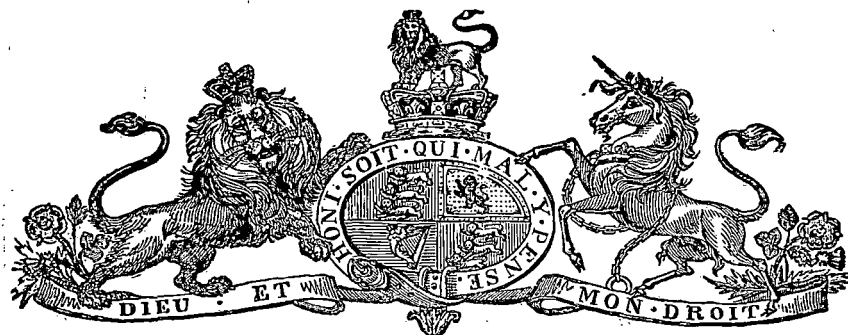

***TWELFTH ANNUAL REPORT of the Inspector of Police on the State of the Territorial Police of Tasmania, for the Year ending the 30th June, 1879.***

SIR,

IN presenting my Annual Report upon the state of the Territorial Police for the year ending 30th June, 1879, I beg to record that the duties of the Officers have been performed with efficiency and fidelity.

The strength of the Force has been further increased by the establishment of a Station with two Constables at Lisle; and the gold discoveries in the neighbourhood of the Pieman have necessitated the services of a resident Constable.

The question of a Superannuation Fund is becoming more pressing every year. It is not compatible with the dictates of human nature to dismiss and consign to penury an old and faithful Officer the moment his full powers of usefulness have deserted him. The temptation to retain Constables no longer efficient is hard to resist. A retiring allowance to worn out or disabled Officers is an absolute necessity to the successful working of any Police Force.

I am of opinion that a system of classification should be introduced by which the more experienced and useful members of the Force should enjoy a higher rate of pay than those who have recently joined.

Notwithstanding the drawbacks of low pay and slow promotion, Police employment is now gaining in popularity; and applicants come forward of a far more eligible character than the majority of those in former years.

There has been no serious case of misconduct in the Police during the year.

The necessity for a small Force for detective purposes has been frequently recommended by me. Applications for services that can only be performed by trained and trustworthy men are made. I have no Policeman in the Department who is not at a fixed Station, so cannot easily comply with such requisitions. The want of a small vessel for communication with Bass's Straits Islands, as well as with Port Arthur and the numerous Police Stations on the sea-board, has not yet been supplied.

Crime throughout the Colony has increased suddenly. The number of cases tried in the Supreme Courts for the year ending the 30th June, 1877, was 87; for the year 1878 it was again 87; while for the year now closed it reaches 115. The serious offences have been principally against the person. There have been three cases of murder and seven of rape. The latter crime, which appears to increase in spite of the severe punishment following conviction, is not generally committed by members of the known criminal class. Of those who were charged with the full offence during the year, the age of the eldest was twenty-four years.

Cases of alleged sheep-stealing are still reported. In some instances the sheep are recovered, having strayed; and in many others losses from death are put down to the account of depredation. This crime is, however, carried on, and the disposable means for checking it are quite inadequate.

Two farmers and a shepherd, all young men, were the principal offenders who were brought to justice; and the practice seems almost confined to the robbery of neighbours. Detection is rendered more difficult than where sheep are taken to a distance.

A District Constable is Summoning Officer to the Supreme Court in its Criminal Jurisdiction.

A Constable acts as Coroner's Clerk.

<sup>b</sup> The Chief District Constable has £25 a year forage allowance. An Acting District Constable receives £25 for performing the duties of Police Clerk at Kingston. The Chief District Constable and one Constable have £10 a year each travelling allowance. The 2nd Class District Constable and five Constables have quarters.

<sup>c</sup> The Chief District Constable and two District Constables receive forage allowance, the former £40 and the latter £25 per annum. The Sergeant receives £35 per annum for performing the duties of Police Clerk at Franklin. The District Constables, the Sergeant, and four Constables have quarters.

<sup>d</sup> The Chief District Constable receives £25 per annum for forage, and £25 travelling allowance. One District Constable and three Constables £25 per annum forage allowance, and two Constables £10 each for travelling allowance. <sup>g</sup> The Chief District Constable receives £25 forage allowance and £25 travelling allowance. One District Constable receives £50 travelling allowance, and three others £25. Two District Constables, an Acting District Constable, and five Constables have quarters.

<sup>h</sup> The Chief Constable and Constables have forage allowance £25 each and quarters.

<sup>i</sup> The District Constable receives £15, and the Constable £10 per annum travelling allowance.
