

BOARDING-OUT DESTITUTE CHILDREN.

REPORT for 1881.

Public Buildings, 30th March, 1882.

Sir,

In compliance with the request contained in your letter of the 18th of February, the Central Committee for boarding-out Destitute Children have the honor to submit the following Report for the year 1881.

Upon the appointment of the Committee, on the 3rd January, 1881, the total number of children boarded out was 154, distributed as follows:—

During the year 37 additional children were provided for, and 43 ceased to be a charge to the Government, leaving on the 1st January, 1882, 148,—boys, 73, girls, 75,—a reduction of 6 as compared with the total at the beginning of the previous year.

Of the above number, 54 boys and 54 girls were residing in and about the City, and 19 boys and 21 girls had homes in other parts of the Colony.

A Return, showing the names, dates of birth, and religion of the children maintained during the year, the date first boarded out, the names and residences of the foster parents, the amount of allowance granted weekly in each case, and the period for which it was paid, is appended. In the column headed "Remarks," the grounds upon which the additions to the boarded-out list were made, and the circumstances under which names were removed therefrom, are stated.

An analysis of the Return will show-

Firstly—That of the 191 children included therein, 122 were a charge for the full term of twelve months, and the remainder, 69, for shorter periods, varying from 3 to 364 days.

Secondly-That the additions to the list consist of-

Children. And

Thirdly—That in addition to the above-mentioned 15, the names of 28 children disappeared from the list, under the following circumstances:—3 were sent to Industrial Schools, 8 were taken by relatives, 10 were sent to service, 4 were adopted, and 3 died—total, 28.

The total expenditure for the year, including £37 13s. 3d. for clothing supplied to the children, &c., and £156 11s. 6d., the salary of the Inspecting Officer, amounted to £2094 6s. 6d., or

£262 5s. less than the sum provided for the service of the year; and the actual cost per head was £13 14s. $9\frac{3}{4}d$.

The first meeting of the Committee took place on the 12th of January, and, as a rule, a weekly meeting has been held since.

On the 28th of February, without notice to the foster parents, a house-to-house visitation was commenced by the Committee, and continued at intervals to the 1st of April, during which period all the children residing in the City and at New Town were seen, and their treatment and mode of living carefully enquired into. Their clothing and sleeping accommodation were also closely inspected; and as the dinner hour was the time selected for the visitation, ample opportunity was afforded of judging of the quantity and quality of the food supplied to them. The appearance of the children denoted happiness and content; their homes were clean and comfortable; and it was evident that the foster parents as a body were kindly disposed and conscientious women, for whom the children entertained strong feelings of affection. So much depends upon the character and disposition of the foster parents that the greatest care is taken in their selection, and persons are not entrusted with children until a full and searching enquiry has been made into their habits and occupation, the character of the neighbourhood in which they reside, the nature and extent of the accommodation they are able to provide, and their general fitness for such a position. It is also absolutely necessary for them to be of the same religion as the children.

Such of the children as were old enough were found to be regular in their attendance at school; and as the weekly payments for their maintenance are made only upon the production of satisfactory certificates from the masters of the schools, the foster parents are compelled in their own interests, if from no higher motive, to see that the education of the children is not neglected.

Reports as to the conduct, appearance, and progress of the children have been obtained from the masters of the different schools attended by them, and are annexed hereto.

From enquiries instituted and information furnished by the Inspecting Officer, the Committee had reason to believe that on Sundays the children were sent regularly to the schools of their respective denominations, and that in other respects their religious training had been carefully attended to.

In two instances only did the Committee find cause for dissatisfaction. One, in which there were four children, brothers and sister, living together, whose unhealthy and dispirited appearance formed so marked a contrast to the cheerful and smiling faces met with in other homes, that grave doubts arose as to whether they received good and sufficient food, or whether their delicate looks were attributable to constitutional weakness; and with a view to the determination of these doubts, the Inspecting Officer was directed to make frequent visits during the next fortnight, particularly at meal times. The result of that special visitation, in which the Committee also took part, was so unsatisfactory that the children were removed to another home. In less than a month there was a marked improvement, and now they are strong and robust, and as contented and happy looking as could be desired.

In the other case, two children, brother and sister, were under the care of a woman who occupied a good house in a respectable locality, and who bore the reputation of being a most exemplary and reliable person, but the Committee found such a wretched place set apart for the children to sleep in that they ordered their immediate removal. The children, who were at school at the time the visit was paid, were taken thence, without being allowed to return to their old home (if such it could be called), and placed under the care of another foster parent, by whom they have been kindly treated, and towards whom they have formed a warm attachment.

In the early part of the year a large number of the children suffered from measles, the then prevailing epidemic, but there were no cases amongst them of a serious character.

Upon the whole the inspection was highly gratifying, and impressed the Committee most favourably with the existing system of dealing with the destitute children of the community.

