

EXHIBITIONS FROM PUBLIC TO SUPERIOR SCHOOLS.

THE Board of Education has directed the publication of the annexed Report of the Examiners appointed to conduct the Examination of Candidates for Exhibitions from Public to Superior Schools.

The Candidates who obtained the highest number of marks were :-

Males.

HUBERT SPRINGFORD EAST. HOWARD CHIPLIN. ALBERT EDWARD MURRAY. WALTER JOHN JOHNSTONE. WILLIAM DAVID PARRY. ALFRED BROCK BRYAN.

Females.

EMMA LOUISA RULE. Annie Elizabeth Thyssen. Ellen Elizabeth Rule. Amy Jamieson Hawthorn.

The Board has, accordingly, awarded to each of these Candidates an Exhibition of the value of £16 13s. 4d. per annum, tenable for Four years from the 1st proximo, subject to the conditions laid down in the Regulations dated 16th July, 1879.

EXAMINERS' REPORT.

WE have the honor to present to the Board of Education a Report of the Twenty-first Annual Examination for Exhibitions from Public to Superior Schools.

The Examination began on the 22nd of June, and ended on the 25th. The standard of qualification and the marks obtainable in the several subjects were the same as those of last year. Twenty-four boys and seven girls presented themselves, nine of whom were examined in Launceston, and the rest in Hobart Town. They represent thirteen schools, the large majority of which are in the rural districts.

READING. Mr. Inspector Rule, Examiner.—To let one Examiner hear all the Candidates read, this part of the Examination was held in Launceston on the 24th and in Hobart Town on the following morning. Several read very well. M'Loughlin, Annie E. Thyssen, Langley, Hogarth, Ellen E. Rule, Read, Emma L. Rule, Parry, Harris, Wells, and East deserve special mention. Fifteen others obtained more than half marks.

DICTATION. Rev. Canon Bailey, Examiner.—The spelling was, with very few exceptions, correct throughout; the failure was in punctuation, which seems to receive little, if any, attention.

PENMANSHIP. Rev. Canon Bailey and Mr. Inspector Rule, Examiners.—Most of the specimen papers showed clear, neat, and free writing; and nearly all the papers in other subjects showed creditable penmanship.

English Grammar. Rev. Canon Bailey, Examiner.—The answering in this subject was, on the whole, weak. Six Candidates obtained more than three-fifths of the marks allotted to the subject, but none of the others reached half the number. Hubert East, Albert Murray, Howard Chiplin, Malcolm Johnston, William Parry, and Alfred Bryan sent in very creditable papers.

Geography. Rev. Canon Bailey, Examiner.—In this subject the answering was, on the whole, more satisfactory than usual. Three Candidates gained more than three-fourths of the maximum number of marks, ten others more than two-thirds, and two others more than half. Hubert East, Caleb Adams, and Emma Rule deserve special mention.

HISTORY. Mr. Inspector Rule, Examiner.—The answering of several Candidates was terse and to the point, showing a fair acquaintance with the outlines of history as given in ordinary textbooks; in most of which the history of the People is either ignored altogether, or subordinated to that of Courts, political intrigues, and details of battles. Some Candidates neglected to make their answers explicit. Twenty-five obtained more than half marks; and East, Halloran, Emma L. Rule, Johnston, Bryan, Murray, Parry, Adams, Annie E. Thyssen, Harris, Bennett, Ellen E. Rule, and Chiplin deserve credit, having exceeded three-fourths of the marks.

ARITHMETIC. Mr. Inspector Rule, Examiner.—Only nine Candidates obtained half marks in this subject. Johnstone did excellent work, showing himself master of the paper; two mistakes, evidently slips, in easy sums prevented him getting full marks. Chiplin and East, who reached three-fourths of the marks, and Murray, Adams, Parry, and Halloran deserve special mention. Many of the others lost marks through ignorance of the divisions of a chain into rods and links. Many also lost marks through not recognising the technical meaning of product. Several multiplied the length of a field by its breadth to ascertain the amount of fencing required to enclose it. The majority need exercise in sums concerning ordinary business.

