Notices of Motion

TASMANIA

- 67 The Minister for Police, Fire and Emergency Management to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Notes that the Hodgman Liberal Government greatly values the contribution of our 5,500 emergency service volunteers who give up their time to help communities in their time of need.
 - (2) Further notes that Tasmania has one of the most active and well-coordinated emergency volunteer networks in the country that was on full display during this summer's bushfire season.
 - (3) Further notes that this network of volunteer brigades, branch stations and units provide an invaluable resource to support our full-time Tasmania Fire Service, State Emergency Service and Ambulance Tasmania personnel.
 - (4) Acknowledges that during this protracted and complex bushfire season these volunteers used their own time and many took time away from their work, with the support of their employers, to protect their communities, and sometimes communities in other parts of the State. In many cases these were self-employed people who downed tools and spent days, and sometimes weeks, away from their families and loved ones.
 - (5) Further notes that no one knows when an emergency will occur and as we have seen in Tasmania in recent years, with severe fire and flood situations, it is vital that our volunteers are well trained and well resourced.
 - (6) Recognises Tasmania's fantastic emergency services personnel who act with diligence and bravery and who did an incredible job in the face of extreme and challenging circumstances.
 - (7) Further notes that 22 May 2019 was 'Wear Orange Wednesday' (WOW) to support our State Emergency Services (SES) volunteers. WOW Day is a national campaign with a simple call to wear orange in recognition of thousands of SES volunteers who give up their time to serve their communities in floods, storms and other emergencies.
 - (8) Thanks all of our volunteers for being there in the face of fires, floods and other emergencies – your community spirit and sacrifice is acknowledged and applauded. (23 May 2019)
- **68** The Attorney-General to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Congratulates Tasmania's 24 newest correctional officers who graduated at a ceremony held on 11 May 2019.
 - (2) Notes the Hodgman Liberal Government has recruited 107 new correctional officers since 2016 following the graduation of these 24 new recruits.
 - (3) Further notes that recruitment is currently underway for new recruits to commence training in July 2019.

- (4) Further notes that this major staffing increase is in addition to the Government's commitment to build new and upgrade existing prison infrastructure, including a \$270 million new Northern prison, a new \$70 million Southern Remand Centre on the Risdon Prison site and a \$9 million upgrade to facilities at Risdon Prison. (23 May 2019)
- **69** The Attorney-General to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Recognises that two highly significant sketches of Tasmanian Aboriginal men have recently been unveiled at the Allport Library and Museum of Fine Arts in Hobart.
 - (2) Notes that the extremely rare portraits are of immense cultural significance to Tasmania, and have led to considerable local and national interest.
 - (3) Further notes that the drawings by artist Nicholas-Martin Petit are some of the most sensitive and important depictions of Tasmanian Aboriginal people from the late 1700s.
 - (4) Further notes that these extraordinary sketches, purchased at auction by Libraries Tasmania through the Allport Library and Museum of Fine Arts Bequest Fund, reveal unique insights into Tasmanian Aboriginal culture prior to the arrival of Europeans. (23 May 2019)
- 70 The Attorney-General to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Notes the Hodgman Liberal Government's consideration of reform to section 194K of the Evidence Act 2001 to ensure it appropriately protects the rights of victims of sexual assault.
 - (2) Further notes that any reform must ensure the right balance is struck between protecting all victims of sexual assault and the public interest in open justice.
 - (3) Further notes the immense courage of rape and sexual assault survivors to speak about their experience, and the Government's willingness to consider reforms that facilitate those that wish to be identified, to do so more readily.
 - (4) Recognises that some members of the community have expressed concerns that this provision does not currently strike the right balance, and therefore the Government will consider the many submissions from stakeholders and community members in response to the Government's Discussion Paper. (23 May 2019)
- 71 The Attorney-General to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Notes the Hodgman Liberal Government's recent opening of the tender for the first stage of works for the new \$70 million Southern Remand Centre.
 - (2) Further notes that the 140 bed facility is expected to create more than 130 jobs during construction with 50 ongoing jobs once complete.
 - (3) Further notes that the Southern Remand Centre is expected to be fully operational by the end of 2021, and is just one of several significant prison infrastructure projects announced by the Government. (23 May 2019)
- 72 The Attorney-General to move—That the House recognises the Hodgman Liberal Government's strong support of the Tasmanian arts community, including provision of \$100,000 to individual artists in the latest round of Arts Tasmania funding announcements such as:—
 - (*a*) four talented artists to share \$40,000 through the Tasmanian Aboriginal Arts Mentoring Scheme;
 - (b) six recipients receiving funding of \$36,000 through the Artsbridge program who will be funded to participate in exciting cultural opportunities interstate and overseas;
 - (c) two artists will each receive \$7,000 through the Arts Tasmania Claudio Alcorso International Residency program; and
 - (d) a further two Tasmanian artists will each spend six weeks immersing themselves in the arts and cultural sector of South Korea as part of the Jeju International Residency program. (23 May 2019)
- 73 The Attorney-General to move—That the House:—

