Notices of Motion

220 Ms O'Byrne to move—That the House:—

- (1) Congratulates the Launceston RSL Sub Branch ADF Welfare Program.
- (2) Notes that the Program supports Australian Defence Force members and their families who may be experiencing crisis or stress in their lives and supports approximately 14 people a month.
- (3) Further notes the Program has been in operation for 4 years and provides advocacy, support and access to information and services across a range of issues such as housing support, financial assistance, mental health and relationship matters and provides food, toiletries and furniture as they transition veterans into housing.
- (4) Further notes the RSL Launceston ADF Welfare Program won volunteer of the year group award in 2018.
- (5) Further notes that the program is completely self-funded with generous support from RSL Members and the public.
- (6) Further congratulates the Launceston RSL ADF team on their most recent fundraiser, a Trivia Night which raised \$3,900.
- (6) Recognises the tireless work of the committee, Coordinator Joy, Secretary Dianne and committee volunteers Leanne, Des, Kelvin, Melissa Anita and Adrian. (30 October 2019)

221 The Minister for Veterans' Affairs to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises that Veterans' Health Week is being held from 26 October – 3 November 2019.
- (2) Notes that the Week—an annual national week—raises awareness of improving health and wellbeing for former and current serving Australian Defence Force personnel, their families and carers.
- (3) Further notes that the Week also highlights the key role played by the Federal Department of Veterans' Affairs, ex-serving organisations and community groups in supporting our veterans and ex-serving personnel.
- (4) Acknowledges that the theme for Veterans' Health Week in 2019 is “Mental Wellness” and the importance of maintaining good mental health and wellness.
- (5) Further notes that mental wellness is essential for overall health and wellbeing which, in turn, strongly influences physical health and social connectedness with family, friends and community.
- (6) Further acknowledges that support provided by the Hodgman Liberal Government to Tasmania's more than 10,500 veterans and ex-serving personnel which includes more than \$750,000 in additional funding over three years.
- (7) Further notes that there are activities occurring around Tasmania during the Week to highlight the importance of improving and maintaining good mental health among the veteran community including try rowing, historical boat trips, a younger heroes camp, social gatherings, information sessions and opportunities to visit Men's Sheds.

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- (8) Encourages Tasmanians, particularly our veterans and ex-serving personnel, to participate in events and support mental wellness. (30 October 2019)

222 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes Gone Fishing Day was held on 20 October 2019.
- (2) Further notes that Gone Fishing Day is an initiative of the Australian Recreational Fishing Foundation, and encourages people to get outdoors, drop a line and enjoy time with family and friends.
- (3) Further notes that several events were held across Tasmania, including Fishcare clinics, and opportunities for people to borrow Fishcare fishing rods and try fishing for the first time.
- (4) Congratulates Fishcare and the many Tasmanian volunteers who contributed to making Gone Fishing Day such a success.
- (5) Further notes that the Hodgman majority Liberal Government recognises recreational fishing and boating is an important way of life for over 100,000 Tasmanians.
- (6) Further notes that State's world class sea and inland fisheries provide superb opportunities for locals and anglers from around the world, and that recreational fishers contribute an estimated \$90 million into the Tasmanian economy each year.
- (7) Further notes that Tasmania's world class inland trout fishery will take the world stage when Tasmania hosts the 2019 World Fly Fishing Championships in November 2019. (30 October 2019)

223 Ms *Standen* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Congratulates the Salvation Army and Hobart City Mission on their joint initiative – the Safe Night Space Pilot Program – to provide basic, overnight shelter to 'rough sleepers' in the City of Hobart.
- (2) Notes the partners were hoping the pilot would officially open in Hobart in September 2019 and run for 6 months.
- (3) Recognises that the proposal states that 'With the housing crisis in Hobart reaching unprecedented levels the number of people sleeping rough has gone well beyond an unacceptable' level and that 'overnight outreach services during winter, are not adequate to respond to people who are sleeping rough in the City of Hobart'.
- (4) Further notes that the social housing system is blocked, the proposal describes a 'service merry-go-round' with a 'revolving door effect' meaning that 50% of those households who receive assistance leave the homelessness assistance sector permanently'.
- (5) Further notes that the Safe Night Space requires a budget of \$450,000 to employ appropriately qualified staff and manage the program for 6 months of operation including a contribution from State Government, donations sought from the community, funds from the partner organisations as well as in-kind support from organisations and agencies.
- (6) Condemns the Minister for Housing, Hon. Roger Jaensch MP for his lack of urgency in responding to the proposal despite failing to produce a work plan or budget allocation for the Government's \$5M emergency response to address homelessness announced mid-2019.
- (7) Calls on the State Government to guarantee funding assistance for the Safe Night Space Pilot Program. (31 October 2019)

