

## HOSPITAL FOR INSANE, NEW NORFOLK.

REPORT FOR 1876.

Laid upon the Table by the Colonial Secretary, and ordered by the House to be printed, April 24, 1877.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY.

THERE is little in the history of the Hospital for the Insane for the past year requiring special notice or comment.

An unusually large number of Patients have been admitted during the year, but, as the deaths also have been abnormally numerous, these, with the Patients discharged during the same period, left the total number of inmates nearly the same as at the date of the last Report of the Commissioners.

But, although the mortality has exceeded the usual average, the general health of the inmates has been very satisfactory, and no epidemic of any kind has made its appearance in the Institution.

A considerable proportion of the deaths that have taken place has occurred among Patients varying in age from 60 to 80 years, three of them being the subjects of senile dementia when received into the Hospital, and beyond all hope or possibility of cure. That the mortality should be considerable among persons so many of whom had previously led very irregular lives should not cause surprise.

The two separate Cottages for male and female Patients continue to be a pleasing feature of the Establishment, and fully to meet the cost of their maintenance.

In their last Report the Commissioners referred to the increasing difficulty of obtaining suitable male and female Attendants for the service of the Hospital, arising chiefly from the deficiency of labour general throughout the Colony, and to which they had previously strongly called the attention of the Government, recommending that, as a means of at least lessening this source of embarrassment, a moderate increase of remuneration should be granted to all persons thus employed in the Establishment. This recommendation, having been at length complied with, came into operation on the 1st August, 1876, and its beneficial influence has been felt to a considerable extent, especially with regard to the female Attendants, and in inducing those of both sexes who have been in the service of the Hospital for lengthened periods to continue their services.

The attraction of the Tin Mines, however, will probably continue to exert its influence on young able-bodied men, these qualifications being not less desirable in the Hospital than in the mines.

The Commissioners believe that nothing has been omitted in the management of the Hospital which the comfort and general well-being of the Inmates or their restoration to mental health required.

Although the Hospital Buildings have generally been kept in a good state of repair, so long a time has elapsed since anything has been done to remedy dilapidation that could not be undertaken by the Inmates that considerable repairs have now become pressingly necessary. The roofing has in many places become very leaky from the decay of the shingles, and much damage will be caused to the buildings unless it is promptly repaired.

This very serious defect has been repeatedly brought under the notice of the Department of Public Works, but has not hitherto been remedied.

### No. 5.

RETURN of Work performed by Patients in co-operation with the Carpenter and Painter in the Hospital for the Insane, New Norfolk, during the Year 1876.

Carpenter's New Work.—4 wheel-barrows; steps for cells; 3 tables; ironing board; 2 ladders, one 18 feet, and one 12 feet; plastering tools; 3 cupboards; shutters to ladies' cottage; covers for man-holes; fan-light to ward; new spokes in 3 cart wheels; flooring and seating latrine; cover to boiler; 6 seats to night-tubs; 3 bread trays; 2 racks, front store; spokes to hand-cart; hay rakes, hay fork handles, mauls, handles for axes, &c.; 21 confins.

Repairs.—Wood boxes, wood horses, posts and rails, verandah and staircases, wheel-barrows, window frames, lime house, wringing machine, floors, tables, chairs, forms, doors, spouting, steps to verandah and wards; gates and fences to garden, farm, and latrines; and general repairs throughout.

Plumber.—Water-pipes and taps throughout; new tops to lamp-shades.

Painter.—Female Division—14 rooms, 2 large wards, passages, banisters, ceilings, partitions, doors, and windows of each. Male Division—Front mess-room and front verandah, under-keeper's room, 2 large wards, 16 rooms, doors, windows, presses, &c. painted throughout.

Glazier.—Windows and skylights throughout; 180 squares of glass put in.

Whitewashing and Colouring.—Kitchens, 16 rooms in corridor, wards in back division, large mess-room, female division, passages, rooms and cells in all parts of building.

Brichlayer .- Plastering and brick-work and drains cleaned throughout.
