

## MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY.

So short a period has elapsed since the date of our last Report as to leave little for us to advert to in reference to the condition of the Hospital for the Insane and the state of its inmates during the year 1878.

We regret that several internal improvements, to which we have repeatedly sought the attention of the Executive, have hitherto remained in abeyance from causes wholly beyond our control; but we forbear to enlarge upon them in this Report as we are encouraged to believe that they will not be further postponed.

We append the usual Returns, adding to them on this occasion the official Report to us of the Surgeon Superintendent, which it is presumed by an oversight has been heretofore omitted, but which it appears in every way desirable to print as an Appendix to the present, and all future Reports, on an Establishment of so peculiar a description as the New Norfolk Hospital.

Before concluding this Report we desire to record with regret the decease of our late colleagues, Mr. Sharland and Dr. Moore, who for many years devoted themselves assiduously to the interests of this Asylum, entitling them to grateful acknowledgment.

Hospital for the Insane, New Norfolk, January, 1879.

Sir,

I HAVE the honor to present my Report on this Institution for the year 1878.

Nothing has occurred to interrupt the usual quiet and harmonious working of the Establishment.

On the 31st of December, 1877, there were remaining 261 patients; viz., 138 males and 123 females; 33 have been admitted during the year—18 males and 15 females; total treated, 294. Seven of those admitted had previously been inmates, viz., 5 males and 2 females,—these had been absent for periods varying from 8 years to one month; one, who was discharged in March and readmitted in September, was a dipsomaniac, and has since been forwarded to his friends in New Zealand. Another patient, a female of the better class, was away only a month, having been discharged on trial, and being found too trouble-some to manage at home, was returned.

It is gratifying to note that the number of admissions has decreased considerably, as will be seen by the following list:—1874, 49 were admitted; 1875, 39 were admitted; 1876, 60 were admitted; 1877, 45 were admitted; 1878, 33 were admitted; and I think it fairly probable that, as the old prisoner class of residents die out, the average amount of insanity will be still less than at present,—the proportion of insane to the population of the Colony now being, as near as I can calculate, a small fraction over 3 in 1000, which includes also the lunatics at the Cascades Establishment.

Eighteen patients were discharged,—7 males and 11 females; among the latter was one taken away by her friends without improvement. All the others were much improved or quite recovered.

The result of treatment of all the admissions is noted in Return No. 2.

Twenty-three Deaths occurred,—16 males and 7 females,—whose respective ages were as follows:—1,76 years; 3,72 years; 1,69 years; 1,67 years; 1,66 years; 1,62 years; 1,59 years; 1,58 years; 1,52 years; 4,46 years; 1,45 years; 1,44 years; 1,42 years; 1,30 years; 1,25 years; 1,23 years; and showing that the greatest proportion of mortality was among aged people.

Two patients escaped during the year; one returned voluntarily after two days, and the other was retaken after the same period of absence.

The average daily strength of the patients was 262, and the total number treated 294; 39 of these were wholly or partially self-supporting; 24 were chargeable to imperial and 199 to colonial funds.

The cottages for the better class of patients are fully self-supporting, the receipts for males of that class being £908 19s. 8d., and for females, £384 12s. 8d.

The total sum received from all classes of patients, farm produce, washing, and labour, amounted to £1818, and the whole gross cost of the Establishment £7750, or 1s.  $7\frac{1}{2}d$ . per diem for each patient,—which, taking credit for the receipts, is reduced to £5932. This cost does not, however, include £506 expended on repairs and alterations to the buildings, &c.

The farm, dairy, and garden have furnished liberal supplies for the use of the Establishment, the former producing abundance of forage for the horses, cows, &c. The dairy contributed 41,889 pints of milk, worth, at 2d. per pint, £349 1s. 6d., and  $476\frac{1}{2}$  dozen of eggs, valued at £18.

The usual amusements and recreations for the patients have been provided.

Various repairs to the buildings, including a considerable amount of new shingling, have been effected during the year, at a cost of nearly £500; but the new dormitory so urgently required in the Refractory Ward of the Female Division has not yet been commenced, although plans and specifications were prepared and tenders advertised for; nor have any steps been taken to increase the accommodation at the Gentlemen's Cottage, notwithstanding several reminders have been forwarded to the Government that such additions are much required.

I would also now suggest that the ventilation of various portions of the Establishment be improved by the application of Tobin's system, which is very inexpensive. There are other alterations and repairs still much required, such as a new bath-room in the Refractory Ward, Female Division, and further repairs to the laundry and washhouse, besides minor matters. We have now no skilled labour, such as bricklayers and painters among the patients, therefore the same amount of assistance in these directions cannot, as formerly, be rendered.

In accordance with the Commissioners' recommendation the appointment of an Assistant Medical Officer has been approved of by the Government and Parliament, and Dr. Macfarlane was appointed at the end of November, with a salary of £300 per annum,—that gentleman having previously acted as my locum tenens during a leave of absence for five weeks that had been kindly granted to me.

Mrs. Kenny, the Matron, who was appointed in January, was severely injured by a kick from a patient on the 21st of March, and totally incapacitated from performing her duties until the end of the year; she now, however, appears to be progressing towards complete recovery, and is able to resume her work.

The only changes in the staff of officers has been the dismissal of Mr. Walker, underkeeper, in consequence of his intemperate habits. Mr. George Hill succeeded him, and Mr. Bromfield was appointed his successor at the Gentlemen's Cottage. Mr. M'Williams, the gatekeeper, resigned his situation in June, and Mr. Wm. M'Minn received the appointment.

The duties of the officers have been on the whole fairly performed; but I have again to remark on the extreme difficulty of procuring good male attendants, and am of opinion that it will become necessary to further increase the remuneration of this class of assistants before we can hope to obtain the services of men fully eligible for that position. I may observe that the rate of wages for male attendants is on a more liberal scale at similar institutions in the other Colonies.

RETURN of Work performed by Patients in co-operation with the Carpenter and Painter in the Hospital for the Insane, New Norfolk, during the Year 1878.

Carpenter's New Work.—2 wash-stands; 4 wheel-barrows; sink for cook-house; cowman's hut shingled; frame for water-tank; gardener's hut shingled; fixing set of shelves in upper store; making and fixing set shelves in store, Back Division; new fronting seats of latrines; large open shed in centre of back yard, 32 feet in diameter, built and shingled; 4 seats for ditto; 4 tables for ditto; 3 lattice doors, Boys' Dormitories; 8 commode arm-chairs; fixing 16 bolts on doors in corridor, Back Division.

Repairs.—Flooring Matron's Quarters; 3 horse-carts; 4 wheels to ditto; chairs in constant repair throughout Institution; mangle; laundry floor; wheel-barrows; gate to Female Division; floors in dormitories, cells, rooms, passages, &c. throughout; tables and frames of looking-glasses, wash-stands, &c.; handling axes, hay-forks, rakes, &c.; hand carts and wheels to ditto; horses in drying-room; partitions in stable and cow-house; window frames; fences in garden and farm throughout.

Plumber.—Water pipes and taps throughout.

Painter.—Posts, doors, and windows in corridor, Back Division; large centre shed in back yard, throughout; 8 commode arm-chairs; close stools; and various parts of buildings where necessary.

Glazier .- Windows and skylights throughout; 191 squares of glass put in.

Coloring, &c.—The whole of back-yard, passages, and cells; kitchens—Male and Female Division; rooms, passages, and corridor; new building, 8 feet in height.

Brichlayer.-Fire-places, drains, plastering and brick-work where required.
