find that in 1881, the sum paid by gold and tin mining companies to their shareholders was £201,000, the dividends of the gold companies amounting to £99,250, and those of the tin companies to £101,750.

The next return under this head is one of Beer brewed during the year, which shows Beer brewed, the whole quantity produced to have been 1,137,528 gallons (being 9.70 gallons per p. 78. head of the mean population for the year), and that on which duty was paid, 1,053,095 gallons. The duty having come into operation only on the 1st March, 1880, and the return for that year consequently being for ten months only, there are no means of comparing the quantities for the two years. The quantity on which duty was paid was however 23,713 gallons less between 1st March and 31st December, 1881, than it was in the corresponding period of 1880.

#### IV.—FINANCE.

According to the mode of dealing with the revenue and expenditure of the General Government of this Colony, the accounts are kept open for twelve months after the close of the financial year—the 31st December—and the finance statements are not made up until after the 30th June of the following year. This arrangement causes considerable inconvenience in regard to the Statistics: 1. By rendering it impossible to obtain the finance returns as soon as they are required for the printer; 2. By delaying the completion of the statistical abstracts now annually applied for by the other Colonies. There is another inconvenience arising out of the fact that the accounts are kept open for a year, namely, that the figures for the last year are not final, but are subject to further revision and are therefore only approximations to the final amounts. It has been suggested that all these difficulties might be obviated if the returns furnished for statistical purposes were made to comprise only sums received or paid between the 1st January and the 31st December in each year. The suggestion seems to me a valuable one, and unless there is any objection to it which has not occurred to me, I should be disposed to recommend that it should be adopted in future. Any inconvenience which might be felt as regards discrepancies—which would not probably be great—between the budget statements and those contained in the general statistics, would be far more than compensated by the saving of time, and the finality and simplicity of the latter.

The General Revenue of 1881 was £505,872 9s. 10d., and was the largest amount Revenue, pp. which has ever been received into the public Treasury of this Colony in any one year. 80-5. It exceeded that of 1880 by £63,714 15s. 1d., and that of 1872—ten years previously by £232,274, or 85 per cent.

The amounts (in even pounds) under each head in 1881, 1880, and 1872, with the increases, are shown in the subjoined table.

As compared with 1880, the chief increases were on Customs duties, excise, dividend tax, stamp duty, telegraphs, fines, fees, &c., land sales, rent of waste and mineral lands, and The increase on Customs was at the rate of 16.87 per cent.; on dividends, of 52.60; on stamp duty, of 31.54; on telegraphs, of 28.33; on fines, fees, &c., of 41.76;

on land sales, of 3.63; and on rent of lands, of 65.88 per cent. The largest increments were therefore on rent of mineral and other lands, on dividends (derived largely from the produce of such lands), and on fees connected with gold and tin-mining.

In the ten years from 1872, the Customs increased by 85·29 per cent.; fees, &c., by 169·24; land sales, by 42·20; and rents of metalliferous lands by 279·11 per cent.

Expenditure, pp. 83-4.

The disbursements chargeable to the ordinary revenue (that is, not including those from funds provided by loans) were, in 1881, £468,613 4s. 9d., being in excess of the expenditure for 1880 by £43,417 13s. 7d. Of this excess part, to the extent of £20,800, was caused by the transfer of that sum (which was incurred for public works,) from a Loans Act to the Consolidated Revenue; and another portion, namely £3000, was occasioned by the payment of a reward offered some years ago by the Legislature for the discovery of a gold field which should fulfil certain prescribed conditions. Allowing for these extraordinary charges, the excess of expenditure as between 1881 and 1880 would be reduced to £19,618, which was incurred principally for public works, post offices and telegraphs, railways, mines, interest, public instruction, and defences.

The increase of Expenditure, as compared with 1872, was 61 per cent.; that of Revenue being 85 per cent.

Imperial Expenditure, p. 86.

The Imperial Expenditure in 1881 was £17,157 2s. 5d.—differing but very slightly from that of 1880.

Course of Exchange, p. 86. The Bank Exchange with London continued the same as it was in 1880—one quarter per cent. discount for mercantile bills, and 1 per cent. premium for bank bills.

It was also the same as regards the other Colonies of the group.

The rates of Discount were—to 12 January, for bills of 95 days and under, 7 per cent.; of over 95 days, 8 per cent.; from 13th January to the end of the year, for bills of the same currency, 6 and 7 per cent. respectively.

The rates of interest on fixed deposits for 3, 6, and 12 months to 28th January, were 2, 3, and 4 per cent. respectively; to 14th December 2, 2½, and 3 per cent.; and from that date to the end of the month, 2, 3, and 4 per cent.

Banks, pp.

The Bank returns for 1880 showed a decrease of assets from the first to the second, and again from the second to the third quarter; the amount in the last quarter, though larger than in the two middle quarters, being yet below that of the first quarter by £46,286. The liabilities in 1880 followed the same law as the assets, except that there was an increase as between the first and last quarters, which however was only £4496. In 1881, as regards both assets and liabilities, there was a continuous increase on each of the quarters, the increase as between the first and last being, on assets, £430,734, on liabilities, £359,080.

The average assets in 1881 were £2,506,031, and in 1880, £2,206,650; the average liabilities in 1881, £2,588,326, and in 1880, £2,245,712. The increase on assets was £299,381, or 13.56 per cent.; on liabilities, £342,614, or 15.25 per cent. These figures show a great advance upon those of 1880, as compared with 1879, which were 3.82 and 9.01, as the increases upon assets and liabilities respectively.

The following were the amounts of specie and bullion in the Banks, notes in circulation, and deposits, in the last quarter of 1881, with the rate per cent. of increase, as compared with 1880:—

In 1880 the increases per cent., as compared with the previous year, were—On specie and bullion, 49:39; on notes, 2:69; on deposits, 6:98. It will be seen that there is a very marked difference in favor of 1881.

Savings Banks, pp. 89-90. The Savings Banks at Hobart and Launceston had a total of 14,728 accounts open on 28th February, 1882, against 13,520 on the corresponding day in 1881. The increases on the different classes of accounts were these:—

Thus, while the whole amount increased by £60,555, the funds invested in mortgages and debentures diminished by £8625, in consequence of the difficulty of disposing of money in this manner, while those placed in other Banks and lying in the Savings Banks themselves increased by £69,180.

This means that the savings of the people in the last year, so far as they could be arrived at by this means, were in excess of those of the preceding year by £47,318.

The number of accounts opened during the year ended 28th February, 1882, was 2713, the number closed, 1639; giving an excess of 1074 opened. In the previous year 1110 accounts were opened, and 812 closed, the difference in favour of the former being only 298.

An increase in the business of the Money Order branch of the Post Office took Post Office place in 1881 such as has never before been known in this Colony. The following are the figures for the last two years, and the increases in 1881:-

The total amount of transactions in 1881 was £141,289, against £114,373 in 1880, the difference being £26,916—at the rate of 23.53 per cent. Only two additional offices were opened in the past year. A reduction in the rate of commission took place on 1st October, 1881, but this was too late in the year to have affected the result to any very great extent. The increase is doubtless very largely caused by the miners and other persons from the other Colonies making remittances to their families whom they had left behind.

On extending the comparison to different places, we find that on the Orders issued the increase in 1881 were these: -Within Tasmania itself 31 43 per cent.; on Victoria, 25.48; on New South Wales, 30.21; on the United Kingdom, 11.69.

The number of orders paid in 1881 was 17,422, and the amount £55,279.

Public Debt, pp. 93-4. The amount of the Public Debt on 31st December, 1881, was £2,003,000; £80,000 being raised by Treasury Bills, and the remainder by Debentures. The sum of £150,600 was added to the debt during the year 1881, and £91,300 was paid off. Of the whole amount, £866,500 bore interest at 6 per cent., £600,000 at 4 per cent., and the remainder at 5 per cent. The charge for interest during the year was £103,724 4s. 4d., being at the rate of 17s.  $8\frac{1}{4}d$ . per head of the mean population.

In the last ten years the indebtedness of the colony has increased by nearly 42 per cent., while the revenue in the same time, as was stated before, has increased by 85 per cent., the increase of the debt being therefore only about half that of the revenue.

Taxation, p. 95. The amount of the general revenue raised by taxation in 1881 was £350,145 15s. 6d., or 69·37 per cent. of the whole. The rate per head of the mean population was £2 19s. 8\ddot d. Customs duties and bonding charges formed 73·14 per cent. of the total taxation paid to the General Government.

