NOTICE OF QUESTIONS

1 Mr *Valentine* to ask the Honourable Leader of the Government — With regard Human Resources statistics, detailed by region – South, North, North-West as at 23 August 2022 in the following categories:

- (a) Full Time Equivalent (FTE) establishment;
- (b) total vacant FTEs;
- (c) total FTEs that are subject to an absence, that is an absence being for a period of more than 5 consecutive working days including planned and unplanned leave, leave without pay, suspension or workers compensation; and
- (d) total FTEs subject to an active recruitment process —

can the Government provide the requested FTE information for the following occupations:

- (e) Department of Education(ea) Speech and Language Pathologists.
- (f) Department of Communities Tasmania
 - (fa) Child Safety and Wellbeing Workers;
 - (fb) Child Safety Officers;
 - (fc) Advice and Referral Line Officers;
 - (fd) Child Safety Practice Leaders; and
 - (fe) Support Workers.
- (g) Department of Justice
 - (ga) Community Corrections Probation Officers; and
 - (gb) Diversion Officers.
- (h) Department of Natural Resources and Environment Tasmania
 - (ha) Parks and Wildlife Officers; and
- (hb) Field Officers.

2 Mr Valentine to ask the Honourable Leader of the Government — With regard to midwives working in Tasmania's four major hospitals, can the Government please provide the following details for each hospital:

(1) total number of Birthrate Plus Hours worked in core Midwifery in the past 3 months and the number of those hours worked by midwives;

- (2) number of vacancies within the Midwifery Group Practice (MG) Teams in July 2022 and the percentage this represents of the whole of the nursing workforce vacancies for the hospital for the same period;
- (3) number of student midwives currently practising in the maternity unit and of those, the number of students paid for their first year of clinical placement hours;
- (4) actual number of midwifery resignations in the past 3 months, and the percentage this represents of the midwifery workforce in the hospital;
- (5) COVID leave statistics for midwives for July 2022; and

(6) number of backfilled midwifery positions for July 2022.

3 Mr *Gaffney* to ask the Honourable Leader of the Government — With reference to the Queensland *Revenue Legislation Amendment Act 2022*, and the resulting changes to the Queensland *Land Tax Act 2010*, where from the 1st of July 2023 for an individual or company, the total taxable valuation of their Australian owned land will be included in calculating their Queensland land tax liability – be they a Queensland resident, or that of another state or territory —

- (1) What is the Government's policy in responding to the impact of these and similar legislative changes that arise from other states and territories that have a direct bearing on Tasmanian individuals, business and companies;
- (2) is the Government in a position to advocate for an equitable national policy on land tax before other state and territory governments act in a similarly unilateral way;
- (3) what response has the Government received from Tasmanian and interstate businesses, companies and their representative bodies in response to this legislation in terms of:
 - (a) how this will affect future holdings and investment plans in Tasmania; and
 - (b) how will this affect the operation of Tasmanian businesses in Queensland;
- (4) Australia has over 50 bilateral double taxation treaties with overseas nations and jurisdictions, what treaties and legislation does Tasmania currently have in place with the mainland states and territories to maintain fair and reasonable tariffs, trade, taxation and property ownership between them; and
- (5) (a) whilst this legislation is not a direct tax on the value of Tasmanian property, does the Government agree that it acts as a direct variable in calculating an enhanced tax liability to another jurisdiction? and
 - (i) if so, why; and
 - (ii) if not, why not;
 - (b) does the 2021 Intergovernmental Agreement on Data Sharing compel the Government to collaborate by sharing and corroborating Tasmanian land valuations with the Queensland Revenue Office, and if not legally required will it willingly do so;
 - (c) using the basis of most double taxation treaties and as a result of this legislation, will the Government factor in and forgo the additional land tax paid to the Queensland Revenue Office against an owner's Tasmanian land tax liability; and

(d) does the Government have any plans to introduce similar legislation in Tasmania? (*asked* 27.09.22)

- 4 Ms *Howlett* to move That the Legislative Council —
- (1) Notes the importance that Neighbourhood Houses play in the economic, social and mental wellbeing of Tasmanians;
- (2) acknowledges the significant role volunteers play within Neighbourhood Houses;
- (3) thanks those that work and volunteer at Neighbourhood Houses for the critical role they play in the wellbeing of the community; and
- (4) commends the Rockliff Liberal Government's recent investment of an additional \$1.75 million, equating to an additional \$50,000 for each of Tasmania's 35 Neighbourhood Houses, to allow Neighbourhood Houses to do more to support those in the community.

5 Ms Rattray to move — That Statutory Rules 2022, No. 35, Waste and Resource Recovery Regulations dated 20 June 2022 made under the *Waste and Resource Recovery Act 2002* and laid upon the Table of the Council on 16 August 2022, be disallowed as provided by Section 47 of the *Acts Interpretation Act 1931*.
