REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1894.

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to lay before you the following Annual Report of the Board of Management, giving particulars regarding the government, condition, and cost of the above-named Hospital for the year 1894.

1. Messrs. Weedon, Irvine, and Dr. Pike retired from the Board of Management during the month of December, and were unanimously re-elected.

2. Fourteen Board and fifty-five Committee meetings were held during the year.

3. The number of cases of typhoid fever treated in the Hospital during the past year was forty-six (46), as compared with forty-nine (49) in the year 1893. The deaths from this disease numbered two (2).

The number of cases of diphtheria has shown a marked diminution, the numbers being, for 1894, nine (9) with two (2) deaths, as against twenty-seven (27) with one (1) death during 1893.

4. The thanks of the Board are due to the Honorary Dental Surgeons for the valuable work they continue to do for the poorer classes. There were no less than one thousand and four (1004) cases treated in the year.

Two Students have attended the dental practice. The regulations and curriculum for the guidance of pupils in this branch of surgery have been found to work well.

5. Courses of Lectures and demonstrations have been delivered to the Nurses by the Surgeon Superintendent on Minor Surgery, and by the Lady Superintendent on Nursing.

Examinations on the subjects lectured upon, and in the practical work of the wards, have been held during the year. Five (5) nurses have gained the certificate as "Trained Nurse" in accordance with the Regulations prescribed. On the whole the health of the Nursing Staff has been exceptionally good.

6. The attention of Wardens of Country Districts should again be called to the practice of sending chronic invalids to the Hospital instead of sending them direct to the Dépôt for Invalids.

7. The following improvements have been carried out:—

The cells at the Nurses' Home have been converted into suitable sleeping apartments for the male servants.

The lawns have been retopped and sown with grass seed.

Verandah posts replaced where out of repair.

Copper cisterns and copper boiler for the hot water-service have been placed in position, and Wards 15 and 16 have been repainted.

8. Mr. W. I. Thrower was elected a Member of the Board of Management, taking the place of Mr. B. P. Farrelly, deceased.

9. The Nursing Staff and Attendants have been regularly drilled by the Superintendent of Fire Brigades.

10. The quality of the provisions supplied to the Hospital has on the whole been good.

11. The Hospital is indebted to many citizens for acts of kindness towards the patients and staff.

During the year several performances were given by private individuals and companies for the benefit and entertainment of the patients and staff.

12. The thanks of the Board are also due to the Members of the Honorary Consulting Staff for their attendance when called upon at the Hospital.

13. Three medical students have attended the practice of medicine at the Hospital during the past year.

14. On the whole the Hospital and its management may be looked upon as in a more complete state than at any previous period since it has been under the care and control of the Board.

15. The usual detailed information furnished by the Surgeon-Superintendent is embodied in the Report, and is of an interesting character.