The local taxation amounted to £76,912 11s. 11d., being at the rate of 13s.  $1\frac{1}{4}d$ . per head.

V .- ESTABLISHMENTS, INSTITUTIONS, &c., MAINTAINED OR ASSISTED BY GOVERNMENT.

Post Office, p. 132. At the head of these is the Post Office, the business of which showed a considerable increase in the past year. There were 5 more Post Offices and other places used for the same purpose, 7 persons more employed, 32 more miles of post roads, and 10,132 more miles travelled by Mail Conveyances. On the inland letters which passed through the department there was an increase of 234,455; on the ship letters received 40,958, and despatched, 36,406. On the inland packets the increase was 24,716; on the ship packets received, 9196; on those despatched, 3676. On the newspapers conveyed within the Colony there was a decrease of 192,353; on those received and despatched by ship, increases of 35,773 and 10,796 respectively.

The total number of letters which passed through the Post Office in 1881 was 2,994,148, of packets 187,555, and of newspapers 2,049,949; the increases being 11:62 and 25:06 per cent. on letters and packets respectively; newspapers showing a decrease of 6:64 per cent.

At the beginning of the year the postage on letters to the other Australasian Colonies was reduced from 3d. to 2d. the half-ounce.

The revenue of the Post Office was £20,143, the expenditure £29,613; the increases as regards the previous year being £659 and £2459 respectively.

Electric Telegraph, p. 133. The business of the Electric Telegraph Department showed unusual activity in 1881. The number of messages transmitted in that and the foregoing year was as here specified:—

The increase upon the total messages paid and unpaid, was at the rate of 35.80 per cent.

The Telegraph yielded a revenue in 1881 of £6952 (in even pounds), the increase over that of the preceding year being £1944, or 38.82 per cent., and the expenditure (exclusive of the amount of £4200 paid to the Company for the Submarine Cable), was £7992, the excess being £1527, or 23.62 per cent. There was thus a difference in the increase per cent. of 15.20 in favor of the revenue.

The Launceston and Western Railway conveyed 102,495 passengers, and 21,043 tons of L. & W. Railgoods, during the year. The passengers were 423 fewer than in 1880. The largest number way, pp. 134of passengers conveyed on this railway in any one year was 106,472, in 1878. From that year the passenger traffic has been slightly diminishing. The goods traffic, on the other hand, has increased continuously from 1877, though it was exceeded in 1873, 1874, and 1875. The receipts for both passengers and parcels have increased. The only item in 1881 which showed a decrease was the amount received from the Tasmanian Main Line Railway Company for permission to run over the Launceston line, which was £4270 in 1880, and £4057 10s. in 1881. The total receipts of the Railway were £24,074 0s. 1d. in 1881, against £23,560 ls. in 1880; the working expenditure £17,711 0s. 3d. (including £264 17s. 7d. for arbitration) against £17,455 14s. 4d; leaving a balance of revenue over outlay of £6362 19s. 10d. in 1881, and £6104 6s. 8d. in 1880.

The proportion of working expenses to gross earnings was 73.57 per cent. in 1881, 74.09 in 1880, and 84.42 in 1877.

The revenue of the Marine Boards was £16,469, and the expenditure £11,724, the Marine former being £3599, and the latter £1123 more than in 1880; the balance carried Boards, p.137. forward being also £4745 in excess.

Under the management of the Hobart Marine Board are the Light-houses belonging Light-houses, The amount received for light dues in 1881 (£3654) was £322 below the  $^{ib}$ receipts of 1880; but the total revenue was increased to £1903 beyond that of 1880 by an excess in the contributions from other Governments to the cost of maintaining the lights.

Following the practice pursued in former years, I append a Statement by the Salmon Secretary to the Salmon Commissioners of the number of ova and fry of salmonoids Breeding distributed by the Commissioners in 1881.

Government Establishments, pp. 138-146. The next set of returns are those relating to the Government Establishments, or such as are maintained out of public funds, namely, Hospitals at Hobart and Launceston, Hospitals for the Insane, Pauper Asylums, and Gaols.

The Hospitals had 141 in-patients at the beginning of the last year; 1015 were admitted during the year; 476 were discharged cured or relieved—34 as incurable, and 899 at their own request or on other grounds; 164 died; and 102 were remaining at the end of the year; the average number maintained throughout the year being 142. The number of out-patients treated was 2051.

As compared with 1880, there was a decrease of 13 on the average number of in-patients, and of 454 on the out-patients.

In the Hospitals for the Insane there were 342 patients at the beginning of the year; 48 were admitted or re-admitted, 5 were discharged cured, 2 uncured, and 26 died, leaving 357 at the end of the year. The average number maintained throughout the year was nearly 305—about 3 more than in 1880—of whom 80 were chargeable to the Imperial Government.

Of Paupers there were 835 at the beginning of the year; 903 were admitted during the year; 721 were discharged, and 169 died; leaving 848 in the Establishments at the end of the year. The average number maintained throughout the year was 896, (of whom 74 were chargeable to the Imperial Government); being greater by 50 than in the preceding year.

In the Gaols 282 prisoners were confined at the commencement of the year; 1569 were received in the course of the year; 6 died; 1550 were discharged; and 295 were remaining in custody at the end of the year. The average number in Gaol for the whole year was 292, and the greatest number in confinement at any time in the year, 354. On the average number there was a decrease, as compared with 1880, of 43.

Of the average number of 292, 240 were employed as follows:—119 in hard labour within the prison, 90 in hard labour outside the prison, and 31 in other ways; and 52 were not engaged in any employment.

The punishments inflicted in the Gaols were these:—Irons, 1; solitary imprisonment, 71; others, 44.

In regard to frequency of crime we have the following numbers and per-centages for 1881:—

Thus the great proportion of both sexes are those who have been three or more times convicted before again finding their way into prison, that is, inveterate offenders—persons with whom crime has become a confirmed habit—a second nature. The smallest proportion is of those who had been twice before convicted. The proportion of first convictions was greater than in 1880.

The cost at the Pauper Establishments, New Town, and Launceston, and at the Gaol for Males, Hobart, was less than it was in 1880: at all the other Establishments it was greater.

The Government Farm at New Town yielded produce in 1881 to the estimated New Town value of £885, against £962 in 1880; the balance of profit being £229 and £415 in the Farm, ib. two years respectively.

Coming to Establishments assisted by the Government, it appears that at the Establish-Hospital, Campbell Town, and the Boys' Home, and Girls' Industrial Schools, there ments assisted by Government, and 62 discharged; and 84 (2 having died) were remaining at the end of the year. These numbers did not differ very materially from those of the previous year.

The Ragged Schools had an average of 544 children on the books in 1881, against 565 in 1880, and an average daily attendance of 409, against 393.

The Benevolent Societies relieved 175 persons in the "permanent," and 648 in the "occasional," class. As compared with the numbers for 1880, there was an increase in the former of 22, and in the latter of 77.

The receipts (including balance) of the above-mentioned Establishments were £5275, and the expenditure was £4422. Private subscriptions contributed £1065, and the public Treasury £2236. The receipts exceeded those of 1880 by £99: the expenditure was less than that of the same year by £345.

The Road Trusts had 4135 miles of road under their charge in 1881. They had a Road Trusts, revenue (including balance of £9126 from the previous year) of £26,672, and expended pp. 152-5. £21,399, carrying forward an aggregate balance of £5273 to the present year. Their rates ranged from 4d. to 1s. in the pound, and produced £9454; and they obtained £7337 from the Treasury. As in the case of the Municipalities, however, these figures are only approximate, some of the Trusts, in consequence of changes in the chairmen or other functionaries, or other causes, not having rendered returns to myself or to the Auditor. The delay which takes place in many cases in rendering the returns of the Road Trusts and Municipalities is a serious impediment to the Statistician in the performance of his duties.

In addition to the Road Trusts, there were 42 Boards, having (including the Main Main Road Road between Hobart and Launceston) 702 miles of Main Roads under their control. Boards, p. 151. The expenditure on these was 12,444; making the whole outlay for maintenance of roads of all kinds, provided partly from State funds and partly from rates and other local sources, £33,843.

Municipalities, pp. 154-5.

