
LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

AUDIT ACT:

REPORT OF SELECT COMMITTEE.

Brought up by Mr. Gellibrand, and ordered by the Council to be printed, May 15, 1879.

THE Select Committee of the Legislative Council appointed to enquire into the working of the Audit Act, 41 Vict. No. 16, have the honor to report that they have held ten Committee Meetings, carefully taking thereat the evidence of the Colonial Auditor, the Assistant Colonial Treasurer, the Clerk of the Executive Council, the Chief Clerk of the Lands and Works Department (Public Works Branch), and the Colonial Storekeeper, and have duly examined the Treasury vouchers and all other obtainable documents necessary for the purpose of a due investigation.

The Committee are of opinion, after mature and careful deliberation upon the evidence adduced and hereafter appended,-

That the strict requirements of the Audit Act under Sections 18, 19, 20, have been improperly evaded.

That the exactitude of Section 18 has been disregarded by the payment of £8125 for guaranteed Interest due to the Tasmanian Main Line Railway Company, Limited, for the quarter ending 30th September, 1878; such payment being neither sanctioned by direct vote of Parliament, nor autho-rised by the approval of His Excellency the Governor in Council. (Vide Treasury Voucher, approved only by W. R. Giblin, Appendix E.; Colonial Auditor's

Query 541, Appendix D.)

That the exactitude of Section 20 has been disregarded by the payment of the guaranteed Interest due to the Tasmanian Main Line Railway Company, Limited, for the quarters ending 30th September and 31st December, 1878, respectively, such payments having been made without the knowledge of the Colonial Auditor.

(Vide Evidence of Colonial Auditor, April 23rd and 29th; also Evidence of Assistant Colonial Treasurer, May 8th.)

Furthermore, the Committee are of opinion that any increase of pension, whether granted by the Governor in Council as an emergency, excess of detail, or in any way paid upon the basis of Supplementary Estimates, is a payment wrong in principle,-the power to increase any pension being the privilege of Parliament alone. (Vide Emergency Voucher 131, Evidence of Assistant Colonial Treasurer, 8th May.)

That, after mature consideration of the evidence given by the Assistant Colonial Treasurer and Colonial Auditor regarding the two payments of £8125 each on account of the guaranteed Interest due to the Tasmanian Main Line Railway Company, Limited, for the quarters ending 30th September and 31st December, 1878, respectively, the Committee deem it is necessary for Parliament to take such measures as may effectually check the culpably lax official routine thereby evidenced. (*Vide* Evidence of Assistant Colonial Treasurer and Colonial Auditor.)

That, observing the diverse opinions given by the Solicitor-General and the present Attorney-General upon the authority necessary for payment of guaranteed Interest relating to the Tasmanian Main Line Railway Company, Limited, the Committee recommend that some definite decision be given thereupon, thereby avoiding further confusion and difficulty to the Colonial Auditor, and effectually preventing the lax system heretofore pursued.

That the suggestions of the Colonial Auditor upon Section 16, Schedule 1, as shown in his Correspondence with the Government (vide Appendix A), are of such practical utility, that the Committee respectfully recommend their adoption. In their opinion the details of expenditure under Loans Acts should as far as possible be subject to the same Parliamentary and official check as any other expenditure.

That if, as by evidence adduced, the Colonial Auditor is only made aware of payments from the Treasury by the examination of the Treasury CashVouchers, thereby being deprived of the advantage of pre-audit, for which power the Select Committee of 1877 especially contended, the Committee strongly urge the adoption of some regulations whereby the said principle of pre-audit may be surely and thoroughly established.

The Committee desire to bring prominently under the notice of the Council the large sums of money paid from the Treasury during the past year without the sanction of Parliament under the plea of "Emergency,"—although Parliament was almost continuously in Session from July 1878 to the present time.

The Committee are, moreover, of opinion that as the bulk of such unauthorised expenditure is procured on the plea of emergency, under Section 19, such precautions should be taken by Parliament whereby the powers of this section may be protected from misuse.

Assistant Colonial Treasurer to be summoned at 2:30 to-morrow, and to produce all papers connected with Authority No. 66, 26 February, 1879; Authority No. 257, 6 January, 1879; also his Authority for paying £8125 for the Tasmanian Main Line Railway interest, paid 29 October, 1878; also Authority No. 131, 1878; and all papers in the Rev. Father Dunne's case.