224 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Recognises that the Tasmanian Agricultural Productivity Group announced their Annual Awards for Excellence in Agriculture at their Annual General Meeting in Devonport during the week 20-26 October 2019.
- (2) Notes that the meeting is always a well-attended event with representatives from across the wider agri sector - vegetable processing, plantation forestry, non-food crops, agribusiness marketing, fresh vegetables, rural banking, dairy processing, primary production, regulatory affairs and agri-business affairs.
- (3) Congratulates the following Award recipients:—

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- (a) Lifetime Achievement Award - Ian MacLeod in developing Peracto into a successful national company from its North West Tasmanian base and for his focus on training and development for young Tasmanians;
 - (b) Service to the Community Award – Simplot in recognition of the pivotal role they have played in vegetable processing in Tasmania for many years with their ‘family run’ leadership model providing a more people centred philosophy in decision making; and
 - (c) Service to the Agricultural Community – Tasmanian Women in Agriculture in recognition of their achievements in advocating for positive change for over 25 years.
- (4) Further notes the Hodgman Liberal Government is on target to grow the annual farm gate value of the agricultural sector to \$10 million by 2050, with Tasmania's agricultural production increasing in value in 2017-18 to \$1.60 billion, an increase of 9.1 percent. (31 October 2019)

225 The Minister for Primary Industries and Water to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes that the annual Tasmanian Minerals Emergency Response Competition was held the weekend of 26-27 October 2019 at the MMG Rosebery mine site.
- (2) Acknowledges that this year is the 32nd year of the competition being held in Tasmania.
- (3) Further notes that Tasmania is the only State that has such a coordinated response strategy, including the use of a universal emergency phone number across all mine and smelter sites.
- (4) Further acknowledges the efforts of the Tasmanian Minerals, Manufacturing and Energy Council and members in fostering this capability in the minerals industry.
- (5) Congratulates the team from Grange Resources for winning the theory and first aid categories of the 2019 competition.
- (6) Further congratulates the team from Henty Gold Mine for winning the 2019 Underground Search and Rescue category.
- (7) Further congratulates the Tasmanian Minerals Emergency Response Competition Mutual Aid Team for winning the 2019 Surface Search and Rescue category.
- (8) Further congratulates the Cornwall Coal Mine Team for being declared the overall winners for 2019, including taking out the Team Skills and Rope Rescue categories. (31 October 2019)

226 Ms *Ogilvie* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Supports improved Right to Information processes.

- (1) Congratulates Prime Minister Hon. Scott Morrison MP and the Federal Liberal Party for the outstanding result in the Australian Federal election held on 18 May 2019.

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- (2) Further congratulates, subject to final confirmation, the election of Tasmanian Federal Liberal representatives in both the Senate and the House of Representatives.
- (3) Notes the strong relationship between the Hodgman and Morrison Governments, working together to deliver a stronger economy, real investment in infrastructure and better health and education services for all Tasmanians. (Next Speaker: Dr *Woodruff*)

5 Battery of the Nation: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 31 July 2019 by Mrs *Rylah*—That the House:—

- (1) Notes Tasmania has the renewable and dispatchable energy the rest of the nation needs, and the Hodgman Liberal Government is committed to using this advantage to ensure all Tasmanians benefit.
- (2) Records this Governments continuing drive for the development of the Battery of the Nation and the crucial second interconnector, the Marinus project, which have the potential to inject up to \$5 billion into the Tasmanian economy and deliver 2,000 jobs, particularly into regional areas.
- (3) Further notes that the development stage of the first phase of the Battery of the Nation carries the commitment of the Federal Government through the Federal Underwriting New Generation Investment program.
- (4) Further notes that support by both the Hodgman Liberal Government and the Federal Government, gives UPC Renewables and AC energy, more confidence to develop their Robbins Island and Jims Plain wind and solar parks.
- (5) Recognises that Tasmania has a world-class wind resource complemented by our pumped hydro that means there will always be some electricity available for export when the mainland is experiencing low wind or high demand.
- (6) Acknowledges that the Australian Government clearly recognises the importance of Tasmania's energy solutions and our status as the leading energy state.
- (7) Commends the Hodgman Liberal Government for its strong commitment to making use of the natural resources available to the State while at the same time ensuring all Tasmanians will have access to low cost, reliable and clean energy in their homes and businesses. (Mrs *Rylah*)