The Municipalities in 1881 had a revenue (including £4115 brought forward from 1880) of £97,014. They raised by local and police rates £46,232. They obtained from Government £5333; from licences and dog tax, £3349; and from fees and other miscellaneous sources, £37,986. Their expenditure was £89,380, of which salaries absorbed £8275; police, £23,190; and miscellaneous charges (including overdrafts), £57,915.

The revenue was slightly in excess of that of 1880: the expenditure was less by £4776. The balance carried forward to next year was greater by £5119 than in 1880.

It should be observed that these figures, though probably approximating sufficiently near for practical purposes, are not quite exact, as, in one case, no satisfactory statement of accounts could be obtained and the figures for 1880 had to be repeated. There are two or three of the Municipalities which have caused much trouble and delay in regard to their statistical and other returns; but as regards the others, the returns have been furnished in good time and with proper care. In cases of default, the Wardens have always promptly attended to any representations made to them, but the source of the difficulty lies in appointing persons to fill offices of responsibility for which they have not the necessary qualifications.

Valuation of Property, p. 156. The annual value of landed and house property in Tasmania in 1881, as shown by the valuation or assessment rolls, was £714,112, being £9080 in excess of the value in 1880. In the course of the last ten years the value has increased by nearly 19 per cent.

#### VI.—Crown Lands, Agriculture, &c.

Lands leased, p. 158. The quantity of Crown land taken on lease in 1881 was 94,858 acres, bringing in a rental of £1093. As compared with the preceding year there was a decrease on the acreage of 540,893, and on the rental of £439 6s. The whole breadth of land under lease at the end of 1881 was 1,888,053 acres, and the rental £8455. There was a decrease as compared with 1880, on the area, of 669,865 acres, and on the rental, of £378.

Land sold, pp. 159, 160.

The acreage of land sold in 1881—31,335—was less by 7415 than it was in 1880. During the past decennium it was smaller only in two years—1872 and 1876. The decrease on town and suburban lands amounted to 296, and on country lands 7118 acres. The country lands were subdivided into pastoral and agricultural. The quantity of pastoral land sold in 1881 was 1694 acres; and of agricultural, 29,101.

These figures speak for themselves; but a review of the averages for the past ten years presents some interesting features which are worthy of special notice. Thus we find that pastoral lands averaged only 8s.  $11\frac{1}{2}d$  per acre in 1872, and that they had risen to £1 9s.  $0\frac{1}{4}d$  per acre, or 226 per cent., in 1881. The price of agricultural land was almost exactly the same in 1881 as it was in 1872—the difference being one farthing, which was in favor of the former year. In three years of the period mentioned, namely, in 1874, 1878, and 1879, the price was higher than it was last year. The average for pastoral and agricultural land, taken together, was higher only in 1878, when it reached £1 9s. 2d. The average of town and suburban land in 1881, namely, £18 3s. 9d. per acre, was far beyond that reached in any other year of the decennium. The next highest, £10 1s. 5d., was in 1879. The average for 1881, compared with the mean of the averages for the first five years, gives an increase of £12 4s.  $4\frac{1}{2}d$ ., or nearly 205 per cent.

Lands granted, p. 159. Seven hundred and thirty eight acres of Crown Land were granted under immigration certificates, being 63 acres more than in 1880.

The Agricultural and Live Stock Returns were published this year on the 6th June, Agriculture, and they might have appeared a week earlier, if the required information for district of pp. 164-70. Glenorchy had been received at the proper time.

On cereals there was an increase in the whole, of 5717 acres. On pease and potatoes there was a decrease of 462 and 751 acres respectively; on hay an increase of 3175 acres; on hops an increase of 18 acres. On root crops (turnips, carrots, mangel wurzel and onions) there was an increase of 737 acres, the breadth of land in these crops being 3035 acres in 1881-2, against 2298 in the preceding year. Flax showed an increase of 13 acres, "other crops" (included in which are 207 acres of raspberries), of 32 acres, gardens and orchards of 258 acres. The acreage in green forage was less by 327 than in 1880-1. The total breadth in crop showed an increase of 7706 as compared with that in 1880-1. Permanent artificial grasses occupied 3352 acres more. The increase in pasture land of this description since 1872, is 44,231 acres, for

48 per cent. Of fallowed land there were 23,930 acres, as against 26,442 in 1880-1, or 2512 less; of "all other cultivated land," 65,629 acres, or 7471 less. The total area of land under cultivation was 374,374 acres in 1881-2, or 1075 more than in the year before. The increase in the last ten years was 32,935 acres, or 9.65 per cent. The quantity of new land broken up in the last year was 4639 acres, being 1744 fewer than in the previous year. On an average, however, there were 1183 acres more of new land brought into cultivation annually in the last five years than in the five years immediately preceding them.

The yield of wheat is returned as 977,365 bushels, the largest in the ten years, with the exception of 1872-3, 1874-5, and 1879-80. Taking the mean population for 1882 at 121,014, and the land under wheat at 52,000 acres, the consumption, at 6 bushels per head, and 1½ bushels per acre for seed, would be 804,084 bushels, leaving a probable surplus over home wants, of 173,281 bushels. The yield of barley was only 102,475 bushels, the smallest in the decennium, with the exception of 1877-8 and 1878-9; that of oats, 783,129 bushels, which was exceeded only in three years out of the last ten; that of potatoes, 33,565 tons, which was larger than in any other year of the same period. Passing over other crops, which it would be tedious to particularise, we come to hops, as holding an important place in the exports of the Colony. The produce of last season was 668,846 lbs., being in excess of that of the year before, by 24,573 lbs. For some years the cultivation of hops had been declining, having reached its prime in 1875-6, when the crop was over one million pounds. The apple crop of last year was returned as 142,217 bushels, or 13,020 bushels fewer than in 1880-1. It was, however, above that of the three preceding years.

It appears from the returns that a great advance has been made in the use of machinery for harvesting. Thus the acreage of wheat reaped by machine last season was 29,081, and by hand 22,671,—the machine-reaped being greater by 6410 than the hand-reaped. Ten years ago only 2389 acres were reaped by machine, against 60,001 reaped by hand.

From a note appended to the acreage return we can form an idea as to the relative condition of agriculture and stock-keeping in 1881-2. The number of persons furnishing returns of both agriculture and live stock was 7161; in 1872-3, it was 7103. For the same two years the number furnishing returns of live stock only was 1489 and 809 respectively, so that, while those who combined the pursuits of agriculture and stockraising increased by less than one per cent. (0.816), those who confined themselves to the latter increased by about 83 per cent.—that is, were nearly doubled.

The average of wheat has slightly improved, being 17.79 bushels in the first half of the past decennium; and 18.09 in the latter half; that of barley has declined from 23.61 to 23.00 bushels. The average of oats has risen from 24.66 to 25.20 bushels, while that of hay has diminished, from 1.29 in the former period, to 1.25 in the latter. Of course, these variations in the yield may arise from one or both of two causes,—the nature of the seasons, and the quality of the husbandry.

The prices of agricultural produce as compared with those of 1880-1 seem, in nearly every instance, to have been in favour of the grower. The rate returned for apples was the highest in the ten years; that for pears the highest, with one exception. The wheat crops in South Australia and Victoria in the past season having given an unusually low average (as to the other colonies I have no information at hand), the price may reasonably be expected to be more than ordinarily remunerative to the farmer in the coming season.

Agricultural machinery, pp. 168-171.

Reference has been made in this and former reports to the increase of machinery in agricultural operations. When we come to examine the return specially relating to this matter, we find a very satisfactory measure of progress in the past year, as compared with former years. Clod-crushers were fewer than they were for several years past, and so were irrigation works, although lift and force pumps (many of which are doubtless used for the purpose of irrigation), had increased to a very great extent, namely, from 15

in 1874 to 175 in 1881. On all other machines there was an increase. Thus chaff-cutters, which in 1872 were 77, in 1881 were 494 (the numbers worked by steam being 4 and 28 respectively); cultivators were 48 in 1872, and 168 in 1881. Of corn-crushers there was only 1 returned in 1872, but 127 in 1881. The use of hay elevators has fluctuated very considerably, but on the whole it has been in favour of the later years; while hay rakes (horse) increased from 104 to 229. Horse hoes, grubbers, and scarifiers were 631 in 1881 and 358 in 1872; ploughs (subsoil) 236 in 1881, and 28 in 1872—an increase of 743 per cent. Double-furrow ploughs, of which there were none in 1872, and only 4 in 1873, had increased to 450 in 1881; and in the latter year 11 treble-furrow ploughs were also returned. Reaping machines increased in the ten years from 66 to 140; reapers and mowers combined from 35 to 257; strippers from 3 to 9. One of the greatest improvements that has been made in farming appliances is the late invention of the reaper and binder. This machine seems to have been introduced in 1879-80. The number, which was then returned as 47, had increased in 1881-2 to 130.

