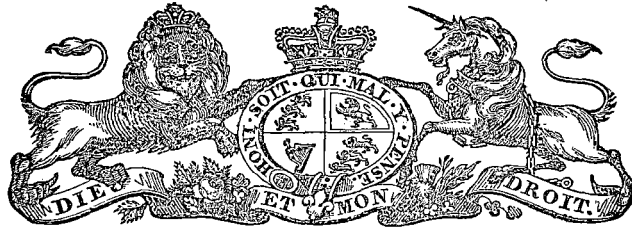


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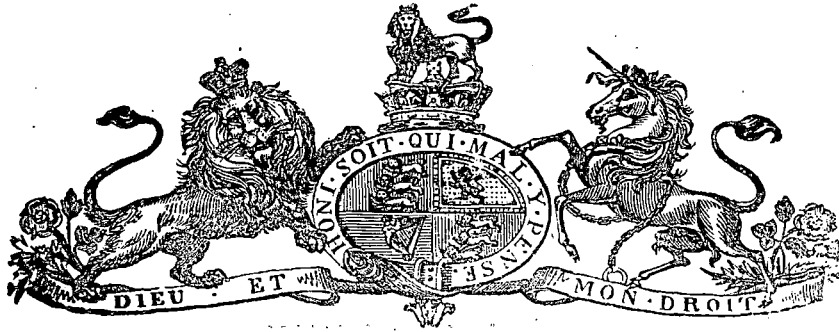

PENAL ESTABLISHMENT, LAUNCESTON.

Penal Establishment, Launceston, 17th February, 1881.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to submit herewith the Annual Report and Returns for this Establishment for the year 1880.

No. 1.—Return of Receipts and Expenditure, showing net cost of Prisoners, Invalids, and Children in the Establishment.

Officers.—The Officers have discharged their duties to my satisfaction. Two constables resigned during the year.

Prisoners.—Total and Average.—On the 1st January there were 119 persons in the Establishment: 885 were received during the year: total 1004, against 925 for preceding year; the increase on 1878 fully 20 per cent. The daily average was 131; average for 1879, 109.

Juvenile Offenders.—Seventeen confined were under the age of 15 years, and 182 between the ages of 15 and 25.

Tried at Superior Courts.—Fifty-seven were arraigned, 41 of whom were convicted. In 1879 the numbers were 40 and 31 respectively.

Transferred.—Eighteen of the 41 convicted were sent to Hobart, there to undergo their sentence.

Conduct has, on the whole, been good. Sixteen were tried for breaches of discipline, and two for escaping.

Escapes.—Two: a man employed in the garden at Invalid Depôt, and one of a gang employed at General Hospital. The former was arrested by an officer of the Establishment, and the latter by a Longford Municipal Constable. During past ten years 22 prisoners have escaped, 21 of whom have been re-captured.

Labour.—Cleaning ditches at Swamp, and raising embankment, labour equal to that of 2828 men for one day. Value of work done has been estimated by Mr. Dowling, of the Railway Department, at £696 19s. 7d. There has also been expended in painting, whitewashing, carpentering, cleaning, draining, &c. labour of the value hereunder shown:—

The above was expended on works of a necessary character, and had not prison labour been available they would have to be done by contract at a higher charge than my estimate. The Establishment ought, in justice, to be credited with earnings to the amount above shown.

Health.—The average has been good. There were 240 applications to see the Medical Officer. The majority of the ailments were of a trifling nature.

Deaths.—Eight: namely, two of Male Prisoners, each aged 66 years; one Female Prisoner, aged 30 years; and five Female Invalids, average age 70 years.

I HAVE this day visited the Gaol and House of Correction, and am much pleased with all I have seen, and the cleanliness and order prevailing. Some of the yards are very damp, and a little cement might be usefully employed on the walls.

WE have this day visited the whole of the Establishment. No complaints. We have this time thoroughly investigated the closet system here, and, after due investigation, unhesitatingly condemn it as totally unfit for this Establishment. The Superintendent, we are sorry to say, has one child now suffering from diphtheria, and another officer named Biggs has one child recovering from it. It is our conviction that the attention of Government ought to be called to the necessity of instituting a better and healthier system of closets at once.

I HAVE this day visited the Gaol, which appears to me well conducted, so far as a bad system and imperfect construction permit. The total absence of classification appears to me a very serious defect, calculated to perpetuate and multiply crime. The buildings are unsuitable, and on the female side do not appear safe. The mixture of prisoners and paupers in the sick ward is objectionable, and unjust to respectable poverty.