To which the following amendment has been proposed by Dr *Woodruff*, by leaving out all words after "That the House:—" and inserting instead:

- “(1) Notes that the Liberals repeatedly talk about the Marinus project and use it as a political wedge, particularly during election periods, despite the fact that they have not put forward a financing proposal or a position on who should finance the multi-billion project.
- (2) Agrees that the project could cost in excess of current total Public Non-Financial Corporations Sector debt, and feasibility studies and prominent economists such as Saul Eslake have raised serious concerns about the viability of the project, which have not been addressed by the State Government.
- (3) Notes that the Liberals passed legislation to set wholesale electricity prices at a rate higher than projected, leading to energy bills decreasing by less than they would otherwise would have.
- (4) Notes with alarm that the Liberal Government continues to allow Entura to engage in profiteering from immoral projects overseas such as the Karuma hydro power project Uganda, which has been linked to killings and other human rights violations.
- (5) Condemns the Liberal Government for their lack of honesty, ethics or plan in their handling of the Energy portfolio.” (Next Speaker: Minister for Energy)

6 Minimum Mandatory Sentences: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 7 August 2019 by Mr *Tucker*—That the House:—

- (1) Welcomes the Federal Labor party's recent sensible backflip on minimum mandatory sentences for crimes relating to child abuse.
- (2) Acknowledges the Tasmanian Labor Party is now out of step with its Federal Labor colleagues.
- (3) Supports the introduction of minimum mandatory sentences for serious sexual offences against children. (Next Speaker: The Attorney-General)

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7 Housing and Homelessness: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Thursday, 8 August 2019 by the Minister for Housing—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges the dedicated work that is being done every day in the community and housing sectors to support Tasmanians experiencing homelessness or who are at risk of homelessness.
- (2) Further acknowledges that homelessness is often linked to other challenges such as mental illness, and the Tasmanian Government is focusing on the integration of mental health services to provide more holistic support and greater independence for clients.
- (3) Further acknowledges that Tasmania's Affordable Housing Strategy is responding to the current challenges in the housing market by boosting supply across a spectrum of needs.
- (4) Further acknowledges that the Affordable Housing Action Plan Stage 2 and the additional investment in funding is another positive step towards continuing this momentum.
- (5) Recognises that all levels of government have a role to play in addressing the supply and demand in our housing market.
- (6) Call on all Members to work together to put the needs of Tasmanians above political point scoring. (Next Speaker: Minister for Housing)

8 Alcohol and Drug Dependency Repeal Bill 2019 (No. 40 of 2019): Second reading. (Minister for Mental Health and Wellbeing)

9 Police Legislation Miscellaneous Amendments Bill 2019 (No. 44 of 2019): Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Thursday, 31 October 2019 by the Minister for Police, Fire and Emergency Services – That the Bill be now read the Second time. (Next Speaker: Mr *Tucker*)

10 Economic Growth: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 16 October 2019 by Mrs *Rylah*—That the House:—

- (1) Acknowledges that the Hodgman majority Liberal Government has a long-term plan to keep our economy strong, carefully manage the Budget, help create jobs, and invest even more in essential services.
- (2) Notes that, at the State election in March 2018, Tasmanians saw the progress that had been made in delivering our plan, across our State, in four years under a majority Liberal Government, and they supported it again.
- (3) Recognises that a vital part of the plan was to first and foremost, restore business confidence and strengthen our economy.
- (4) Further notes that Tasmania's businesses are now measured as the most confident in the nation, that Tasmania has the best business conditions in the nation and that Tasmanian small businesses are the powerhouse of our economy.
- (5) Further acknowledges the Shadow Treasurer, Hon. David O'Byrne MP's public admission this week that, after five and a half years in Opposition, Labor still has no vision or plan.
- (6) Endorses the Hodgman majority Liberal Government's plan to continue to grow the economy and help create jobs, by supporting Tasmanian businesses and unlocking investment opportunities in Tasmania. (Next Speaker: Ms *O'Byrne*)