Dividing the greater number of these machines into three classes—those used for preparing the soil for the crop; for gathering in the crop; and for converting it after it is harvested—we shall see more clearly what progress in this department of industrial economy has been made in the past ten years.

The rates of increase per cent. were 209, 159, and 686, respectively, as regards the different classes, and 223 on the total.

It is doubtless much to be regretted that in consequence of the increased difficulty in obtaining labour and the exclusion of our produce from other markets by the operation of hostile tariffs, agriculture does not now hold the position in this Colony that it did under more favourable conditions; but the above figures show that a real and great advance has been made in the true principles of economical farming. Had there been no such advance not only would agriculture have been in a much worse position than it is, but, in the face of such impediments, it would have been hardly possible at all.

In the number of Live Stock (horses, cattle, sheep, and pigs,) returned on 31 March, Live Stock, 1882, as compared with the number in the previous year, there was a general increase, as pp. 172-3. the following figures will show:—

Goats numbered 1760, or 12 more than in 1881, but they were fewer than in any other year of the last decennium.

The imports of Live Stock in 1881 were—Sheep, 11,458, cattle, 1953; the increase on sheep being 265, and on cattle 245.

The increase in the export of live stock in 1881 has already been mentioned in a previous part of this report. It may be mentioned here, as showing the improvement in the breed of stud sheep, that while in 1872 the sheep were valued at an average of £6 7s. 5d., in 1881 the average was £29 6s. 7d. each, or more than four times as much

There were slaughtered at the public slaughter houses in 1881—Sheep, 87,473; cattle, 9131; pigs, 5054. On the cattle there was an increase of 812; on the pigs of 314; while on the sheep there was a decrease of 1730.

The reports of the Collectors of Agricultural Statistics for the past year are generally favourable. Nearly all bear testimony to the increase and beneficial results of laboursaving machines, such as double and treble-furrow ploughs, and the string binders; and several speak of the improvement in the breed of stock, and quality of wool; also of the increasing use of manures. At Deloraine attention was being turned to the shipping of

horses for the Melbourne market. An impetus was given to grazing in some districts by the mines, which are causing a demand for fat stock. At Hamilton the growth of hops was increasing, four or five persons having made new plantations. Mention is made of an agricultural and pastoral society as having been formed at Scottsdale, and its exhibition of implements and stock is reported to have been good. One of the most progressive parts of the island, judging from the report of the collector, is Port Sorell. "There is," he says, "a marked improvement in the mode of cultivation. For many of the larger farms rotation of crops has been the rule, and artificial manures, guano and bone dust, largely employed throughout the district with great success." In regard to drainage he states that it was but little attended to, and assigns as a reason that the cost of the tiles is almost prohibitory. In the district of Russell considerable sums are reported to have been expended on drainage, "with very marked results;" although, as is nearly always the case, "with few exceptions, farmers are slow to recognise the benefits to be derived" from it. The grain crops were superior to those of 1880-1, and it is noted that "in nearly every case the actual amount threshed has far exceeded the estimate of even the most sanguine." Among other signs of progress in this district is the introduction by one enterprising gentleman of the Angora goat. Attempts were made years ago on this side of the island to acclimatise this animal, but for some reason or other, they seem not to have produced any permanent result.

The chief difficulties mentioned, as standing in the way of the tillers of the soil were, the rabbits, the codlin moth, the want of hand labour, and the cost of carriage. Some districts also suffered from an excess of rain in harvest time.

The Collector at New Norfolk refers to his having experienced "great trouble, and in one instance, obstruction, in the matter of filling up the Schedules" asking for the required information. "There were very few of them returned filled in correctly. Some had been laid aside too carefully and lost." In the one instance mentioned, he found it necessary to draw attention to the section of the Statistical Returns Act printed on the Schedules, imposing a penalty on any person refusing or neglecting to afford information, before the objector could be induced to answer the enquiries. One of the hardest things is to get the rustic mind to perceive the importance of obtaining full and accurate information as to tillage, crops, &c., and to understand how much the rise and fall of prices may depend upon the nature of such information. The only idea which the ignorant or unthinking attach to such enquiries generally is, that they are a part of some insidious plan to impose upon him new taxation; and it is hard to make such persons see that it is for the advantage not only of all, but more especially of the rural population themselves, that the Statistics of agriculture should be as perfect as possible.

#### VII.-LAW, CRIME, &c.

Commitments, p. 176.

There was, generally, a much smaller amount of crime in 1881 than in 1880 and several preceding years.

Thus the number of persons committed for trial was only 99, against 129 in 1880, 114 in 1879, and 109 in 1878. The years 1876 and 1877 were the only ones of the decennium in which the number was as low as in 1881.

Superior In the Superior Courts 64 persons were tried in 1881, 28 being charged with Courts, p. 176. offences against the person, 29 with offences against property, and 7 with miscellaneous offences. These offences were further classed as felonies, 31; misdemeanors, 33. Of the number tried, 51, or nearly 80 per cent., were convicted. The criminal cases dealt with by the higher Courts were never so few in any year of the last ten. In 1872 they were 108; in 1880, 98. Felonies have greatly diminished, the number in 1872 being 95. Misdemeanors, on the other hand, have increased, having been only 13 in 1872.

Inferior Courts, pp. 177-179. The cases dealt with by Magistrates in 1881 were 7566. This number was lower than in any other years of the decennium, except 1872 and 1874. The convictions were 4685, or nearly 62 per cent. of the whole number dealt with. The offences of the persons summarily convicted were classed as follows:—Against the person, 294; against property, 384; others, 5272. The number of persons discharged or acquitted by Magistrates was 1526.

Ratio of Population.

The prevalence of crime in reference to population, as between the first and last years of the past decennium, will be seen at a glance from the following figures, which show the proportion per 10,000:-

The convictions before Magistrates do not include those cases which resulted only in orders for the payment of money, such as complaints of servants against masters, or of wives against their husbands of neglecting to maintain them. The number of such cases in 1881 was 1265.

The offences reported to the Police but not prosecuted in that year, were 526—one Offences not more than in 1880.

The number of Judgment Summonses issued in 1881 was also smaller than in 1880 being 88 against 113. The writs of Fi, fa, were however more numerous, being 863, against 803.

Two petitions were presented to the Supreme Court in its Matrimonial Jurisdiction Divorce, p. in 1881—being one more than in 1880. One decree was granted—against 5 in 1880.

Bankruptcies, p. 184. The Bankrupteies in 1881 were little more than half as many as there were in 1880, the petitions for liquidation by arrangement being 26 and 49, the petitions by creditors against defaulting debtors 7 and 13 respectively. In very few of the last ten years have the numbers been so small as they were in 1881. The assets and liabilities of bankrupts (so far as they could be ascertained) were also of smaller amount in that year than in the one preceding.

Mortgages, pp. 184-5.

The Mortgages were more numerous, and involved a larger amount of property in 1881. The figures were—

Lands Titles Office, p. 185. The number of transactions in the Lands Titles Office in 1881 was 1417; the amount, £464,054; the acreage of town and suburban lands dealt with 1510, of country lands 128,616. As compared with the previous year these figures show the following increases:—On the number of transactions, 192; on the value of property, £91,209; on acreage of town property, 171; on acreage of country lands, 9887.

Bills of Sale, p. 186. The Bills of Sale in 1881, (including renewals) were 294; in 1880, 273. The amount secured in the two years was £97,269, and £86,865, respectively.

Grant Deeds, p. 186. The Grant Deeds enrolled in 1881 were not so numerous as in 1880, being 226, against 260.

