

ANNUAL REPORT for 1880.

SIR,

In accordance with the Rules of the Hobart General Hospital, I have the honor to lay before you the following Annual Report, containing such tabulated and other information as will, I trust, fully exhibit the working of that Institution during the past year.

No change has taken place in the constitution of the Board since my last Report.

Seventeen Board and sixty-two Committee meetings were held during the year, at all of which the attendance of Members was, without exception, good; while during the same period the Honorary Medical Staff made eleven hundred and thirty-one professional visits to the wards of the Hospital.

In my Annual Reports for 1877, 1878, and 1879, attention was drawn to the very unsatisfactory condition of the old buildings connected with the Hospital, and the wretched accommodation which those buildings afford for the treatment of the sick; but as a large sum of money has been voted by Parliament, and is now available, for extensive improvements in the organization of the Hospital, further complaint under this head is, happily, unnecessary: and it is satisfactory to add that the whole of the improvements carried out under the Board in connection with the Hospital have proved beneficial and satisfactory.

In my Annual Reports for 1878 and 1879 I pointed out the very large expenditure for medicines, surgical appliances, &c. incurred on account of the General Hospital,—the average cost under this head for 1877, 1878, and 1879 being £687 per annum, an expenditure I considered far exceeding the wants of the Hospital when considered by itself. This branch of the service has now been placed on a somewhat different footing, and in future more accurate data as to the cost of medicines, &c. for the different Government establishments will be obtainable.

The annual cost of each occupied bed in 1878 was £82 14s. 5d; in 1879, £72 13s. $6\frac{1}{4}d$.; and during the past year it has been £64 6s. $0\frac{1}{4}d$.

The number of Patients treated during 1880, and the diseases from which they suffered, have been tabulated, and will be found in Appendix A.
