ANNUAL REPORT, 1887.

SIR,

IN accordance with the Rules of the Hobart General Hospital, I have the honor to lay before you the following Annual Report, containing such tabulated and other information as will, I trust, fully exhibit the working of that Institution during the past year.

2. Twenty Board and ninety-nine Committee meetings were held during the year, at all of which the attendance of Members was, without exception, good; while during the same period the Honorary Medical Staff made about twelve hundred and fifty visits to the wards of the Hospital.

3. The annual cost of each occupied bed in 1878 was £82 14s. 5d.; in 1879, £72 13s. 6½d.; 1880, £64 6s. 0½d.; 1881, £68 11s. 1d.; 1882, £68 3s. 6d.; 1883, £68 11s. 10d.; 1884, £68 3s.; 1885, £67 15s.; 1886, £68 12s. 5d., and for the past year, £73 6s. 9d.

4. It is satisfactory to note that during the past few years the amount of money received from patients who were able either in whole or in part to pay for their maintenance in Hospital has shown a steady upward tendency. In 1882, £222 16s. 11d. was collected; in 1883, £470 1s. 2d. was collected; in 1884, £593 5s. 8d. was collected; in 1885, £613 8s. was collected; in 1886, £789 12s. 3d.; and for the past year £844 has been collected.

5. The new Hospital for the treatment of infectious and other diseases, completed and opened for the reception of patients in the month of April, 1884, continues to give great satisfaction; its adaptation to the objects for which it was designed appearing to be as perfect as could be desired.

6. In furtherance of the views entertained by the Board of Management, and fully participated in by the Government,—namely, the desirability of securing ample space for the present and future requirements of the General Hospital,—an additional allotment of land was purchased fronting on Campbell-street, the Government thus acquiring possession of the entire square, with the exception of one strip of property fronting on Liverpool-street. That it is desirable to secure the whole square for Hospital purposes admits of no doubt; and keeping in view the permanent character of the buildings already erected, and the vast improvements thereby effected within the last few years, no further argument is needed to urge the consideration of this matter on the attention of Government. In 1885 plans were submitted to the Government, and approved, for the erection of a block of buildings on a portion of the Campbell-street ground. This block was to consist of a morgue suitable for the wants of the city and the Hospital, also a suite of separate apartments for the control and observation of females suffering from mental derangement, also accommodation for ambulance, &c., together with rooms intended for storage purposes, and a covered airing-court for convalescents. A contract was accepted by the Government for this work in the beginning of the year, and the whole is now completed and ready for occupation, thus supplying a want long and painfully experienced.

7. During the past year many improvements of importance have been effected. But while noting with satisfaction the progress thus achieved, it must not be forgotten that much yet remains to be done. Old buildings have to be removed, boundary fences erected, grounds levelled, laid out, and planted, and, above all immediate wants, that of a new kitchen is the most pressing; second to that, and of equal importance, is the erection of a suitable block of buildings, with airing-court, for the control and management of males suffering from mental derangement. The present accommodation for this class of patients is not only defective in many respects, but, in the now altered state of things, badly placed on the grounds, and with only a very limited space for airing and recreation purposes; and now that ample space is available on the newly acquired ground, no time should be lost in remedying this very serious evil—a blot, in fact, which, notwithstanding all our modern improvements, still exhibits a painful connecting link with the cell system of the past. Under these circumstances it is evident that more money will have to be provided. I therefore take the liberty to express an earnest hope that the Government will urge on Parliament the necessity for such additional supplies as will enable these works to be carried out.

8. The number of patients under treatment during the year has been much larger than during the preceding year, but this is entirely due to the greater number of typhoid fever cases admitted. The death-rate, which was 9.9 per cent. last year, has risen to 12; but, of the total deaths, 18 per cent. died within 48 hours of admission.

9. The department of out-patients shows a larger number of attendances than during the year 1886, the increase being over 1000. This includes minor accidents and casualties of all kinds; and if the number of orders for medicine received from the Government Medical Officer attending the poor in their own homes, and from practitioners prescribing gratuitously be added, it may be reckoned that over 2000 individuals have received the benefits of this department.

10. The total number of typhoid fever cases has been 305, which is far in excess of any previous year. The Hospital has never been without typhoid cases in its wards during the year,—the lowest number at any one time being 9, and the highest 74. The death-rate among typhoid fever cases has been 12 per cent., but a third of the cases died within a week of admission; thus showing that they were not admitted until an advanced stage of the disease had been reached, and that their chances of recovery had consequently been diminished.