Inquests, p. 187-188. The Inquests on Deaths were 138 in number, being more by 23 than in 1880. The years 1879 and 1880 had however an exceptionally small number. The causes of death assigned by juries on inquests are utterly useless for statistical or any other purposes. An instance in point occurred quite lately in this Colony, in which (if the proceedings were correctly reported), the jury followed the usual course of returning one of the stupid and senseless verdicts to which juries are so obstinately wedded, of "natural causes," "visitation of God," &c., in spite of the clearest medical evidence of the death of the deceased having been caused by his own excesses. I would submit whether some means could not be devised of dealing with such cases; whether, for example, if the jury were satisfied with the medical testimony, power might not be given to the Coroner to direct a verdict to be entered in accordance with it, rather than to leave the cause of death to be assigned by men who are in most cases utterly unable to understand the nature of the medical evidence, and the importance of recording accurately how the subject of enquiry came by his death. Whenever it is known, the specific cause of death, such as "apoplexy," "heart disease" (stating the particular form, as aneurism, fatty degeneration, pericarditis, valvular disease, &c.), "excessive drinking," &c. should be recorded, and not such generalities as those just mentioned, or others which are often made to serve the purpose.

It appears that there was only one case of murder or manslaughter in each of the last two years. In 1881 the cases of suicide were 12, being unusually numerous. The largest number in any other of the last ten years was 10, in 1877.

Police, pp. 218-9.

The Territorial Police is stated to have cost in 1881, £12,465, the whole number of the force being 104. The return for the Municipal Police for the same year has not been furnished up to the time of writing, but from the accounts rendered by the Municipalities of their Expenditure, the cost of the Municipal force as a whole appears to have been £23,190,\* making the whole expenditure for police purposes £35,655, which is equal to 6s. 1d. per head of the mean population.

#### VIII.—Education, &c.

Public Schools, pp. 190-91. The Educational System of this Colony includes—1. Public (primary) Schools under the Board of Education. 2. Exhibitions to Superior Schools in the gift of the Board and Council of Education. 3. Two Minor Scholarships tenable in the Colony by the senior Associates of Arts. 4. The Tasmanian Scholarships tenable at certain Universities in the United Kingdom.

The Public Schools in 1881 were 175 in number, 4 more than in 1880, and 36 more than in 1872; the teachers and assistant teachers 287, the pupil teachers and paid monitors 69; the number of distinct scholars on the rolls in the year, 13;644; the average number on the rolls, 9258; the average daily attendance 6701. On the number of distinct scholars, as compared with those in 1880, there was an increase of 1358; on the average number on the rolls, of 906; and on the average daily attendance, of 699; the last being at the rate of 11.64 per cent.

These public (or primary) schools cost the State £19,648, £2035 8s. or 10.36 per cent., being for administration and inspection. The parents and guardians contributed £7026 in school fees, making the total burden upon the people for primary education £26,674; the amount per head of mean population being, from public sources, 3s.  $4\frac{1}{4}d$ .; school fees, 1s.  $9\frac{1}{4}d$ .; in all, 5s.  $1\frac{1}{2}d$ .

The whole number of Exhibitions established is 45, 8 being in the gift of the Exhibitions, Council of Education, and 37 (24 for boys, and 13 for girls) in that of the Board of p. 192. Education. Eleven of these Exhibitions were awarded in 1881, 2 by the Council, and 9 (6 to boys and 3 to girls) by the Board. The whole expenditure on this account was

The expenditure of the Council of Education in 1881 was £1779 is. 10d., the Council of outlay in connection with the degree of Associate of Arts being £252 4s. 1d.; with the Education, Minor Scholarships, £160; and with the Tasmanian Scholarships, £1300; the cost of p. 192. administration being £66 17s. 9d.

Forty-three returns relating to Friendly Societies in 1881 were filed in accordance Friendly with the Act, being four fewer than in the preceding year. The arrangements for the registry of these Societies being defective, there are no efficient means of ensuring that the provisions of the Friendly Societies Act shall be faithfully carried out, and practically the Societies or branches of Societies may file accounts or not, just as they please. I have not been able, therefore, to ascertain officially which of these societies or branches have failed to comply with the requirements of the law, but have drawn up a list from the best information obtainable, and attach it to this report as an Appendix.

It will be seen that the number of returns which were filed for 1880, and were omitted to be so filed for 1881, was 8; and that 24 societies or lodges neglected to render accounts for either year. It is unnecessary to point out what a safeguard the furnishing and publication of such accounts is to the members of the Societies, and how important it is to a very large class of the people that the solvency of these Societies should be maintained.

The revenue, expenditure, and capital of the Societies which filed returns for the last two years, is shown in the following table, fractions being omitted:-

Thus, although there were four returns fewer filed for 1881 than for 1880, there was an increase in the members of 227, in the receipts of £628, in the expenditure, of £834, and in the capital, of £214.

It thus appears that the expenditure has increased more rapidly than the revenue, or than any of the other figures here given: in other words, the expenditure has been out of proportion to the general progress of the societies, assuming, of course, that it does not include transfers to capital account.

#### IX.—VITAL STATISTICS.

Births, pp. 198; 208.

The year 1881 was a very favourable one as regards vital phenomena. The number of Births registered was 3918,—the largest yet known in the Colony,—and the rate per 1000 (33.40) was the highest since 1862.

The males born in 1881 were 2029; the females, 1889. Of the total births 51.79 per cent. were males, and 48.21 per cent. females. The proportion of males to females was as 107.41 to 100—an unusual excess of the former.

Deaths, pp. 199-206; 208.

The Deaths during the year were 1733, 1038 being males, and 695 females. They were fewer than in 1880 by 99. The general rate of mortality was 14.77 per 1000,—the lowest since 1873, when it was 14.60. For males, the rate was 16.69, for females, 12.61 per 1000.

The deaths of infants under one year of age were 23.37 per cent. of the whole number of deaths; and the rate of mortality per 1000 living under that age was 114.54. The proportion borne by the deaths of infants under one year to the births during the past year was 10.34 per cent., that is, one out of every 9.67 died. This is a lower rate than is found in the other Australasian colonies, with the exception of New Zealand and New South Wales. In Victoria, in 1880, "one infant died to every 8 births, or 11.86 infants to every 100 births. In the eleven years 1869 to 1879 the proportion of infants dying before completing their first year was 12.18 to every 100 births." The number of deaths to every 100 births in each of the Australasian colonies for the same eleven years is shown below. †

The very large proportion at 70 and upwards (21·17, or more than one fifth), will be at once perceived. The per-centage of deaths in Victoria in 1880 at 65 and upwards, was only 11·91.

Comparing these proportions with those for 1880, we find an increase as regards infants and children under five years, and also as regards adults of the age of 50 and upwards except at 90 and over. At all other ages the per-centages were lower. The differences may be shown thus:—

In the first quarter of the year there occurred 457 deaths; in the second, 432; in the third, 413; in the fourth, 431. In both 1881 and 1880 the first quarter was the most fatal; but in 1881 the minimum of deaths occurred in the third quarter, while in 1880 it was found in the fourth. Autumn seems to have been regarded by the ancients as the most unhealthy season of the year. Thus the Greek poet Bion:

"I would not autumn, since its fruits do breed disease."

The following figures show the comparative prevalence of the various specified Diseases, pp. causes of death, classified according to the system now in general use, in the last three 200-3. years; the figures indicating the proportion of diseases in each class to 100 diseases of all classes:-

We have here a decrease of zymotic and local, but an increase of constitutional and developmental diseases, and of deaths from violence.

The increase in developmental diseases is found chiefly under the head of "old age," the deaths from this cause having been 238 in 1881, against 230 in 1880, and 231 in 1879. Diseases of children were also more fatal in 1881 than in 1880 and 1879. There has been a very serious increase in the deaths from premature birth. Going back as far as the records will admit, we find that in the septennial period, 1868-74, the average number of deaths per annum from this cause was 16, while in the next seven years it was 24, having increased by 50 per cent. in that time! Various theories to account for this fact may be suggested, but only medical men will be able from their actual experience to trace the matter to its true source, whether that be found in dress, morals, or social habits.

While, however, premature birth has been so much more frequent, it is satisfactory to find that parturition has become less dangerous than it was formerly, the average number of deaths from this cause having been 16 57 per annum in the seven years 1868-74, and only 15.86 in the next seven years ending in 1881. If we take into account the increase of population, the difference in the mortality would be much greater.

Under violent deaths we find that while those from accident or negligence were 3 more in 1881 than in 1880, the suicides were fewer by 2; the total number under this class being the same in both years.

In reference to the increases in the proportions noted above it should be observed that while the proportion per cent. of a class of fatal diseases or of any one disease to the whole number may be greater, it does not by any means follow that the proportion to the population is greater; it may, on the contrary, be absolutely smaller.

