### Notices of Motion

**88** Dr Woodruff to move—That:—

- (1) A Joint Standing Committee, to be called the Covid Response Committee, be appointed, with power to send for persons and papers and with leave to report from time to time, to monitor and scrutinise:—
  - (a) all matters relating to Covid;
  - (b) the Government's management of the Covid Pandemic; and
  - (c) any matter incidental thereto.
- (2) The number of Members to serve on the Committee on the part of the House be three, being:—
  - (a) one nominated by the Leader of the House;
  - (b) one nominated by the Leader of Opposition Business; and
  - (c) one nominated by the Leader of the Tasmanian Greens. (10 March 2022)

**89** The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises:—
  - (a) that the 69<sup>th</sup> Hamilton Agricultural Show was held on 5 March 2022 at the Hamilton Recreation Grounds in the Derwent Valley; and
  - (b) the Central Highlands Council, volunteers, sponsors, donors, and patrons who support this event and contribute to its ongoing success.
- (2) Acknowledges the importance of the Hamilton Show as a traditional, grassroots agricultural show in the Lyons electorate that showcases some of the best agriculture in Tasmania.
- (3) Notes that:—
  - (a) the Show was first formed following a meeting of Soldier Settler Farmers in the early 1950's and was first celebrated in 1952, and today has a focus on promoting agriculture in the Central Highlands and Derwent Valley;
  - (b) the Governor of Tasmania, Her Excellency the Hon. Barbara Baker AC joined thousands of patrons at the 2022 event, which showcased and promoted the local agricultural industries, as well as fine local produce and entertainment; and
  - (c) highlights of the 2022 Hamilton Show were events featuring equestrian, camp drafting, dog high jump, miniature goats, shearing and wool handling, fleece, working yard dogs, a canary display and a performance by the Tasmanian Light horse was particularly popular.
- (4) Congratulates the President of the Hamilton Agricultural Show Society Jack Beattie and the rest of the organising committee and recognises the contribution of volunteers including Rotary and Lyons members. (10 March 2022)

Ms *O'Connor* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that the Minister for Community Services and Development Hon. Michael Ferguson MP, and the Attorney-General, Hon. Elise Archer MP, were groaning in Question Time on 10 March 2022 while the Leader of the Opposition, Hon Rebecca White MP, read the words of a victim survivor to the House, while the Minister for Education, Children and Youth, Hon. Roger Jaensch, MP said, “oh come on”.
- (2) Acknowledges the deep distress this caused to the victim survivor, who has suffered enough at the hands of the Tasmanian Government and its Agencies.
- (3) Understands that any victim survivor of child sexual abuse may have been distressed by the response of senior Government Ministers.
- (4) Further notes that both the Minister for Education, Children and Youth, Hon. Jaensch MP and the Premier, Hon. Peter Gutwein MP, had the decency to apologise for this behaviour.
- (5) Calls on the Minister for Community Services and Development Hon. Michael Ferguson MP and the Attorney-General, Hon. Elise Archer MP, to sincerely and unreservedly apologise for any hurt and offence caused by their response on 10 March last. (22 March 2022)

Ms *O'Connor* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that on 30 November 2021, the independent review into the Public Trustee was published.
- (2) Acknowledges the report found that the Trustee has failed to correctly meet its duties for 26 years, and that, as a result, Tasmanians on guardianship orders have had their rights and their assets stripped away from them.
- (3) Recognises the independent review pointed to the Trustee selling or disposing of personal property without consultation.
- (4) Agrees any and all victims of the Trustee should be entitled to compensation, and that appropriate mechanisms for this should be developed and made available as soon as possible.
- (5) Calls on the Attorney General, Hon. Elise Archer MP, not to delay ensuring justice for those Tasmanians who have been harmed by the operation of the Public Trustee. (22 March 2022)

Dr *Broad* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges:—
  - (a) the serious financial pressure being placed on Tasmanian households by the rising cost of living;
  - (b) that the most acute pressure is currently being felt with basic, non-discretionary expenses such as fuel, housing and utility bills;
  - (c) wages are not keeping pace with the cost of living; and
  - (d) that this pressure is felt equally by business owners.
- (2) Notes:—
  - (a) the National Rental Affordability Index shows Hobart is the least affordable capital city in the country for renters, while house price increases of nearly 30% in the past year have put the dream of home ownership out of reach for many Tasmanians;
  - (b) a report by ANZ (the Australia and New Zealand Banking Group) has shown consumer confidence in Tasmania is now negative and inflation expectations are the worst in ten years;
  - (c) two recent surveys by NAB (National Australia Bank) and Roy Morgan Research have shown Tasmania has the lowest business confidence in the country;
  - (d) Business investment in Tasmania fell nearly 10% in the December 2021 quarter, nearly three times more than in any other State;
  - (e) Tasmania’s domestic economy shrank by 1.5% in the December 2021 quarter; and
  - (f) Tasmania’s population has declined for the last two quarters, with record numbers of Tasmanians moving interstate.