Mr. W. Smith, Public Works Office, to be summoned at 2:30 to-morrow. The Committee adjourned at 3:50 until 8 May at 2:30 p.m.

8 MAY, 1879.

The Committee met at 2.30.

Present-Messrs. Gellibrand, Aikenhead, Robertson, and Chapman.

Mr. Smith examined.

W. Windsor, Esq., Assistant Colonial Treasurer, examined, and handed in all the documents which he was directed to furnish. Authority 66—The papers were in this case perused by the Committee.

The Committee adjourned at 4.50 until 2.30 May 9.

The Committee adjourned at 3.50 until 15 May at 2.30 P.M.

Present-Messrs. Gellibrand, Robertson, and Aikenhead.

Mr. Gellibrand brought up the Report as ordered by the Committee. Mr. Aikenhead moved that the Report be adopted; seconded by Mr. Robertson. Carried, with orders to report the same to the House to-day. The Committee adjourned *sine die*.

EVIDENCE.

WEDNESDAY, 23 APRIL, 1879.

Present-Messrs. Gellibrand, Innes, Chapman, and Robertson.

W. LOVETT, Esq., examined.

By Mr. Chapman.—1. Calling your attention to Question 5, can you produce to the Committee the authorities of the Governor in Council for the excess of expenditure unauthorised by Parliament since the passing of the Audit Act on the 11th December, 1877, to the present time? Yes, and do so, including everything up to the present date.

2. Calling your attention to Question 7, are you prepared to furnish the Committee with any suggestions as to the working of the regulations which require amending? I am, and call your attention to Section 16, Schedule 1, Audit Act No. 3, and have called the attention of the Government to it, and will send in the correspondence relating thereto.

3. Are there any other Sections you would call attention to? Yes, Section 19, which does not appear to make provision to embody the authority of the Governor in Council for salaries paid under the Loans Act. With reference to Section 20, I beg to call your attention to correspondence with the Government, Paper 38, Appendix A, of the present Session.

4. Calling your attention to Section 21, I would ask whether any payments had been made from the Public Treasury that have not been provided for in an Appropriation Act, not included in the list you have handed in? Yes, one payment has been made, the interest to the T.M.L.R. Company for the quarter ending December 30th, 1878.

5. Were you made acquainted with that payment, as approved by the Governor in Council, as an emergency payment? No, I was not aware of the payment having been made until examining the Cash Vouchers of the Treasury.

6. When you found that that payment had been made contrary to the provisions of Sections 19 and 20, what steps did you take? I queried it as being illegal and contrary to the provision of the Sections 19 and 20.

7. When did you make that, and when receive a reply? A few days after the payment, and have not received an official reply. I think the payment was made the first week in February.

8. Are you aware if any Supplementary Estimates for the years 1878-79, showing the expense of Government, have been prepared? I am not aware of any.

9. Are there any other points to which you would direct the attention of the Committee? No, I consider that in the main the Act enables the Auditor and his department to get through their duties in a more satisfactory way.

TUESDAY, 29 APRIL, 1879.

Present-Messrs. Gellibrand, Robertson, and Innes.

W. LOVETT, Esq., examined.

By Mr. Innes.—10. Having read over the evidence, do you want to make any alterations? Yes; in Question 4. The payment in that reply is mentioned in the list. I also made a mistake in saying there was only one payment; another payment for interest due 30th September had been made, for which no proper authority had been received; and, by some unaccountable mistake, no query had been raised at the time I gave that answer, but has been since then, and replied to. I produce the query and reply. (Appendix D.)

THURSDAY, 8 MAY, 1879.

Present-Messrs. Aikenhead, Gellibrand, Chapman, and Robertson.

MR. SMITH examined.

By the Chairman.-11. You are Chief Clerk in the Lands and Works Department, Public Works Branch? Yes.

By Mr. Chapman.-12. Have you under your charge the expenditure under the vote for maintenance of Government House? Yes, so far as repairs to buildings, and supply and repairs of furniture, are concerned.