Hitherto, although we may have been able to ascertain the rate of mortality for the Colony as a whole, we could never discover what it was for any single district, inasmuch as, while the deaths in each Registration District were known, the population of many of those districts was not known, and there were therefore no means of calculating the ratio of deaths to population. In the Census of 1881 this defect was remedied, and we can now compare the vital statistics of one part of the Colony with those of another. The following Table will afford the means of doing this, as far as the deaths are concerned. It should be observed, however, that the population shown by the Census (which was taken on the 3rd April) having been used in the calculation, the death rate will be slightly higher than if the rates had been computed on the mean population, namely, that at the middle of the year. The districts are ranged in the order of mortality.

The rates at Hobart and Launceston are excessive for such a healthy climate as that of Tasmania, and such as ought not to prevail if a proper system of sanitation were observed. As regards Hobart, the mortality in 1881 was below the average of the three years 1879-81, the number of deaths being 648, 646, and 638 respectively; as regards Launceston it was higher, the deaths being 331, 318, and 355 respectively. If we take the average deaths for the three years, and calculate the rate of mortality as before, on the population as shown by the Census, it would be as follows:—

giving a difference of 3.65 persons in every 1000 in favour of Launceston, instead of only 2.24, as found for 1881. The registration districts of Beaconsfield and Sheffield were created only in January of that year, and we cannot therefore compare the mortality in them with that of previous years. Beaconsfield stood third in the order of mortality. New Norfolk, Horton, Longford, Fingal, and Ringarooma had each a lower number of deaths than in 1879. For Campbell Town the number was the same as in 1879, but lower than in 1880—Clarence and Kingston had about half the number for 1879; Port Cygnet only about one-fifth. Esperance, Sorell, Hamilton, Ulverstone, and Westbury had each more deaths; Glamorgan twice as many; Emu Bay nearly twice; Green Ponds and Spring Bay more than twice; Portland had treble the number in 1879; but this is probably due to the rapid increase of population in that district.

The mortality for Ringarooma and Port Cygnet for 1881, as shown above, is extraordinarily low. Taking the average deaths for three years, as before, the rate for Ringarooma would be 6·17, and for Port Cygnet 7·50 per 1000.

After making all due allowances, the average rate of mortality in some of the rural districts will still be as low as 7 per 1000. For Esperance the rate, calculated on the average of deaths for the last three years, would be only 5.49 per 1000.

Diseases and Deaths; in Hospitals, pp. 209-12. The cases of specified disease of in-patients treated in the Hospitals in 1881 were 1578; and in one case only the cause was not specified; making a total of 1579 cases. The deaths being 166, the rate of mortality was 10.51 per cent. Calculated on the admissions, the rate of mortality was 10.58 per cent. In 1880 the cases treated were 1630, the deaths 163, and the mortality exactly 10 per cent.,—slightly under that of 1881. The cases of out-patients treated in 1881 were 1943 at Hobart, and 108 at Launceston. The cases at Hobart were 214 fewer than in 1880; those at Launceston cannot be compared, as the number in 1880 was not stated.

The sickness and mortality in the other Government Establishments, together with In other Establishments, are shown in the subjected to blo :-the average age of the inmates, are shown in the subjoined table:-

As compared with the previous year, the mortality of lunatics was greater, that of paupers was higher at the Brickfields, and Launceston, but lower at New Town; that of criminals in the Gaol at Hobart was slightly higher, while at Launceston it was very much lower, the rate in 1880 being 6.10.

The marriages in 1881 were returned as 856, being 16 more than in 1880. The rate Marriages, per thousand of the mean population was 7.30, being lower than in 1880, 1878, and 1872, pp. 206-208. but higher than in the other years of the past decennium.

The following denominations had an increase in the number of marriages in 1881:-Church of England, 9; Free Church of Scotland, 8; Independents, 15; Baptists, 4; "Christians," Ž. The Church of Scotland, (or Presbyterian Church as it is now called) had a decrease of 6; the Church of Rome and the Primitive Methodist Church, of 10 each. Five couples were married by Deputy Registrars in 1881, against 1 in 1880, 3 in 1879 and 1878. Five were married in that manner in 1877, and 6 in 1876.

The history of vaccination in Tasmania from the year 1863, when vaccination was vaccination, first made the subject of legislation, and public vaccinators were appointed, up to the p. 208. present time, can be learned from the following figures, showing as far as can be known, the number of persons vaccinated in the several years:-

There is no record of any vaccinations between 1866 and 1877. The whole number of persons vaccinated between 1863 and 1881, according to the figures given above, was 29,302, the number of births registered being 55,275. It will be seen that thrice only within that period did the number rise as high as a thousand in any one year. When the fears of the people are strongly excited by the near approach of smallpox, and the danger of its actual coming to their own homes, they will be eager enough to rush to the vaccinator, but when the panic is over they at once relapse into their usual state of apathetic indifference.

#### X.—Miscellaneous.

The returns relating to the Political Franchise show that as regards the electors for Political the Legislative Council, before the last revision there were 3265 on the rolls; that at such revision, early in the present year, 207 were struck off, and 321 added, leaving, after revision, 3379 names on the rolls,—a gain of 116 as compared with the previous year.

The number of electors for the House of Assembly before revision was 15,560: 2341 were struck off, and 3200 added; the number after revision standing at 16,419, or 874 more than in the preceding year. Since the revision a general election has taken place, the result being that out of 32 seats, 11 were contested. The contested districts had in the aggregate 5481 electors of whom 3560, or nearly 65 per cent., polled. There were 136 informal ballot papers, making the total number of electors who intended to exercise their right of voting, 3696, or 67.43 per cent. The informal ballot papers were in the proportion of 3.68 per cent. of the whole number of electors who came to the poll. At the previous election, in 1877, 22 seats were contested, and 7557 out of 10,625, or 71 per cent., recorded their votes.

Main Line Railway, pp. 215-6. The returns furnished by the Manager of the Main Line Railway show a very satisfactory increase of the passenger traffic in the year 1881. The passengers were 179,106, against 163,454 in 1880,—an increase of 15,652, or 9.57 per cent. The tonnage of goods decreased by 1794, having been 25,353 in 1880, and only 23,559 in 1881. The live stock conveyed were also fewer, being 1215 and 1060 in 1880 and 1881 respectively.

Since the first complete year (1877) in which this railway was running, the increases have been these:—

the increase on the working expenses being only 7.94 per cent.

In 1877 there was shown a loss on working of £11,687: this has been reduced year by year, and for 1881 there appears a profit of £358.

An additional return has been courteously furnished for 1881, showing the working of the line in more detail than was given in former years.

Conclusion.

The present occasion being the last on which I shall be called upon to undertake the compilation of the official Statistics of this Colony, I trust that a very few remarks of a personal nature may not be deemed out of place. The work has been performed by me now for sixteen years as an addition to other duties, without any increase of emolument, and amid many difficulties, not the least of which have been the everchanging character of our institutions, and the many instances of delay in furnishing the required information. Every effort has been made to ensure completeness and accuracy, and to do the best that could be done with such materials as were obtainable. That under the circumstances, and with the distractions of other official engagements, the demands of which have become more and more exacting, there should still be some imperfections in the work, was absolutely unavoidable; but I hope that my successor, taking it up under more favourable circumstances, may be able to render it more perfect, and to introduce improvements which hitherto have not been possible.

# POLICE-MUNICIPAL, 1880 AND 1881.

# 1880.

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### EXTRACTS from Reports of the Collectors of Agricultural Statistics.

#### BOTHWELL.

THERE have been no improvements in agriculture during the year, this district, as you are aware, being almost solely a pastoral one; consequently little or no interest is taken in other pursuits.

The rabbits, I regret to say, are getting very numerous, and unless some immediate and combined action is taken, I fear that the sheep in this district at the end of the ensuing year will be far less in numbers than they were at the close of last year.

### CAMPBELL TOWN.

THERE is but little difference in the small amount of agricultural produce of this district from that of last and many previous years, and nothing, I think, worthy of remark. The season, especially the latter part, has been favourable; but I observe there is a slight diminution in the number of sheep from that of last year, which I can only account for by the steady increase of the rabbit plague, despite the vigorous exertions and large expenditure on the part of the sheepowners.

Shearing in the grease appears now to be almost universally adopted.

The breeding of pure stock continues to increase and to be highly remunerative to the breeders.

