139 Ms *Butler* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that:—
 - (a) One Nation's submission on the draft Firearms Amendment (Miscellaneous) Bill 2026 opposed key reforms and demanded permanent grandfathering for reclassified firearms;
 - (b) the Liberal Government subsequently weakened its bill by adopting One Nation's grandfathering position; and
 - (c) the Police Commissioner and the Labor Party support a cap on the number of firearms an individual can own, but the Premier, Hon. Jeremy Rockliff MP, the Liberal Party and One Nation all support unlimited guns in the community.
- (2) Recognises that:—
 - (a) One Nation has dictated the Liberal Party's weak position on firearms reform; and
 - (b) a reasonable cap, with appropriate exemptions, would not prevent legitimate recreational hunting, sporting shooting or primary producers from managing their land.
- (3) Agrees the Liberal Party and One Nation are indistinguishable on gun policy, with both putting the interests of the gun lobby ahead of community safety.
- (4) Condemns the Premier, Hon. Jeremy Rockliff MP, for abandoning his National Cabinet commitments and weakening Tasmania's firearms laws because he is worried about losing votes to One Nation.
- (5) Calls on the Government to stop allowing One Nation to write its firearms policy, introduce a reasonable cap on firearm ownership and put community safety first. (1 September 2026)

140 Ms *Brown* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that:—
 - (a) the Government has approved more than \$100,000 in taxpayer-funded legal assistance for the former Tasmanian Heritage Council Chair in relation to Supreme Court proceedings;
 - (b) the former Minister, Ms Madeleine Ogilvie MP, has also received approximately \$120,000 in taxpayer-funded legal assistance relating to Supreme Court proceedings; and
 - (c) the Government has refused to disclose the nature of the proceedings or the parties involved, citing confidentiality obligations.
- (2) Recognises that Tasmanians funding these legal proceedings are entitled to appropriate transparency about the expenditure of public money.
- (3) Calls on the Member for Clark, Ms Madeleine Ogilvie MP, to inform the House whether:—

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- (a) she is a party to the same Supreme Court proceedings for which taxpayer-funded legal assistance has been provided to the former Tasmanian Heritage Council Chair; and
- (b) any taxpayer-funded legal assistance provided to her relates to the same underlying matter, investigation or proceedings involving the former Chair. (1 September 2026)

141 Mr *Garland* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes the significant changes occurring in Tasmania's energy sector and the important decisions being made about how electricity is generated, transmitted and used.
- (2) Recognises that Tasmania's energy future affects communities, industry, electricity consumers, the environment, Aboriginal heritage and the state's economic future, and that Tasmanians hold a diverse range of views about the opportunities and impacts involved.
- (3) Acknowledges the value of bringing communities, the Government, industry, energy users, experts and advocates together to listen to each other, exchange information and explore areas of agreement and disagreement.
- (4) Calls on the Government to support and facilitate a free, multi-day Tasmanian Energy Forum in northern Tasmania by 11 December 2026 that:—
 - (a) is open and accessible to the public;
 - (b) brings together community representatives, the Government, energy businesses, major energy users, environmental and Aboriginal organisations, researchers and other interested Tasmanians;
 - (c) provides for moderated discussion, public questions and presentations on Tasmania's energy opportunities, challenges and choices;
 - (d) provides opportunities for the Minister for Energy and Renewables and relevant Government businesses and agencies to hear directly from participants and respond to questions from the public; and
 - (e) is publicly livestreamed and recorded. (1 September 2026)

142 Mr *Garland* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges:—
 - (a) the 52nd Parliament has a government operating in minority;
 - (b) diversity of political views and representation is a strength of the Parliament;
 - (c) the 'Foundations of Stability' provides an important framework for the Government and Parliament to work effectively and collaboratively in the interests of Tasmanians; and
 - (d) the 'Foundations of Stability' provides for continuous improvement and revision through collaboration where necessary.
- (2) Calls on the Government to:—
 - (a) work collaboratively with the crossbench to review and, where appropriate, update the 'Foundations of Stability', with consideration given to:—
 - (i) strengthening integrity, transparency and accountability;
 - (ii) identifying and addressing barriers to effective collaboration and progress on matters of significant public interest;
 - (iii) improving the capacity of the Parliament to constructively manage disagreement and political division; and
 - (iv) any other relevant matters.
 - (b) table in the House, by 27 October 2026, an updated 'Foundations of Stability', together with a renewed commitment from the Government to it in both letter and intent. (1 September 2026)

143 Mr *Garland* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Condemns the Tasmanian Liberal Government for failing to put Tasmanian communities and the environment first in its energy policy.
- (2) Calls on the Government to show some common sense. (1 September 2026)

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144 Mr *Winter* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes:—
 - (a) the 2026-27 State Budget outlines \$1.47 billion in operational efficiency savings and a reduction of at least 1,700 state service positions; and
 - (b) the Government has not provided a comprehensive account of which jobs, services, programs, and contracts are being cut.
- (2) Orders the Treasurer to table, by 6:00 p.m. Tuesday 27 October 2026, for every general government sector entity, covering the period since 21 May 2026, the following information:—
 - (a) any relevant agency plans, strategies or policies relating to the workforce reductions and savings outlined in the budget;
 - (b) every:—
 - (i) position vacated through a redundancy, including position title, band level, business unit, location and whether the position has been abolished, replaced or refilled;
 - (ii) position abolished or removed through a savings measure, restructure or workforce reduction, including position title, band level, business unit and location;
 - (iii) position left unfilled, frozen or abolished following resignation, retirement or other natural attrition, including position title, band level, business unit and location;
 - (iv) fixed-term employment, contractor, labour hire or consultancy arrangement discontinued, reduced or not renewed;
 - (v) program, service, unit, team or function abolished, discontinued or materially reduced; and
 - (vi) instance where work previously undertaken by an employee, contractor or position identified above has subsequently been outsourced or transferred to another provider, including the provider, location, contract value and duration.
 - (c) the total headcount and FTE reduction, redundancy payments and recurrent savings for each agency; and
 - (d) all new consultancy, contractor and labour-hire engagements entered into, including their value. (1 September 2026)