The annexed Table of Marks shows the results in detail. Three of the Candidates failed to obtain 400 marks, the standard qualifying for a place in the Table. Fourteen boys and three girls have attained the standard for an Exhibition. One of the female Candidates was absent from the Reading through illness; otherwise it is more than probable that she would have gained the number of marks requisite for an Exhibition. We have pleasure in recommending for Exhibitions Hubert Springford East, Howard Chiplin, Albert Edward Murray, Walter John Johnstone, William David Parry, Alfred Brock Bryan. Also, Emma Louisa Rule, Annie Elizabeth Thyssen, and Ellen Elizabeth Rule.

The results are, we think, upon the whole satisfactory; but it will be seen from the Table of Marks that there are some subjects on which many of the Candidates were weak. To these the Teachers will do well to pay more particular attention in future.

- 5. Give a short account of Geoffrey Chaucer, John Wycliffe, Owen Glendower, William Caxton.
- 6. Who was the leader of the Israelites after the death of Moses? Give a description, according to the Scripture record, of their crossing the River Jordan.
- 7. What towns are mentioned as the first that Joshua fought against? At which of these were the Israelites repulsed?
- 8. Name the tribes of Israel whose territory lay east of the Jordan. What was the condition on which their selection was permitted?

REGULATIONS FOR EXHIBITIONS FROM PUBLIC TO SUPERIOR SCHOOLS, 1880.

IT is hereby notified that Six Exhibitions of the annul value of £16 13s. 4d. each, tenable for four years from the 1st July, 1880, will be open for competition, during the month of June next, to Male pupils between the ages of 10 and 12 years who have attended one or other of the Public Schools in Tasmania for the twelve months immediately preceding the 1st June, 1880.

- II. It is also notified that Six Exhibitions of the value of £16 13s. 4d., tenable for four years from 1st July, 1880, will be open for competition during the month of June next to Female pupils between the ages of 10 and 12 years who have attended one or other of the Public Schools in Tasmania for the twelve months immediately preceding the 1st June, 1880.
 - III. The Examination will comprise the following subjects:-
 - Reading aloud passages in prose or verse from some English Author.
 Writing from Dictation.

- Penmanship.
 English Grammar and Language.
- Geography.

- 6. History.

 A. English History.—A.D. 1377 to A.D. 1485.
 B. Sacred History.—From the death of Moses to the accession of King Saul.
- IV. The following values have been affixed to the several subjects of Examination:-

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It shall be essential to success that a Candidate gain 50 per cent. of the total number of marks; that is to say, 600 marks.

- V. The Exhibitions obtained by Male Candidates will be tenable at one or other of the following Superior Schools as shall be named by the Parent or Guardian, and be approved by the Board; viz.—The High School, Hobart Town; the Hunchins School, Hobart Town; the Church Grammar School, Launceston; and the Horton College, Ross; and Exhibitions obtained by Female Candidates will be tenable a such Schools as may be selected by the Parent or Guardian, and approved by the Board.
- VI. A Boarding Allowance of Twenty Pounds per annum, in addition to the amount of the Exhibition, will be granted to Exhibitioners whose residence is more than five miles from a Superior School.
- VII. The Exhibition will be payable by quarterly instalments to each Exhibitioner upon production of a certificate of industry and good conduct from the authorities of the school to which the Exhibitioner may belong.
- VIII. In the event of the non-production of such certificate for any one quarter, the Exhibition shall be declared vacant; provided always that this rule shall not apply to Exhibitioners who may have been incapacitated from attending school by illness or other cause deemed sufficient by the Board.
 - IX. The Examination for these Exhibitions will be held in Hobart Town and Launceston.
- X. Applications* from Candidates desirous of offering themselves for Examination should be transmitted to the Chairman on or before the 1st May, 1880, supported by certificates as under:-
 - 1. Certificate of good conduct for the twelve months immediately preceding the date of application from the Conductor of the School attended by the Candidate.
 - 2. Certified extract from Register of Births, or such other Certificate as shall be deemed sufficient by the Board, showing that the Candidate will not have reached the age of 12 years on the 1st June, 1880.
