Notices of Motion

- 77 The Minister for Aboriginal Affairs to move—That the House:—
 - Notes 27 May to 3 June 2019 was National Reconciliation Week, a time for all (1) Australians to learn about our shared histories, cultures and achievements, and how each of us can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia.
 - Further notes the dates are very significant in their own right -27 May marks the (2) successful 1967 referendum in which Australians voted overwhelmingly to amend the Constitution to allow the Commonwealth to make laws for Aboriginal people and to include Aboriginal people in the census, and 3 June marks the High Court Mabo
 - Further notes Reconciliation Tasmania plays a key role in organising events to help (3) celebrate National Reconciliation Week, and that the Hodgman Liberal Government is providing \$15,000 to Reconciliation Tasmania to support three regional reconciliation festivals - including Mannalargenna Day in the north-east, and two new events in the south and the north-west.
 - Further notes these grants will be a catalyst to generate matching funding from both (4) private and public sector sources in each of the three regions to enable the three festivals to become self-supporting.
 - (5) Further notes this Government welcomes conversations with Reconciliation Tasmania and the Tasmanian Aboriginal people about reconciliation activities and initiatives to aid reconciliation here in Tasmania.
 - Further notes this Government has a genuine desire to make a positive difference that (6) recognises a remarkable 40,000 plus years of Aboriginal heritage and culture, and one that points to a brighter future for Aboriginal Tasmanians. (29 May 2019)
- **78** The Minister for Aboriginal Affairs to move—That the House:—
 - Notes Tasmanian Aboriginal artist, curator, educator, arts worker and esteemed (1) Palawa Elder, Aunty Lola Greeno, was honoured with the prestigious Red Ochre Award for Lifetime Achievement from the Australia Council for the Arts on Monday 27 May 2019.
 - Further notes Aunty Lola is the first Indigenous visual artist to receive the award of (2) National Living Treasure and in 2015 she was entered into the Tasmanian Honour Roll of Women for service to Aboriginal Affairs and the Arts.
 - Further notes Aunty Lola is one of a handful of women shell-stringers who is (3) ensuring this ancient craft is passed down from the Elders, with her shell necklace making famous Australia-wide, and her work having been widely exhibited and represented in many Australian museums.
 - (4) Further notes Aunty Lola is also well-known for her distinctly patterned, often colourful and iridescent, delicate strands of shells collected from the coastlines of

- Tasmania and is continuing to champion the traditions and culture of the Tasmanian Aboriginal women of Tasmania's Cape Barren and Flinders Islands.
- (5) Further notes Tasmania has an incredible 40,000 plus years of Aboriginal heritage and culture and the Hodgman Liberal Government acknowledges and thanks Aunty Lola for the role she plays in keeping this traditional heritage alive. (29 May 2019)
- 79 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Acknowledges the recent announcement by the Federal and Hodgman Liberal Governments of \$3 million in rebates for drought affected farmers to purchase new on-farm water infrastructure.
 - (2) Notes that these funds will help make Tasmanian farms more drought resilient, with eligible farmers and producers able to claim up to a quarter of the cost of new purchases and installation of new on-farm infrastructure up to \$25,000, with rebates now available for eligible Tasmanian farmers affected by drought.
 - (3) Further notes that the rebate can be used to support the installation of new pipes, water tanks, pumps, distilling dams, and power plants driving the water equipment, increasing water efficiency.
 - (4) Further notes that the Hodgman Liberal Government has committed \$70 million to advance Pipeline to Prosperity, which was recently added to Infrastructure Australia's Infrastructure Priority List which—if fully implemented—will see almost \$500 million invested across the State into another 10 potential irrigation schemes, creating thousands of jobs and return an estimated \$114 million each year to the agriculture sector, and the economy more broadly. (29 May 2019)
- **80** The Minister for Energy to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Commends Tasmania's volunteers, who freely give their time and skills to help Tasmania's communities.
 - (2) Notes that over six million Australians and—on average—four out of every five Tasmanian adults volunteer, donating around 7.1 million hours in Tasmania alone over the last twelve months.
 - (3) Further notes that, according to the State of Volunteering report, volunteering provided a total benefit of \$4.9 billion to the Tasmanian economy, with Tasmanian employers enjoying \$2.1 billion of productivity benefits as a result of their employees volunteering.
 - (4) Recognises that the Tasmanian Volunteering Awards are a joint project between the State Government and Volunteering Tasmania, and are Tasmania's only state-wide volunteer recognition program.
 - (5) Congratulates the Government's energy businesses; Aurora Energy, Hydro Tasmania and TasNetworks for being finalists in the Corporate and Civil award in this year's Tasmania Volunteering Awards.
 - (6) Further notes the Corporate and Civil award is awarded to a company or governmental organisation which encourages volunteering and releases their staff from employment to carry out volunteer activities as part of an employee or corporate volunteering program.
 - (7) Further congratulates Aurora Energy for winning the Corporate and Civil award.
 - (8) Further commends all volunteers who were recognised in 2019 Tasmanian Volunteering Awards for their important work and time given freely for the betterment of our community. (29 May 2019)
