Notices of Motion

123 Ms White to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that on 17 October 2018 the House unanimously passed a motion calling on the Premier, Hon. Will Hodgman MP to "include representatives from all sides of politics in state-wide roundtable discussions with health professionals, unions and stakeholder groups between now and the end of 2018."
- (2) Further notes that groups including the Australian Medical Association and the Australian Nursing and Midwifery Federation have supported the concept of all sides of politics working together to address the health crisis.
- (3) Further notes that as of 20 November 2018 no dates had been set for the roundtables.
- (4) Calls on the Premier to immediately provide the House with the details of when the roundtable meetings will occur.
- (5) Orders the Premier to report to the House on the outcomes of the roundtables by 12 March, 2019. (20 November 2018)

124 Dr *Broad* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes the Tasmanian red meat industry is at the cross roads with the closure of lamb and cattle processing at the Devonport City Abattoir.
- (2) Further notes that cattle and lamb service kill capacity is crucial for the business models of many Tasmanian butchers, farmers, restaurants and retailers.
- (3) Further notes that Woolworths has now joined Coles in leaving the Tasmanian lamb market.
- (4) Further notes that the red meat industry must now rely on small abattoirs massively increasing their capacity potentially creating issues with throughput limitations, transport logistics, animal health and animal welfare.
- (5) Further notes that increased slaughter at small abattoirs and the resulting increases in waste, stock yarding and odours has the potential to significantly impact neighbouring property owners.
- (6) Further notes that there is just one remaining Government meat inspector in Tasmania down from four.
- (7) Further notes the Government was warned of the vulnerability of the Tasmanian red meat industry two years ago and yet the Government took no action other than to buy time with a four-year deal with the Devonport City Abattoir owners JBS Swift that ended after two years.
- (8) Further notes the political appointment of the Member for Montgomery, Hon. Leonie Hiscutt MLC as the Chair of a meat taskforce creates further uncertainty due to her upcoming election in May 2019 predating the proposed finalisation of the taskforce report in June 2019. (20 November 2018)

125 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that our primary industries are a key pillar of the Tasmanian economy with the latest Tasmania's Agri-Food Scorecard 2016-2017 showing the gross value of the State's Agri-Food production to be worth \$2.4 billion.
- (2) Further notes that agriculture accounts for almost \$1.5 billion of this figure with the value of seafood production approaching \$0.95 billion.
- (3) Acknowledges that the Hodgman Liberal Government is committed to taking agriculture to the next level in Tasmania and have a target to grow the value of our agriculture sector to \$10 billion a year by 2050, as well as grow the value of our world-class wild catch seafood and aquaculture sector.
- (4) Further notes that under this policy, the Government has committed \$800,000 to Rural Business Tasmania (RBT) over four years, including \$595,000 in new funding over the forward estimates.
- (5) Further notes that this funding will allow RBT to provide Rural Financial Counselling Services and Farm Business Mentoring to support Tasmanian farmers with business skills, financial literacy, planning and debt mediation, further strengthening our agricultural sector.
- (6) Thanks the staff at Rural Business Tasmania, including Chair Geoff Fader and CEO Elizabeth Skirving, for the important role they play in supporting and advancing our farmers and rural communities. (20 November 2018)

