



## **NEW TOWN CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS:**

REPORT FOR 1883.

Presented to both Houses of Parliament by His Excellency's Command.



ANNUAL REPORT of the New Town Charitable Institution for the Year 1883.

Charitable Institution, New Town, 11th March, 1884.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to present the fourth Annual Report of the New Town Charitable Institution for the year 1883.

I am happy in reporting that the additions made to the Male Division have very much added to the comfort and convenience of the inmates, and have enabled me to a certain extent to classify many of the cases and ailments which were before distributed over the Institution.

The cost of maintenance for each inmate for the year amounts to £13 4s. 10d., being  $8\frac{3}{4}d$ . per diem. This is slightly in advance of last year, and may to a great extent be accounted for by a larger issue than formerly of clothing, bedding, and other stores, rendered necessary by the wear and tear of the old supplies from the Brickfields. The amount expended upon repairs has also added considerably to the cost.

In reference to the remarks in my last report upon the defective water supply of the Institution, I am glad to state this serious defect will shortly be remedied, a vote of £300 having been sanctioned to defray the cost of building a new reservoir, &c. I am also pleased to inform you that tenders are called for to fit part of the Institution for the increased Hospital accommodation rendered necessary by the many helpless persons now in the Institution.

Latterly the stamp of people who have received orders for admission are totally unfitted from age and their own infirmities to fill the position of attendants, consequently during the year I have experienced the greatest difficulty in finding inmates (males and females) fitted to take charge of the hospital wards, which contain many sick and bedridden cases. There are a great number of chronic complaints where kind nursing is indispensable, particularly in cases of those who are in themselves perfectly helpless and require lifting and assistance on all occasions when a change of position is necessary. Eventually it will be found that a better class of attendants will be an advantage.

In the attached returns you will observe that the numbers are less than any previous year.

Detached parties are, as formerly, located at the Cornelian Bay Cemetery and Government Farm, New Town.

The health of the inmates, considering the number of shattered constitutions, is surprising, proving the favourable position of this locality. The death-rate, viz., 109 males and 24 females, at the average age of 73 years, explains itself.

The conduct of the inmates for the past year, taken generally, has been good.

I have again to thank the proprietors of the Mercury, Church News, Catholic Standard, and People's Friend, and many others, for their very great kindness in supplying papers for the use of the inmates.

The chaplains of the Institution, the clergy of dissenting denominations, laymen, lady visitors, and others have been unremitting in their endeavours to advance the spiritual welfare and the general comfort of the inmates.

The officers of both divisions have performed their duties during the year to my entire satisfaction.
