



TOWN HALL BILL.

PETITION No. 7.

Presented by Mr. Adams, and ordered by the House to be printed, 9 August, 1860.



To the Honourable the House of Assembly of Tasmania, in Parliament assembled.

The humble Petition of the undersigned Citizens of Hobart Town.

RESPECTFULLY SHOWETH:

That whereas a Bill is now before your Honorable House, intituled "A Bill to enable the City Council to build a Town Hall," the object of which is to allow the Municipal Council of this City to borrow money for the purpose of building a Town Hall.

And whereas the interest upon the money so borrowed must be raised from the Citizens by taxation to be imposed hereafter.

And whereas, in the opinion of your Petitioners, a new Town Hall is not absolutely needed at this present time; but that money, if borrowed, should be expended in some public work beneficial to the whole of this community.

Your Petitioners therefore pray that the aforesaid Bill may not pass into law, to the detriment of their interests.

And your Petitioners will ever pray.