126 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that the 2018 Invictus Games were held in Sydney from 20-27 October 2018, with more than 500 ex-servicemen and women from 18 countries competing in 11 adaptive sports.
- (2) Further notes that the Games use the power of sport to aid in the recovery of returned servicemen and women and are a testament to the strength of the human spirit.
- (3) Further notes that the Australian team comprised of 72 athletes, including two Tasmanian-based veterans, Jarrod Kent of Latrobe and Matt Brumby of Devonport.
- (4) Further notes that Jarrod Kent, whose personal motto is 'broken, never beaten', competed in powerlifting and swimming events and Matt Brumby of Devonport, competed in Archery and Wheelchair Rugby. Matt also co-captained the Australian team at the Games.
- Congratulates Matt who won an impressive five gold medals and Jarrod who secured a Personal Best in Powerlifting with a lift of 121kg, and won through to the Long Jump finals, qualifying in first place.
- (6) Acknowledges that other Tasmanian-born Games participants included Bridget Baker (athletics and power lifting), Trent Forbes (cycling), Emma Kadziolka, (athletics and indoor rowing), Steve Sandman (archery), Stewart Sherman (archery and wheelchair tennis) and Sonya Newman (wheelchair basketball, indoor rowing, sitting volleyball and swimming).
- (7) Further notes that a special Welcome Home event for our Invictus Games athletes will be held at Parliament House next Wednesday, 28 November.
- (8) Applauds all our competitors for their participation in the 2018 Invictus Games and thanks them for their service to our country. (20 November 2018)

127 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that construction of the new 5,900 megalitre Dalness Dam is now completed with water is set to flow in the New Year from the new North Esk Irrigation Scheme.
- (2) Further notes that the Dalness Dam is one of five Tranche Two irrigation schemes either delivered, or in the process of being delivered, to supply farmers with the reliable water.
- (3) Further notes that more than \$160 million is being invested by the State and Federal Governments and farmers in the five Tranche 2 irrigation schemes, creating 28,000 megalitres of new water entitlements in the Southern Highlands, Swan, Duck, Scottsdale and North Esk districts.
- (4) Acknowledges that Pipeline to Prosperity (Tranche 3) irrigation program has recently been submitted to Infrastructure Australia, with \$70 million committed by the Hodgman Liberal Government, and includes another 10 potential irrigation schemes

- state-wide, with a capital cost of up to \$496 million, a return of \$114 million a year to the agriculture sector and more than 3,900 direct and indirect jobs anticipated.
- (5) Further notes that through these and other actions, the Hodgman Liberal Government is committed to taking agriculture to the next level in Tasmania and has a target to grow the value of our agriculture sector to \$10 billion a year by 2050. (21 November 2018)
- 128 The Minister for Energy to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Congratulates Aurora Energy for their annual Community Grant Scheme.
 - (2) Notes that the Grant Scheme provides funding for community programs designed to assist Tasmanians to participate in employment, educational and social opportunities.
 - (3) Further notes that recipients of the Aurora Community Grant Scheme for 2018 include Giant Steps Tasmania, Community Housing, St Helens District High School Association, Housing Choices Tasmania and West Moonah Community House.
 - (4) Further notes that the Starting Point Neighbourhood House in Ravenswood was also awarded a \$4,500 grant from the Scheme to upgrade a manual vehicle for its Wheels4work driver education program.
 - (5) Further notes that the Starting Point program is offered to those on low incomes, or Centrelink benefits, with no access to a safe vehicle or suitable supervisor.
 - (6) Further congratulates Aurora Energy and the grant recipients for assisting Tasmanians with social and economic disadvantages. (21 November 2018)

- **5** Tasmanian Export Growth: Adjourned debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 26 September 2018 by Mr *Hidding*, as amended—That the House:—
 - (1) Notes that the most recent export figures released by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) show Tasmania exported a near-record \$3.7 billion of goods in the year to July 2018.
 - (2) Further notes that Tasmania leads the nation with 29.2 per cent growth in exports over 2017, which is nearly four times higher than the national rate of growth.
 - (3) Further notes that over 80 per cent of Tasmanian goods exports were into Asian markets, with top export sectors being mining and mineral products, as well as agriculture and seafood.
 - (4) Further notes that Tasmania's top five export destinations were China, Malaysia, Japan, Taiwan and Thailand representing \$2.25 billion worth of our total exports.
 - (5) Further notes that this continued strong growth in exports demonstrates the success of the Government's plan to open up new opportunities for Tasmanian products, underpinned by Trade Missions with the business sector to important export markets.
 - (6) Further notes that the Government's strong focus on trade is leading to new investment and job creating opportunities in Tasmania. (Next Speaker: Ms O'Connor)