- (3) Calls on the Premier, Hon. Peter Gutwein MP, to fulfil his promise to implement legislation to reduce petrol prices, scrap the bin tax and tell TasWater to amend its plan to significantly increase water bills. (22 March 2022)

### 93 Dr Broad to move—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges:—
  - (a) the serious financial pressure being placed on Tasmanian households by the rising cost of living;
  - (b) that the most acute pressure is currently being felt with basic, non-discretionary expenses such as fuel, housing and utility bills;
  - (c) wages are not keeping pace with the cost of living; and
  - (d) that this pressure is felt equally by business owners.
- (2) Notes that:—
  - (a) in May 2020 the Premier Hon. Peter Gutwein, MP stated that if fuel prices in the State "continue to be out of step this Government will continue taking further action and will consider price capping";
  - (b) in November 2021 Minister for Workplace Safety and Consumer Affairs, Hon. Elise Archer, MP stated that the "Government has made it clear that should further action be required to support Tasmanians to access cheaper fuel prices, including the introduction of legislation, we will consider it"; and
  - (c) according to the ACCC (Australian Competition and Consumer Commission), Hobart has the highest fuel prices of any capital city, being nearly 20 cents/litre higher than other capital cities.
- (3) Calls on the Premier to outline how his Government will give effect to fuel price capping and when the fuel price legislation will be introduced. (22 March 2022)

### 94 The Minister for Resources to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that Monday, 21 March 2022, was the International Day of Forests.
- (2) Acknowledges that this Day was proclaimed by the United Nations in 2012 to celebrate and raise awareness of the importance of all types of forest and that sustainable forest management not only contributes to the prosperity and wellbeing of current and future generations, but can assist in addressing climate change.
- (3) Further notes that:—
  - (a) Tasmania's sustainable forestry industry is well-regulated, balanced and overseen by the independent Forest Practices Authority; and
  - (b) whenever Tasmania's native forests are harvested, they are regrown, ensuring the sector's long-term viability and underpinning the over 5,700 direct and indirect jobs supported through the industry.
- (4) Supports the August 2019 IPCC Special Report on 'Climate Change and Land', which says: "Sustainable forest management can maintain or enhance forest carbon stocks, and can maintain forest carbon sinks, including by transferring carbon to wood products."
- (5) Further notes:—
  - (a) that maintaining a native forest estate is a key commitment of Tasmania's Regional Forest Agreement (RFA) and that 58 per cent of Tasmania's native forests are protected in reserves with over one million hectares—or over 80 per cent—of old growth forest protected; and
  - (b) our approach maintains our native forest estate and provides environmental, economic and social benefits, for generations to come. (22 March 2022)

### 95 Ms White to move—That the House:—

- (1) Condemns the conduct of Government Members who groaned when a question was asked on behalf of a victim survivor in this Parliament.
- (2) Acknowledges the deep hurt this appalling behaviour caused victim survivors.
- (3) Notes that since that display of appalling behaviour there are still Government Members who have failed to apologise.
- (4) Calls on all remaining Government Members who are yet to apologise to do so without delay. (22 March 2022)

**19** Housing Policy: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 9 March 2022 by Mr Tucker—That the House:—

- (1) Agrees that Tasmania has experienced significant economic growth, and population growth, due to increasing demand for the Tasmanian way of life.
- (2) Acknowledges that the only way to meet growth in demand is to increase the supply of housing and land, which supports our strong economy and provides more jobs and opportunities for Tasmanians.
- (3) Notes:—
  - (a) the Tasmanian Liberal Government's recently announced housing package is the biggest housing investment in our State for decades, at more than \$1.5 billion; and
  - (b) that the Liberal Government's bold, comprehensive plan will deliver 10,000 new social and affordable homes by 2032.
- (5) Welcomes the Government's plan to increase first home ownership through the Housing Market Entry program, by doubling the State's equity contribution and reducing the deposit required, opening the door to home ownership to more Tasmanians.
- (6) Recognises that reductions in property costs, such as land tax, put downward pressure on rental price increases.
- (7) Acknowledges that other supports, such as first home owner duty concessions and grants, put more money back into the pockets of first home buyers.
