

PARLIAMENT OF TASMANIA.

HOSPITAL FOR INSANE, NEW NORFOLK:

REPORT FOR 1885.

Presented to both Houses of Parliament by His Excellency's Command.



Hospital for the Insane, New Norfolk, May, 1886.

I HAVE the honor to forward my Report on this Institution for 1885.

On 31st December, 1885, there were 283 patients in this Hospital,—viz., 134 males and 149 females,—and the total number treated during the year was 360.

There have been 50 admissions,—viz., 30 males and 20 females, and 8 re-admissions,—viz., 4 males and 4 females.

With reference to the re-admissions, the period between discharge and re-admission varies from a few days to 14 years.

Thirty-five patients have been discharged; of these 18 had recovered, and of the remaining 17, 5 were discharged to the New Town Invalid Depôt on trial, two on trial for 7 days, and 10 were discharged to their friends in accordance with Sect. 22 of 22nd Vict. No. 23.

Of these latter, two were convalescing and had a good prospect of recovery, and the remaining 8 (one of whom only has returned) had evinced very considerable mental improvement.

The percentage of discharges on admissions was 60.34. In this calculation the admissions of idiot and imbecile patients are included. Excluding the above classes the percentage was 67.03.

Sixteen male Criminal Lunatics were transferred to the Hospital for the Insane, Cascades, and their absence from the wards of this Institution has been decidedly beneficial.

One patient escaped in the night, but was brought back the next morning.

There have been 25 deaths.—viz., 10 males and 15 females,—the ages being as follows; viz. 1-20 years, 2-24, 1-25, 1-31, 1-38, 1-43, 1-44, 1-45, 2-46, 2-49, 1-51, 4-63, 2-68, 2-69, 1-70, 1-79, 1-83.

In four cases inquests were held, the patients having died suddenly.

Four cases of Typhoid Fever and one case of Measles occurred during the year, but all made good recoveries. The case of Measles and three of the cases of Typhoid Fever occurred amongst the attendants.

The total amount received from paying patients was $\pounds 2315$ 2s. 11d.; from the Imperial Government, $\pounds 538$ 0s. 9d.

The amount received from patients maintained in the Ladies' Cottage was $\pounds 720$ 12s. 8d., and from those in the Gentlemen's Cottage, $\pounds 941$ 16s. 6d.— $\pounds 1662$ 9s. 2d.

The collection of the fees of paying patients involves considerable difficulty, and frequently legal proceedings have to be resorted to in order to obtain payment.

The gross cost of the Institution was $\pounds 10,969$ 4s. 0d.; but, deducting the receipts from all sources, including the sale of stock, the cost is reduced to $\pounds 7877$ 13s. 11d.,—the average cost of each patient per week on the net expenditure being 10s. $10\frac{3}{4}d$.

During the year a large amount of work has been done by the patients. The men have been employed in gardening, farming, carpentering, painting, roadmaking, woodcutting, in the kitchen, bakery, and in keeping the wards clean. The women, in needlework, in the laundry, knitting, and in various duties connected with the wards.

Sir,

The patients have been afforded various amusements such as cricket, lawn tennis, croquet, quoits, football, cards, draughts, dominoes, and bagatelle. They have frequently been taken out in walking parties, and the usual dances have been provided. Theatrical performances and concerts have also been given in the Institution for their amusement.

If means were provided to enable the more quiet patients to have occasional drives it would be very beneficial for them, and would tend to relieve the monotony of the Asylum.

The farm, garden, and dairy have afforded liberal supplies for the Asylum.

The sale of stock from the farm realised £230 13s. 5d., and the farm also furnished a supply of bacon and ham, and 507 dozen eggs, worth, at 1s. 3d. per dozen, £31 13s. 9d.

The dairy yielded 44,597 pints of milk, which, valued at 2d. per pint, would amount to £371 12s. 10d.

The garden provided an ample supply of fruit and vegetables.

Dr. G. J: Dinham resigned the position of Assistant Medical Officer in May, and Dr. W. P. Murphy was appointed in his place.

Miss Stanwix resigned the post of Sub-matron in November, and was succeeded by Miss J. R. Ayres.

Considerable, and very much needed, repairs have been effected to the buildings generally.

New bath-rooms have been provided in the refractory division on the male side and at the Ladies' Cottage, and the refractory division on the female side. The bath-rooms at the two latter places have been furnished with the most modern appliances.

The drainage in various parts of the Hospital has been improved, and large earthenware drain pipes have replaced the main brick drain.

A suitable cottage for Male Idiots, increased accommodation for females, and also more suitable accommodation for acute cases in the Male Dapartment, are very urgently required.

As Parliament has granted $\pm 12,000$ for additions to the Asylum, it is anticipated that some of these improvements will soon be effected.

The usual religious services have been regularly held on Sundays during the year.

Carpenter's New Work.—Eleven coffins; 4 tables; towel rollers and brackets; chairs for night-tubs; tressels; soap boxes; axe, hoe, rake, and broom handles; shutters for windows; barrow wheels; pig-troughs; doors; hay-rakes, &c.

Repairs.—Carts; cart-wheels; wheelbarrows constantly; washing and night-tubs; close-stools; latrines, Male and Female Division; window sashes; cupboards and chairs; doors and door locks throughout; floors in wards, cells, &c., in all parts of the Establishment; pig-styes; sofas; mangle; ladders; fowlhouse; forms; tables; roofs, &c.

Painter .- Throughout the whole Establishment where required.

Plumber.-Water-pipes and taps constantly.

Glazier .--- Windows and skylights kept in repair.