#### CARNARVON.

There have been no new productions, and the mode of cultivation is similar to last year. The rotation of crops has in many instances been carried out. There is very little manure used at present in this district on account of many of the lands in cultivation being new ground only recently cleared. There is a complete absence of all drainage on account of all the high lands being taken up. There are many hundreds of acres of very good low lands, but the expense of drainage seems to be a bar to them being taken up at present. There is a marked increase both in crops and stock during the last year, and also a great increase of population, many people going into the timber trade as well as opening up the land. In machinery and farm implements there is not the least improvement whatever, the hoe being used more than the plough during the year. There have been two prospecting parties in this district looking for minerals, but failed to find anything worth going into any expense for.

### CLARENCE.

- 1. There are no new productions.
- 2. The mode of cultivating the land is the same as in previous years, except that there is more manure used than formerly.
  - 3. Drainage.—There is nothing done under this head.
- 4. Reaping and binding machines have largely increased in number, as have also the double-furrow ploughs.
- 5. More attention has been paid to the breeding of sheep—principally merinoes. There is (as far as I have been able to gather) no improvement in cattle.

Generally speaking the last harvest has not been a good one in this district, owing principally to the season at seed time, and the want of rain later on in the year.

Labour has also been very scarce and of a very inferior description.

Altogether farming is not in a very flourishing state in this district.

#### DELORAINE.

THERE have been no new productions during the year.

There is an increase in wheat, barley, oats, peas, tares, and artificial grass seed, and also in potatoes, carrots, and mangel wurzel.

The grain crops were very much injured through the heavy rains which fell in the month of February, causing a great quantity of the oat crop to be discoloured, and also damaging a large quantity of the wheat crop.

There is a decrease in horses, as a large number have been purchased and sent to the Melbourne market for sale.

There is a decrease in cattle, owing to the increase of sheep, which may be accounted for by farmers gaining more by sheep than cattle.

Apples and pears have increased, and the grub has not been so destructive as in former years.

In machinery the reaper and binder and several reaping machines are in general use in the district, thereby dispensing with a great deal of the manual labour.

#### EMU BAY.

In forwarding the Agricultural and Live Stock Returns for the year 1882 I beg leave to remark that farmers in many instances have turned their attention to clearing the dead timber and logs off their land: this is the cause of the acreage of permanent and artificial grasses being less than last year.

The crops in most instances have been very good, but farmers find it more profitable to fatten stock, owing to the demand in the mining localities for fat cattle, which realise a good price.

Farming as a rule presents a more prosperous aspect than in previous years.

Nothing worthy of special mention in the improvement in breed of stock.

#### EVANDALE.

No record having been kept in this office of last year's Returns, owing to the death of the late Collector, Mr. Marriott, I am unable to make any comment as to comparison with last year's Returns. I may say that I consider the district is in about the same state as last year, with the exception of a slight improvement by the introduction of double and treble-furrow ploughs. Hay is advancing in price, the demand being greater than last year, owing to losses sustained by farmers through the wet season setting in early and damaging their stacks before thatched.

#### FINGAL.

I have the honor to forward you the Stock and Crop Returns for the District of Fingal for 1882, which have been prepared with every possible care to ensure accuracy.

The increase in acreage under the three principal cereals is greatly in excess of 1881, and the yield satisfactory both in quantity and quality.

I have every reason to believe that the acreage will be further increased next year. The great draw-backs are want of labour and expensive transit to railway—the first being met as far as practicable by the use of improved machinery.

The improvements in mode of cultivation consist mainly in the employment of double-furrow ploughs, by which the land can be got ready for sowing earlier in the season, and the reapers and binders, to save labour and facilitate harvest work.

In the improvement in breed of stock, especially sheep, I have to report that each year shows increased attention is being paid to the growth of wool of fine-woolled sheep; and the mines creating a large demand for meat, the long-woolled breeds are receiving considerable attention.

### FRANKLIN.

I HAVE nothing of special importance to report. There has been a falling off of several thousand bushels in the apple crop as compared with last year's Return. In reference to this subject I may mention that an agitation has recently been set on foot in the district to invite legislation for the protection of the orchards from the codlin moth. Up to the present the district is clean from the ravages of the pest. Preventive measures are required.

I HAVE nothing specially to draw your attention to, this district being a mining one.

### GLAMORGAN.

In submitting my report upon the state and prospects of agriculture and pastoral pursuits in this district for the year ending 31st March, 1882, I have to state that—

1. No new productions have been grown.

- 2. Nothing new in the mode of cultivation. The system of rotation of crops is not adopted. A slight decrease will be noticed under the head of fallow.
  - 3. Not any underground draining.
- 4. In machinery and farm implements a decided increase will be noticed under all heads, which must speak for itself. The new machinery consists of seven (7) pairs of American Disc Harrows, which are highly spoken of.
- 5. A decrease of about one thousand (1000) will be seen to appear in the Return of the number of sheep, which can satisfactorily be accounted for from the fact of a local sale having taken place in March last; otherwise the Return for this year would have shown in excess of that for the previous period. With reference to wool, the prices realised are considered satisfactory.
- 6. Although the acreage in actual cultivation only exceeds that returned for the previous year by less than one hundred (100) acres a noticeable increase will be found to appear in the amount of produce, especially in barley, oats, mangels, artificial grass seed, and apples.

An increase in the acreage of permanent artificial grasses, and a decrease of five hundred (500) acres of all other cultivated land will be noticed.

The several returns have been prepared with great care, and will, I trust, be found to be correct.

#### GREEN PONDS.

- 1. There are no new productions.
- 2. There is no change in the mode of cultivation.
- 3. There is no underground drainage in this district.
- 4. There is no improvement in rearing stock or getting up wool from last report; all the sheep are shorn in grease.
  - 5. Bone-dust and guano are used on several farms as manure.
- 6. The average yield of crops is very fair, wheat being 20 bushels to the acre, barley 21 bushels, and oats 26 bushels. There was more land in cultivation this year than last. There are over 12,000 bushels more wheat than last year. There are more oats this year, but less barley.

Reapers and binders are used on three farms, which is a great saving of labour.

#### HAMILTON.

THE hop crop this year and the sample is as good as I have seen. Hop cultivation seems to be increasing in this district. Four or five persons have laid down new fields.

The area and yield of the wheat crops are larger than that of the previous year, and all the other crops much less.

In drainage I have nothing to report upon.

There is a little improvement in the breeding of horses and horned cattle. Mr. Joseph Clarke, owner of Norton Mandeville Estate, has imported from one of the other colonies a number of first-class heavy breeding mares. There is a decrease under this heading as compared to last year.

The getting up of wool and breeding of sheep appears to be the same. All sheep-owners shear in the grease, with few exceptions, who wash in cold water.

## KINGBOROUGH.

In presenting my Report upon the Agricultural, Pastoral, and Live Stock Statistics herewith, I beg to state that my Report of last year is equally applicable to this. Small fruit growing, such as raspberries and currants, still receives a large amount of attention, there being an increase in the quantity of both, owing to the favourable season, more especially the former. The other crops generally average about the same, there being an increase in some and a decrease in others. In the breeding of live stock there is no improvement, and their numbers average about the same as last year. Dairy farming still receives more attention than agricultural, &c. The Returns herewith have received as much care and attention, so as to ensure accuracy, as it was possible for the Collector to bestow upon them.

### LAUNCESTON, (SELBY.)

THE average return per acre, (except in hay), is much better than that of last year. This is attributable to the favourable season and the use of manure on some of the older lands.

There are no new productions during the year, but an increase in the area under tobacco, which is grown by Chinese in the vicinity of Launceston.

Little change is apparent in the mode of cultivation. Bone dust and guano are used on the older lands, but stable manure is extensively used where procurable, particularly in the neighbourhood of Launceston.

Little, if any, underground drainage is done in this district.

There is no improvement in agricultural machinery this year: the reaper and binders do their work well, and are a great saving of labour.

An Agricultural and Pastoral Society has been formed at Scottsdale, and held its first meeting in December last. It was fairly successful, and the exhibition of agricultural implements and stock good.

There is an increase in horses and sheep. The increase in the latter is accounted for by many small farmers combining pastoral with agricultural pursuits.

The codlin moth has been very destructive this year, thousands of bushels of fruit being destroyed in the orchards round Launceston.

