

COMMITTEE. PARLIAMENTARY LIBRARY

THE Members of the Joint Committee of both Houses appointed to be a Library Committee having held several meetings and entered into correspondence with the Honorable the Chief Secretary, which has resulted in an unsatisfactory manner, feel it to be their duty to report to your Honorable Houses as follows.

The amount voted by Parliament for the Library (including books, works of reference, magazines, periodicals, and newspapers) during the past few years has proved wholly insufficient, consequently Supplementary Estimates have been resorted to the extent of £62 18s. 2d. in 1894, £46 in 1895, and about £25 will be necessary for 1896.

The Committee have been unable, owing to the want of funds, to procure for the Library books absolutely necessary for the guidance of Members.

Notwithstanding the urgent representations of the Committee, the Government decline to place more than £30 at the disposal of the Committee for the year 1897. A copy of the correspondence is hereto attached.—(Appendix A.)

In providing for the distribution of this amount of £30, the Committee have decided to continue to take the periodicals named in the attached paper.—(Appendix B.) This will absorb £27 12s. 2d. The balance will be retained for the purchase of absolutely necessary books of reference. There will be no funds to meet the annual payment of £18 14s. now expended in subscribing to local newspapers, and in consequence it has been decided to give notice to discontinue these as from the Ist January next.

APPENDIX A.

Parliament House, Hobart, 19th August, 1896.

At a Meeting of the Library Committee held this day, it was resolved that I should communicate with you, pointing out the uselessness of placing on the Estimates so small a sum as £30 for the payment of the newspapers and periodicals and books required by Parliament. I therefore trust that the Government will, before the Estimates leave the Assembly, cause a reasonable sum to be appropriated, that is to say, £40 for newspapers and periodicals, and £30 for the Parliamentary Library.

SIR,

AT a meeting of the Parliamentary Library Committee held yesterday, I submitted your letter of the 14th instant, in which you state that the circumstances of the Colony do not justify any increase in the present vote for the provision of newspapers, periodicals, &c. for the Library; whereupon the following Resolution was agreed to, and I was directed to forward you a copy of the same.

"Resolved, That, as the Government decline to make any further provision for the wants of the Library, the Librarian be instructed to give notice to each local newspaper, informing them that for want of funds the Library Committee regrets the necessity of discontinuing subscribing to their paper as from the date when current subscription expires."

In reply to your letter of the 25th instant, I would point out that the Library Committee had no knowledge of the determination of the Government not to grant any further funds for the use of the Library until expenses were actually incurred. Consequently the Government, and not the Committee, is in fault, and I am surprised at your statement that the Committee had diverted funds to less necessary purposes. It is a pity your Government do not stick to facts, instead of making unfounded statements.
