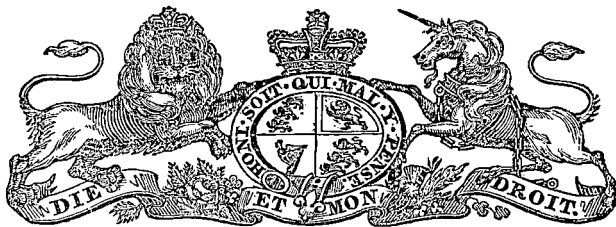

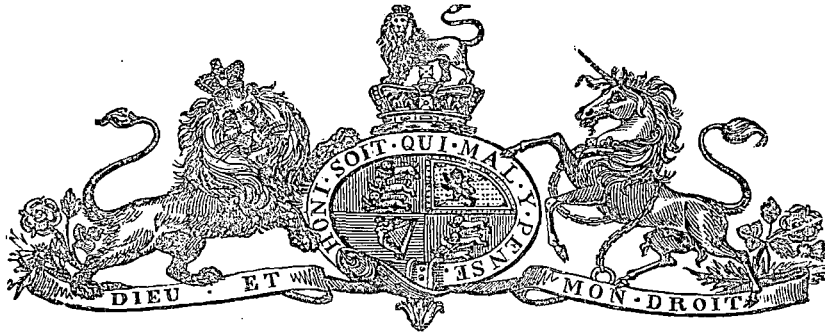

The Petition of Daniel Room, of Launceston, in Tasmania.

HUMBLY SHOWETH:

THAT he has applied to the Surveyor-General for the Eastern Government Swamp to be let by Tender in like manner as other Government Lands in the same locality, your Petitioner believing that the Government will obtain a higher rental by so doing than at present.

As your Petitioner's land is the only private property adjoining the above-mentioned Swamp, and a Street which runs through it to that property not being fenced, will induce him to give a higher rental than any person living at a greater distance who has to re-let or take in cattle to graze by the week.

And further, your Petitioner believes that he has as much right as any one to tender for Government lands.

Not having received an answer from the Surveyor-General, your Petitioner begs that such steps may be taken as to leave the land in question open for the future to public competition.

And your Petitioner, as in duty bound, will ever pray.
