

MEMO.

THIRLSTANE.

THE experiment at Thirlstane so far serves only to give a little colour to Mr. Stewart's representations, but it fails utterly to prove the *need* of the school, which, however, is obviously a *convenience* to a good many children.

My visit for examination was not unexpected, and I found 42 children present. Of these 42 children one was a temporary visitor, and 2 belong to the teacher's family. Of the 39 remaining at least 32 should (in the absence of this school) as previously reported attend elsewhere, which many of them previously did. Of the 7 who remain 3 are over 21 miles from Green's Creek school (where, however, they formerly attended), and 4 may perhaps be allowed to be too young to walk far.

Of the 42 children referred to above only 2 have recently come to live on the Thirlstane estate, so that the condition of things has not changed in any material degree since my former reports were written.

Sir,

WE, the undersigned inhabitants of Green's Creek and New Ground, having heard with much disapproval that a movement is on foot having for its object the closing of New Ground and Green's Creek Schools in order that Thirlstane may be made into a first-class school, therefore pray that you will not (No. 131.)

entertain the Petition *re* the closing of our schools. At the same time we consider Thirlstane School is not required, as it is only two miles from New Ground School, and if any of the schools are to be closed it is Thirlstane that ought to be done away with, as the children attending there could easily attend either Green's Creek or New Ground Schools, and so keep up the attendance at old-established schools built and paid for by the inhabitants.
