

SIR,

I HAVE the honor to submit the Annual Report with the statistical information respecting the Gaols, Hobart and Launceston, for the year 1895.

The total number of prisoners in custody on December 31st last was as follows :—

being a decrease of 41 males and 4 females in Hobart, and an increase of 1 male and 2 females in Launceston. There is thus a total decrease of 40 males and 2 females as compared with last year.

The total number received and discharged during 1895 was as follows :—

As compared with 1894, there is a decrease in receipts of 246, and in discharges of 239, the receipts and discharges for that year being respectively 1164 and 1199.

The average daily number during the year was 134·6 in Hobart and 20·03 in Launceston, as compared with 174 and 23·23 respectively for 1894, being a decrease of 39·4 in Hobart and 3·2 in Launceston, or a total decrease of 42·6.

At the beginning of the year Colonel Warner replaced Mr. Superintendent Hedberg as Governor of the Gaol, Hobart, and Mr. Berresford replaced Mr. Armstrong as Superintendent of the Gaol, Launceston. The services of one warder have been dispensed with at Hobart, and one additional warder has been appointed at Launceston.

A further improvement has been effected in the Gaol, Hobart, by providing separate cells for the females. The separate-cell system is now in general use throughout the Gaol, Hobart.

A new industry has been started by the introduction of brush and broom-making. The articles produced have given every satisfaction, and the industry is likely to be of a profitable nature.

Under the direction of the Public Works Department a gang of prisoners has been employed making a carriage-road from the Bower to the Springs, Mt. Wellington. The progress made in the work, and the conduct of the men employed, have been highly satisfactory.