- (1) Congratulates Mr Vincenzo Caltabiano on his recent appointment as the new Director of the Legal Aid Commission of Tasmania.
- (2) Notes the wealth of experience that the new Director brings to the role.
- (3) Acknowledges Ms Susie Winter for acting in the role of Director while the recruitment process was undertaken.
- (4) Recognises the important work that the Legal Aid Commission of Tasmania does for the Tasmanian community.
- (5) Further recognises that the Hodgman Liberal Government is a strong supporter of the Legal Aid Commission and has provided record state funding to the Tasmanian legal assistance sector. (23 May 2019)
- 74 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Notes the commitment of the Hodgman Liberal Government to rural and regional communities across Tasmania.
 - (2) Further notes the support provided to the Evandale football and cricket clubs, both of which have served the Evandale region for well over 100 years, being established in 1887 (cricket) and 1892 (football) respectively, making them some of the oldest sporting clubs in Tasmania.
 - (3) Acknowledges the provision of \$63,000 in funding by the Hodgman Liberal Government towards a recently installed hybrid cricket wicket and new electronic scoreboard.
 - (4) Further notes that the Hodgman Liberal Government is a proud advocate for regional sporting clubs and the communities they represent, and has also provided the Northern Midlands Council with a \$158,000 grant for upgrading the Morven Park Oval and clubrooms.
 - (5) Recognises that sporting clubs are an important part of rural communities and congratulates the office-bearers and members of both Clubs for their commitment in helping build their local communities. (23 May 2019)
- 75 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Commends the Maydena Community Association for their hard work and endeavour in supporting the local community.
 - (2) Notes that the Association has played a key role in representing the community's interests to local, State and Federal Government, securing support and funding for important community initiatives.
 - (3) Welcomes the recent confirmation that the Association will receive a defibrillator, thanks to the Hodgman Liberal Government.
 - (4) Further notes that defibrillators make a very real difference when someone suffers a cardiac arrest and can be the difference between life and death, particularly in regional and remote areas.
 - (5) Further welcomes this great outcome for the community, which is another example of the Government's commitment to helping our most vulnerable citizens. (23 May 2019)
- 76 The Minister for Veterans Affairs' to move—That the House:—
 - (1) Congratulates Northern Midlands RSL Sub-Branch for the valuable assistance, support and advocacy it has provided for veterans and their families in the region over many years.
 - (2) Notes that the Hodgman Liberal Government has provided a \$20,000 grant to enable the RSL to perform roof repairs to their clubrooms, which will help ensure that the RSL continues its important work in supporting veterans in the Northern Midlands region and beyond.
 - (3) Further notes that in addition to this support, the Hodgman Liberal Government is providing \$750,000 in funding to back our veterans and ex-serving communities in Tasmania which includes \$100,000 per annum over three years towards the Teddy Sheean Grant Fund, which assists RSLs and ex-serving organisations with small infrastructure works, repairs and equipment purchases.

(4) Acknowledges that the Hodgman Liberal Government is a proud supporter of servicemen and women, their families and the RSL branches around Tasmania and will continue that unwavering support into the future. (23 May 2019)