13. Can you furnish the Committee with that return for the years 1876-7-8, and 30 April, 1879? Yes, and will do so.

MR. WINDSOR, Assistant Colonial Treasurer, examined.

By Mr. Chapman.-14. Your name is William Windsor, and you are Assistant Colonial Treasurer? Yes, and I produce the documents referred to in my summons; namely-

Authority 66, re Dr. Murphy, 26 Feb. 1879, for vaccination, Launceston. Authority 257, Jan. 6, 1879, Solicitor-General, fees for prosecutions. £8125, interest paid 29 October to the Tasmanian Main Line Railway. Authority No. 131, Mr. Freeman's pension.

Also the Very Reverend Father Dunne's pension.

quarter ending 30th Sept. and paid 29th October, 1878, you produce an account furnished by Mr. Grant, the payment of which was approved by Mr. Giblin on the 28th October, and paid by you on the 29th October ? Yes.

16. That payment appears to be made without the authority of the Governor in Council. Will you explain to the Committee the reason why you paid this without that authority? I understood from the Ministerial Clerk that it was the opinion of the Colonial Treasurer, Mr. Giblin, that it was not required; and that opinion has since been confirmed by the present Attorney-General, Mr. Dodds.

17. Was there any provision in the Appropriation Act, or any other Act of Parliament, authorising the payment of that money? It is not in the Appropriation Act, and I am not aware of it being in any other Act.

18. Did you consult the Auditor previous to this payment? I did not, because I was told by Mr. Packer, the Ministerial Clerk, that Mr. Giblin, the Colonial Treasurer, desired that this payment should be made.

19. When would the Colonial Auditor become acquainted with the payment of that amount? Not until he examined our cash voucher furnished from the Treasury to the Audit Department the day after payment.

20. You are thoroughly acquainted with the Audit Regulations which direct that no payment should be made without the report from the Colonial Auditor that the payment had been authorised by the Governor in Council? I am.

21. As this payment was made contrary to the Audit Regulations, did you call the attention of the Auditor to it? I did not, considering that the Colonial Treasurer's authority was sufficient to make that payment.

22. When did the Auditor query the payment of this amount? On the 23rd April, 1879.

23. That was nearly six months after the payment was made? Yes.

FRIDAY, 9 MAY, 1879.

Present-Messrs. Gellibrand, Innes, Aikenhead, Chapman, and Robertson.

MR. WINDSOR examined.

By the Chairman.--24. Do you produce the documents connected with payment of interest £8125 to Tasmanian Main Line Railway, due 31st December, 1878, paid 10th February, 1879? Yes.

MR. E. C. NOWELL examined.

By Mr. Chapman.-25. Your name is Edwin Cradock Nowell, and you are Clerk to the Executive Council? 'Yes.

26. The Committee have before them the submission of the Honorable D. Lewis, the Colonial Treasurer, to the Governor in Council, dated 10th February, 1879, requesting the approval of the Governor in Council for the payment of £8125 to the Manager of the Tasmanian Main Line Railway Company for interest claimed by the Company to the 31st December, 1878. This document appears to have been materially altered in substance. Can you inform the committee whether it was in that state when you forwarded the same to the Colonial Treasurer after the approval of the Governor in Council? Yes, it was in the same state; the alterations were made previous to passing.

27. Will you point out the alterations? The words "as a case of emergency" were struck out, also the following words—" under the contract with the Government;" and the words "by law" were inserted instead.

MR. SMITH examined.

By Mr. Chapman.—28. Are you now prepared to hand in the papers about the maintenance of Government House for the years 1876-7-8, and 30th April, 1879? Yes; I produce the complete return in question. The return I now hand in includes a return asked for by the Hon. C. Meredith, from December, 1874, to 30th November, 1877, supplied to the House of Assembly.

WEDNESDAY, 14 MAY, 1879.

Present.-Messrs. Gellibrand, Aikenhead, Robertson, and Innes.

MR. HUXTABLE examined.

By the Chairman.-28. Your name is Charles Henry Huxtable, and you are Colonial Storekeeper? Yes; and I produce the papers asked for which complete the whole expenditure supplied through the Colonial Storekeeper's Department for stores and furniture of Government House from December, 1874, to 30th April, 1879.
