

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

MAIN LINE RAILWAY.

PETITION FROM INHABITANTS OF GREEN PONDS.

Presented by Mr. Maclanachan, September 7; and ordered by the Council to be printed, September 9, 1869.



To the Honorable the Legislative Council, in Parliament assembled.

The humble Petition of the Property-holders, Tradesmen, Ratepayers, and others residing in the Municipality of Green Ponds, in Public Meeting assembled.

RESPECTFULLY SHOWETH:

The injury that would be inflicted upon them by constructing a Main Line of Railway from Hobart Town to Launceston passing along the route now surveyed through Jerusalem, traversing, as it does, a comparatively barren and thinly populated country, and far away from the more populous and fertile Districts contiguous to the Main Line of Road, where large sums of money have been expended on properties which have been made valuable by private capital and enterprize, and now contribute largely to the local rates and General Revenue in support of the Government.

The benefit that would accrue to the Districts of Broadmarsh, Tea Tree, Hamilton, Hunting Grounds, Bothwell, and Green Ponds, by adopting a Line near the Main Road, whereby all those Districts would be brought within reach of the Railway, would partake of its benefits, and greatly increase its traffic receipts by adding largely to its number of passengers and quantity of goods to be carried, to the manifest advantage of the Government, and relief of those who will of necessity be taxed to provide for the cost and construction of a Main Line of Railway.

And your Petitioners are therefore led to express a hope that, in the event of a Main Line of Railway being constructed from Hobart Town to Launceston, no route will be adopted that does not pass very near to the present Main Road between those two places.

And your Petitioners will ever pray.