In the month of March special reports were applied for from the Police Magistrates and Wardens respecting the children boarded out in the country districts, and from time to time during the year further reports were received, in all of which, with two exceptions, assurances were given of the faithful discharge by the foster parents of the duty undertaken by them, and of the good conduct, regular attendance at school, and healthy appearance of the children.

In one of the two exceptional cases to which reference has been made, it was alleged that undue chastisement had been inflicted by the foster parent, and in the other that the child was not allowed to attend school. The removal of both children was ordered at once.

About the middle of the year the transfer of three boys from town to the country was decided upon, and after considerable difficulty persons willing to take charge of them were found. Prior to their removal they were uncontrollable, running wild about the streets, and two of them were constantly being interfered with and enticed from home and school by their mother, a woman of dissolute habits. The Committee therefore considered it advisable to send them where they would be out of the reach of such undesirable influence. In December last they were all reported to be going on well, and to have good homes.

In five other cases it was found necessary at different times to direct the removal of children for the following reasons:—

- 1. At the request of the foster parents, who reported that the children were badly disposed.
- 2. Neglect of the foster parents to keep the children clean and decently clad.
- 3. Difference of religion between foster parents and children, which was discovered to exist after they had been boarded out.
- 4. Unsatisfactory appearance of the children, who looked as if they did not receive sufficient food.
- 5. Foster parents in the habit of using improper language in the presence of the children.

The Committee regret to have to report the death of three children in the course of the year. One, a girl named Emma Watts, a cripple unable to stand, and who had always been delicate, was admitted to the General Hospital on the 15th February, and died there on the 28th of the following month, aged seven years. She was an inmate of the same institution in 1878, and was discharged as incurable. The second, a boy named John Nelson, four years and three months old, had been under Doctor Turnley's care for some time, but died on the 9th September, from atrophy and debility; and the third, Alfred Watts, a brother of the girl Emma Watts, died suddenly on the 6th November, aged twelve years and nine months. He was, as reported by the Inspecting Officer, "delicate from his birth, and always looked emaciated and miserable." At the inquest held upon the body the medical evidence exonerated those who had the care of him from all suspicion of neglect or unkind treatment.

On the 14th October a circular, accompanied by lists of the children boarded out and apprenticed in each country district, was addressed to the resident ministers of religion of the several denominations to which the children belonged, soliciting their co-operation, but in two instances only was its receipt acknowledged. A copy of the circular, with the replies received, will be found appended.

In the following month a Visiting Committee for Hobart was appointed, and steps were immediately taken to enable the ladies and gentlemen of whom it was composed to commence their labours. At a meeting of the Central Committee, to which the members of the Visiting Committee were invited, it was arranged to divide the City into three districts, each under the supervision of two ladies and one gentleman, and to have a similar Committee for New Town. Reports from those Committees to the end of the year are forwarded herewith.

Up to the 31st December last the total number of children under the Boarding-out System apprenticed and adopted, was 71; and on that date there was deposited in the Savings' Bank, Hobart, a sum amounting to £53 1s. 6d., representing 35 accounts belonging to children out at service. In addition to the wages to which the children are entitled under their indentures, employers are bound to pay quarterly to the Committee a sum at the rate of sixpence per week, to be placed in the Savings' Bank for the benefit of the children when they have completed their term of apprenticeship, and up to the present time no difficulty has been met with in collecting it. A demand made every quarter has been readily responded to, and even in cases in which children have not given satisfaction, and have been returned from service, the payments have not been withheld.

In some few instances trouble has been experienced with children who have been sent out to places, but, as a rule, they have done well and conducted themselves creditably.

A Return, giving full particulars, has been prepared, and will accompany this Report.

In conclusion, the Committee have no hesitation in expressing their belief that the Boarding-out System, which has now been in operation eight or nine years, is working most satisfactorily, and they feel convinced that no one who has watched its progress and noted the results obtained, can do aught but admit that the success predicted for it has been most abundantly realised. Abuses have existed, as has been shown in this Report, but it could hardly be expected that so large a number of children could be provided for without the occurrence of occasional infringements of the regulations framed for their protection, more especially when it is borne in mind that the machinery provided for supervision and inspection, indispensable elements to the success of the movement, were until lately decidedly inadequate.

The appointment of the Visiting Committees, so frequently petitioned for, has supplied a want long felt, and it is hoped that their good offices will not only be the means of preventing any neglect or failure of duty towards the children, but that they will also have the effect of encouraging the foster parents to increase their efforts for the benefit of the little ones committed to their charge.

Sir, The Central Committee for Boarding-out Destitute Children are desirous of obtaining the assistance of Ministers of Religion in their efforts to secure the welfare of the children boarded out and apprenticed under the system in the country districts, and have requested me to solicit their co-operation.
