



GENERAL HOSPITAL, LAUNCESTON.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1900.

· SIR,

I HAVE the honour to lay before you the following Annual Report of the Board of Management of the abovenamed Hospital for the Year 1900.

- 1. Messrs. R. L. Parker and F. Stanfield retired from the Board of Management, and were unanimously re-elected. The Hon. G. T. Collins, M.L.C., having accepted the office of Chief Secretary, resigned his seat on the Board. The Board regretted that such a step was necessary, and placed on record its high appreciation of the services rendered by him for the period of 21 years, during 20 of which he had so ably filled the position of Chairman. The seats of Messrs. G. Collins, H. Edgell, W. Perrin, J. C. Ferguson, Drs. Maddox and Pike, having become vacant owing to absence for four consecutive months from the Board meetings, the Governor in Council re-appointed Messrs. H. Edgell, J. C. Ferguson, and Drs. Pike and Maddox. Later, Dr. Maddox's seat again became vacant for a similar cause, and to the seats vacated by the Hon. G. T. Collins, Mr. W. Perrin, and Dr. Maddox, Messrs. S. Eardley-Wilmot, F. Holmes, and E. H. Panton were elected.
 - 2. Fifteen Board and forty Committee meetings were held during the year.
- 3. The rules and regulations of the Training School for Nurses were revised, and some alterations made in the curriculum. Lectures in Physiology were delivered by the House Surgeon, in Minor Surgery and Advanced Subjects by the Surgeon-Superintendent, and in Nursing by the Lady-Superintendent. Four nurses passed the final examination, and gained the Certificate of the Launceston Hospital Training School. Of these, Nurse Champion won the Hospital Badge. The winner of "The William Barnes Prize" for the year ending 28th March, 1900, was Nurse Oakes. The health of the Nursing Staff has been fair, more than the usual amount of sickness prevailing.
- 4. The Bacteriological Laboratory erected over the boiler-house is now nearing completion, and should be available early in the year. For the building of this, of a Drug Store, and of a Matron's Sitting Room at the old Nurses' Home, the sum of £499 was expended. One-third of this amount was contributed by the Board from its private funds.
- 5. The Operating Theatre has been renovated and completely fitted with up-to-date furniture and apparatus, which will compare favourably with those of the most modern hospitals, though the building itself could well be modernised, were means available. The cost of furnishing, &c., was provided from the Board's private funds.
- 6. From these statements it will be seen that the Board has been freely assisting the Government out of its own private funds, in making the Hospital more complete, and in effecting valuable improvements. During the past four years the sum of £2026 6s. 3d. has been spent from the Board's private funds in such works as furnishing and laying out the grounds of the Nurses' Home, furnishing the Infectious Diseases Wards, equipping the Operating Theatre, and assisting in the building of the Bacteriological Laboratory, &c.
- 7. As the subsidence of the foundations of the Isolation Wards for Infectious Diseases continued, it was found necessary to rebuild the southern corner of the building, and buttress the retaining-wall. Other minor improvements were carried out,

- 8. At the new Nurses' Home, owing to the movement of the hill, it was found necessary to build two large retaining-walls, and to relay the drainage.
- 9. The erection of the new Drying Room and steam tubs at the Laundry was carried out with fairly satisfactory results. The need of a hydro-extractor, to make this department more complete, is much felt, and the Government is now procuring one from England.
- 10. In the Dental Department there has been a large increase in the number of cases treated—a greater number than in any previous year. This has taxed the time and energies of the Honorary Dentists somewhat, so that the appointment of an Assistant Dentist would be desirable, especially if conservative operations are to be carried out successfully. It is regretable to notice a falling off in operations of this class. The removal of the Dental Surgery to the Out-Patient Department will be much more appreciated when satisfactory lighting is introduced, and hot and cold water laid on. The new instruments and materials provided have proved to be most useful. In the School of Dentistry the students have received a course of Clinical Instruction, whilst lectures and demonstrations have been given throughout the year by the Resident Medical Officers and Mr. A. Lucadou-Wells.
- 11. The equipment of and improvements in the Mortuary (which has latterly been used as a public morgue) are being proceeded with. New tables, sink, and basin have been obtained.
- 12. During the epidemic of bubonic plague on the mainland, nearly the whole Nursing Staff volunteered for duty, should any case occur here. A complete staff for the Verulam Hospital, Carr Villa, was therefore inoculated with the plague prophylactic.
- 13. Subscriptions amounting to £110 10s. 6d. were raised for the purpose of providing a Tennis-court in the Nurse's Home grounds. An asphalted Court has been laid down, with wirenetting around. It will be officially opened early in February.
- 14. The passage of "The Launceston General Hospital Act, 1900," by the Legislature, necessitated a partial revision of the rules and regulations of the Hospital. Opportunity was therefore taken to revise the whole of them. Drs. Pardey, Parker, Holmes, and Clemons were elected Honorary Medical Officers under the Act. Much as the Board regrets that any change has been made from the system that has been acting admirably for so many years, it has already expressed its intention of carrying out the provisions of the new Act to the best of its ability.
 - 15. The following improvements have been carried out during the year:-

A complete apparatus for X-ray work has been obtained, and a room provided for this special work.

A portable bath for treating fever cases has been procured, and water laid on to one of the wards for it.

A commencement was made in the refitting of the bathrooms, W.C.'s, and lavatories with modern sanitary appliances. At the N. end upstairs, the floors of bathroom, W.C.'s, and lavatory were cemented, the fittings altered or replaced, the rooms painted, and a better water supply installed.

A Bicycle Stable was built at the rear of the boiler-house.

New slop-sinks have been obtained for the wards.

A flagstaff was erected at the Nurses' Home, and flags obtained.

Electric light has been installed in several rooms.

The lift-floor has been lowered.

The brickwork around the boilers was repaired.

Leakages in the hot-water main were attended to, decayed beams over the channel replaced, and several inspection holes put down.

The ridge-capping of the Hospital was painted.

A retaining-wall was built at the foot of the Nurses' Home grounds, along Little Mulgrave-street.

- 16. The Hospital is indebted to many citizens for acts of kindness to the patients and staff. During the year several performances were given by private individuals for the entertainment of the patients, and were much appreciated.
 - 17. The Samaritan Fund has been utilised in aiding and assisting poor patients in various ways.
- 18. The quality of the provisions, &c., supplied to the Hospital, has, on the whole, been good. The high price of meat during the year has led to increased expenditure under that head.
- 19. The usual detailed information furnished by the Surgeon-Superintendent is embodied in the Report, and is of an interesting character.