145 Ms *Rosol* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Affirms the value of older Tasmanians and their right to age well and be treated with respect, kindness and dignity.
- (2) Notes with deep concern that many older Tasmanians are extremely isolated and do not have access to support and care, particularly in rural areas.
- (3) Regrets that service provision failures are resulting in too many older Tasmanians living and dying in terrible circumstances with poor physical and mental health.
- (4) Acknowledges the significant level of community concern about isolated older Tasmanians.
- (5) Recognises there are many complex reasons for isolation of older Tasmanians, including:—
 - (a) stigma;
 - (b) poverty;
 - (c) poor housing;
 - (d) lack of transport;
 - (e) illiteracy;
 - (f) lack of digital access;
 - (g) trauma, anxiety, grief and loss;
 - (h) complex and siloed service systems;
 - (i) workforce shortages;
 - (j) insufficient funding; and
 - (k) short-term thinking.
- (6) Accepts that more needs to be done to meet the needs of isolated older Tasmanians and commits to working together to fix the problem.

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- (7) Agrees that no one level of government can fix the problem of isolated older Tasmanians alone, rather, long-term change will require local, state and federal governments to work together more effectively and break down silos between services.
- (8) Calls on the State Government to:—
 - (a) stop blaming the Federal Government for the problem of isolated older Tasmanians;
 - (b) lead both the conversation and actions to fix the problem; and
 - (c) properly fund the Older Tasmanians Action Plan 2025-2029. (1 September 2026)

146 Ms *Badger* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises the significant community concern expressed over AI factories in northern Tasmania and the present lack of trust between this new tech industry and community.
- (2) Acknowledges that Tasmania could have suitable, socially accepted technology developments, done at an appropriate island scale, in consultation with the Tasmanian community.
- (3) Notes that:—
 - (a) neither the State nor Federal Governments have guardrails in place to ensure the public interest is preserved, including in local job creation, and the protection of local communities and public resources;
 - (b) there is no binding obligation for AI data facilities to provide their own renewable energy requirements;
 - (c) the Standing Committee on Government Administration A has established an inquiry into AI data centres, with Terms of Reference including the recommendation of legislative and regulatory guardrails; and
 - (d) one of the largest ever parliamentary e-petitions calling for a moratorium on AI data centres has attracted circa 10,000 signatures.
- (4) Calls on the State Government to:—
 - (a) table, by 8 September 2026:—
 - (i) transparent public updates on energy negotiations, including emails, briefing papers and meeting notes, for Firmus' Bell Bay and Wesley Vale sites; and
 - (ii) details of all proposed AI data proponents working with the Office of the Coordinator General, their locations, and estimated power and water consumption.
 - (b) establish an immediate moratorium on all new AI data facilities that have not been provided a power contract, until the Standing Committee on Government Administration A's Inquiry has been completed, and legislative and regulatory guardrails are in place. (1 September 2026)

147 Prof *Razay* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges that participation in music enhances physical, mental, emotional and social wellbeing, contributes to healthier and more active ageing for older Tasmanians, and also encourages important inter-generational connections.
- (2) Recognises that many older Tasmanians face financial barriers to participate in musical pursuits – including choirs, orchestras, community bands and singing groups – despite the significant health and wellbeing benefits these activities provide to both individuals and communities.
- (3) Agrees that investment in preventative health measures that promote lifelong learning, creativity, and social connection can improve quality of life, reduce loneliness and support healthy ageing while strengthening community connection.
- (4) Calls on the Government to:—
 - (a) broaden the Ticket to Wellbeing program to include music activities as a means of promoting healthy ageing, social connection and wellbeing; and
 - (b) encourage partnerships between all tiers of government, community organisations and music providers to maximise access and participation across the state. (1 September 2026)

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148 Mr *Vermeij* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that access to finance during the factory construction phase has been a significant barrier to the uptake of modular housing in Tasmania.
- (2) Welcomes the Tasmanian Government's release of legislation to establish the Modular Housing Finance Guarantee Scheme.
- (3) Recognises that the Scheme will partner with lenders to guarantee a portion of construction finance for eligible modular homes while they are being manufactured offsite.
- (4) Acknowledges that the Scheme will support greater housing supply by making modular housing more accessible to Tasmanians.
- (5) Further notes that modular housing can deliver homes more quickly and efficiently than traditional construction methods.
- (6) Further recognises the opportunities the Scheme presents for Tasmanian manufacturers, builders and regional communities.
- (7) Supports the Government's ongoing commitment to increasing housing supply as part of the 2030 Strong Plan for Tasmania's Future. (1 September 2026)

149 Ms *Howlett* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that the Federal Government's cut to the private health insurance rebates for senior Australians will result in more older Tasmanians relying on the public health system.
- (2) Recognises that older Tasmanians are already being impacted by a lack of aged care beds and these changes will only exacerbate this issue further.
- (3) Calls on the Australian Government to reverse these changes to the private health insurance rebate for Tasmanians aged over 65. (1 September 2026)