#### LONGFORD.

THE same mode of cultivation being followed as heretofore, we have no new productions of any kind. With respect to the getting up of wool, &c. most of the sheepowners have shorn in the grease this season, finding that it pays them better so to do. A new machine was introduced, being the first in this district, (the Stripper), and which, as far as could be judged, was considered a success, doing its work satisfactorily.

### NEW NORFOLK.

I HAVE experienced great trouble, and in one instance obstruction in the matter of filling up the schedules.

There were very few of them returned filled in correctly: some had been laid aside too carefully and lost; and one producer told me that he had been advised by his father that there was not any law to compel him to fill in the information. I asked him to show me his schedule, which he did. I then drew his attention to the note at foot referring to the law on the subject. He then became a little more tractable, and condescended to allow me to fill it up for him. I had left it almost to the last moment, as he was a hopgrower, and wishing to allow as much time as possible to get a correct return of the weight of hops.

There are not any new productions to record, and nothing new as far as rotation of crop is concerned. Planting of orchards seems to be engaging the attention of some producers, and no doubt there will soon be an increase under that head, if the codlin moth keeps away.

Fallowing and the use of manures are general. Underground drainage is tried in a few instances, but I am not able to state with what result.

Breeding of live stock and getting up of wool is as usual; nothing particular to record.

The season has been one of light crops on the majority of farms. Taken as a whole, the hop crop has been good. Owing to facilities for irrigating, some really fine samples have been turned out.

#### OATLANDS.

There is a slight improvement in the mode of cultivation. There is a small quantity of guano and bone dust used in this district; there is also a little improvement in machinery and farming implements, such as reapers and binders, and double-furrow ploughs; they are coming greatly into use in this district. There is no improvement in the breed of sheep and cattle. There is a great increase in the quantity of wheat and oats grown in the district this year, over last year. Barley is less than last year. Fallow is less than last year. Sheep are a little on the increase; other stock is about the same. The district is in a more prosperous position this year than last year, the crops being generally better, and the produce bringing better prices. Labour is scarce in this district, and only for the little extra machinery and improvement in farming implements farmers could not have got their crops in and the harvest together so well as they did this year.

### PORTLAND.

In presenting my 1 eport of the Agricultural and Live Stock Statistics herewith, I beg respectfully to state that my Report last year is equally applicable to this. The District of Portland is essentially a mining one, and few turn their attention to agriculture, tin mining being more remunerative. There is, I notice, an increase of stock since last year; also an increase in the area of artificial grasses.

#### PORT SORELL.

In transmitting to you the Return of Agricultural and Live Stock for the District of Port Sorell for the year ended 31st March, 1882, I have the honor to report that there has been no attempt made to produce anything new during last year in this district.

There is a marked improvement in the mode of cultivation. On many of the larger farms rotation of crops has been the rule, and artificial manures, guano and bone-dust, largely employed throughout the district with great success.

Tile drainage is but little attended to, the cost of the tiles amounting almost to prohibition.

New and improved farm machinery has been largely introduced this season, in the shape of patent reapers, reapers and binders, and threshing machines. Double-furrow ploughs are also getting now in use, and appear to be doing their work well.

There cannot be much said about our stock or sheep farms this year. There are plenty of really good breeds of both in the district, but neither sheep farming nor stock raising receives that attention it is entitled to. This is in a measure to be accounted for by the fact that the District of Port Sorell is much more fitted for agricultural than pastoral pursuits.

By the Returns furnished you will observe that there is a decrease in the amount of cereals to the extent of 10,307 bushels this year as compared with last, although an increased acreage is shown. I, however, have strong grounds for believing that the crops this season will exceed those of last year, as in nearly every case the actual amount threshed has far exceeded the estimate of even the most sanguine.

There is a large increase of sheep, viz., 5535, over last year. Pigs have also exceeded last year's returns by 1217. There is also a greater number of goats, viz., 48. The increase in goats may be attributed to the successful introduction of the Angora goat by James Smith, Esq., of Westwood, River Forth.

Shipbuilding.—A ketch, to carry about 60 tons, has been built on the Mersey, at Torquay, and will be ready for launching in about three weeks. The low prices obtainable for vessels during the last three years has virtually put a stop to shipbuilding on the coast.

#### RICHMOND.

In transmitting Stock and Crop Returns for this year, I desire to report as follows:-

There are no new productions, nor any special improvements in mode of cultivation, rotation of crops, fallowing, or use of manures.

I have observed no underground drainage whatever.

There is a gradual increase in the use of machinery and farm implements, such as two and three-furrowed ploughs, and reapers and binders.

I cannot report any improvements in the breed of stock, getting up of wool, &c.

The Return shows a decrease in the number of sheep, accounted for by the removal of part of the flock to the Lake District.

The acreage of land under cultivation is larger, and shows a better average in grain crops.

### RUSSELL.

I HAVE the honor to transmit herewith the following Report in connection with the Agricultural Statistics:-

- 1. New productions.—There is nothing to report under this head.
- 2. Improvement in mode of cultivation, rotation of crops, fallowing, use of manures—Such of the farmers as possess the necessary capital evince a desire to work their land in a more systematic manner; still none have adopted anything worthy of being termed rotation of crops. A few farms would not suffer by comparison with those of older and more favourably situated districts; but this is the exception, not the rule. Bone-dust is used in large quantities, and is considered preferable to guano, as being more lasting in its effects. Winter or summer fallowing is seldom resorted to.
- 3. Drainage.—With few exceptions farmers are slow to recognise the benefits to be derived from drainage, but in several instances considerable sums have been expended in this way with very marked results.

- 4. Machinery and farm implements.—Reapers and binders are still unknown in this district, but agricultural implements of a superior description are being more generally used. Two powerful steam threshing machines, with the several horse machines of older date, are found sufficient for present requirements.
- 5. Improvement in breed of live stock, getting up wool, &c.—Nothing calling for special remark under this head. Sheep are invariably shorn in the grease, and there is little pains taken with the getting up or sorting of the wool.

General remarks.—There is a marked falling off in the total area under cultivation, mainly due to the decrease in permanent grasses. Much of the land under this head has for some years been gradually reverting to its original state—grass dying out, and the young bush and weeds taking its place. This season a large proportion was found unworthy of a place in the Return. The grain crop, which promised an unusually heavy yield, sustained much damage during the rains at harvest time, the quality of the grain being much impaired. On the whole, however, the harvest has been a good one, with prices fairly remunerative.

#### SORELL.

In reporting upon the Agricultural, Pastoral, and Live Stock aspects of this district I have the honor to state—

- 1. That there are no new productions of any kind coming under my observation.
- 2. I find that there is an increase of land under cultivation of 963 acres as compared with last year; under rotation of crops, 100; new land broken up during the year, 172 acres. In wheat there is a notable increase of 18,495 bushels; in barley 513 bushels, although there is a decrease of 281½ acres as against that under crop last year. There is an increase of 5594 bushels in oats; in peas 3869 bushels, although last year there were 91½ acres under crop more than this. Apples and pears have also increased, the former 317 bushels, the latter 127. In fact, in every crop there has been a glorious yield. Hay-growing has commanded attention:  $481\frac{3}{4}$  increase of land in crop, with an increased yield of 1198 tons more than previous year.
- 3. In farming implements I notice no change except the importation into the district of two "Woods' Patent String Binding Reaping Machines." They give every satisfaction.
- 4. No material improvement in breed of cattle and sheep, except in the case of one owner who is improving in Leicester sheep.

The barley grub was very destructive in Bream Creek division of this district. High winds were also prevalent during harvest, and did much damage to some of the standing crops which were ripe at the time; as much as 10 bushels per acre of wheat and barley, &c. being "shook" on the ground.

#### SPRING BAY.

I HAVE the honor to submit to you the following Report upon the agricultural and pastoral pursuits for the Rural Municipality of Spring Bay.

- 1. New productions, none.
- 2. Improvements in cultivation, &c. The mode of farming generally is better than it was in former years, and a great deal of bone-dust is now used.
  - 3. Drainage, &c., none.
- 4. Machinery is on the increase; the ploughs and other implements now used are of a superior class, and calculated to save hand labour.
- 5. A steady improvement has been going on in the breed of sheep. The merinoes are most in favour. The coarse-woolled class of sheep are yearly lessened. This, in conjunction with the opening out of the runs (by ringing and scrubbing), makes the wool of a finer and stronger texture than formerly. Cold water is principally used for washing.
